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US House votes to condemn Trump over his 'racist' tweets

WASHINGTON (TIP): In a rare move,

the US House of Representatives has passed a resolution to condemn President Donald Trump's "racist" tweets against four non-white Democratic congresswomen who have been critical of his harsh immigration policies.

The vote on Tuesday, July 16, came days after Trump's tweets about four newly elected lawmakers - Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez of New York, Ilhan Omar of Minnesota, Ayanna Pressley of Massachusetts, and Rashida Tlaib of Michigan - triggered widespread uproar.

Trump, on Sunday, July 14, in a series of controversial tweets, said that four Democratic Progressive congresswomen should just "go back" to where they came from.

Moved by Congressman Tom Malinowski, the resolution was passed by the 435-member House of Representatives, the Lower House of the US Congress, on a partisan line of 240-184 votes.

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Republic of Palau becomes 76th country to sign the International Solar Alliance Framework Agreement

NEW YORK (TIP): Tommy E. Remengesau, Jr., President of the Republic of Palau, signed the International Solar Alliance (ISA) Framework Agreement, 15 July 2019, at the Permanent Mission of India to the United Nations, New York.

President Remengesau recognized the ISA as a key initiative for promoting sustainable energy. Palau became the 76th country to sign the ISA Framework Agreement. To date, a total of 54 of the 76 countries have ratified the Framework Agreement.

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Indian-origin dad serving life term seeks new trial

DALLAS (TIP): Three weeks after he was sentenced to life imprisonment for the death of his adopted three-year-old child, an Indian-origin man in Dallas, Texas, has requested a new trial.

Wesley Mathews (39) was sentenced to life imprisonment on June 26 for the death of his daughter, Sherin Mathews, in Richardson near Dallas in October 2017. Sherin was adopted from an orphanage in Bihar in 2016.

The Dallas Morning News reported that the lawyers for Wesley had moved a court motion earlier this week,

requesting a new trial, "arguing that evidence presented against him was prejudicial".

According to The Dallas Morning News, the lawyers for Wesley Mathews argued that the prosecutors had shown the jury, which sentenced Wesley to life imprisonment, images of the decomposed body of Sherin. Brook A. Busbee, one of the lawyers for Wesley, claimed jurors "expressed visible emotion when shown the exhibits" of the body of Sherin.

Indian Convicted in Killing of Estranged Wife in Arizona

PHOENIX (TIP): An Indian origin man accused of killing his estranged wife in Arizona in 2007 before fleeing to India for several years has been convicted of first-degree murder.

Twelve years after Avtar Grewal, 44, killed his 30-year-old wife Navneet Kaur, a jury has found him guilty of first-degree murder for his wife's death on July 16.

According to media reports, Grewal killed Navneet Kaur in her Ahwatukee house in 2007 after she told him she wanted a divorce. He strangled her and then submerged her in a bathtub of water and fled to India. He was arrested by international authorities and extradited back to the US in 2011.

His sentencing is scheduled for August 23.

'You had the Nobel Prize?' Trump learns of Yazidi activist Murad

WASHINGTON (TIP): US President Donald Trump on July 17 appeared unfamiliar with the work and cause of Nobel laureate Nadia Murad as she pleaded with him to help the Yazidis of Iraq.

Murad, one of thousands of women and girls from the ancient faith abducted by the Islamic State group as they overran swathes of Iraq in 2014, joined a group of survivors of religious persecution who met Trump in the Oval Office on the sidelines of a major meeting at the State Department.

After Murad explained how her mother and six brothers were killed and that 3,000 Yazidis remained missing, Trump said, "And you had the Nobel Prize? That's incredible. They gave it to you for what reason?" With little pause, Murad, who was jointly awarded the Nobel Peace Prize last year, repeated her story.

"After all this happened to me, I didn't give up. I make it clear to everyone that ISIS raped thousands of Yazidi women," she said, referring to the Islamic State group. "Please do something. It's not about one family," she said. Trump, who has boasted of crushing the self-styled caliphate of the Islamic State group that once stretched across Iraq and Syria, also appeared at a loss when Murad asked him to press the Iraqi and Kurdish governments to create safe conditions for the Yazidis to return. "But ISIS is gone and now it's Kurdish and who?" Trump asked, before later telling her, "I know the area very well." AFP

Indian American Art Dealer Charged in Antiquities Smuggling Racket

NEW YORK

(TIP): Disgraced Indian art dealer Subhash Kapoor, previously the owner of the Art of the Past gallery in Manhattan, and seven co-conspirators have been charged with operating a \$145 million smuggling ring that dealt with thousands of looted antiquities over a period of 30 years.

The Manhattan District Attorney's Office filed criminal charges against Kapoor and seven others and arrest warrants for the eight men were filed in New York City criminal court on July 15. Subhash Kapoor will be extradited to the US following the completion of his long-running trial in India. Currently he is on trial in Chennai for allegedly running a \$100 million international smuggling racket. On 30 October 2011, Kapoor was arrested at Frankfurt International Airport and on 14 July 2012 extradited to Chennai, India on charges of receiving artifacts that had been stolen from disused temples in southern India. Many of these objects were purchased by museums throughout the world. For example, in 2008 an 11th-century Chola-period bronze statue of a Dancing Shiva was sold by Kapoor to the National Gallery of Australia for \$5.6 million. The statue was allegedly stolen from a temple in Tamil Nadu.

Acharya Shri Chandana Ji answers questions from Prof. Indrajit S Saluja, editor of The Indian Panorama

I could not have been more blessed than when I got a call from my friend Prem Bhandari, President of Jaipur Foot USA, the organization which is known worldwide for providing artificial foot across the globe, to interview Acharya Shri Chandana Ji, popularly known as Tai Maharaj at another friend, Kanak Golia's house in Manhasset, Long Island, New York. I have known Kanak and his lovely wife Prabha as deeply spiritual and philanthropic who have always welcomed spiritual masters and lent their support to organizations and individuals working for the betterment of humanity.

An hour spent in conversation with Acharya ji revealed a person who is a harbinger of hope and peace. Her tremendous work in spiritual and social spheres sets her apart from many traditional spiritual gurus. One cannot but marvel her courage in undertaking to educate children in Naxalite areas of Bihar, at a grave threat and risk to her life. She simply transformed the thinking of Naxals and provided their children the education which brought them respectability and happiness.

Here are some excerpts from the interview.

Q. At the age of 83 plus you are still so active - so busy with your social work and you travel a lot. How do you get the strength?

Ans. The people for whom I work - their love, best wishes and happiness are my strength. If you go to the seaside when it's raining - and you hold your palms properly, water will pour in. If you do the opposite - it won't. I kept my palms that way to get the water. I am doing this since my childhood. I always loved to do good things in life. I even didn't hesitate to steal food from my home for the poor kids around me. I got scolded for that, but I remained the same. If any underprivileged needs something I'll do it for the person. For someone's good, telling lie is not a sin for me. If you are doing wrong to harm someone, then it's a sin but if it is for good cause then it's a virtue. If your thoughts are right, then you can't get wrong. Is it a sin if you are plucking fruits from a tree to feed a hungry? Are you doing injustice to the tree? No.

Q. You do various kinds of social work for poor, disadvantaged people for changing their lives for good and are successful in doing so. You have done a lot for their education. What is your experience in the education sector?

Ans. If you look at the world today - there is an ocean of jobs to be done. In my country I chose Rajgir in Bihar. I started with primary school, then high school and then college. Right now, there are 10,000 students are studying in my schools in various parts of India. I tried to go places where getting education was really tough. It was not an easy job. Gaining trust of people was very difficult. I worked in the Naxalite area. It's been twenty years, but I am doing social work for last forty years. We have schools in Gujarat and Rajasthan and Nepal as well. In total we are working in 25 places. My mission was to do quality job. From infrastructure to education - I wanted to ensure best quality for my students. They should not feel that they are being deprived or not getting proper treatment just because they are poor. Now our students are coming at top 10 at CBSE exams.

For several worldwide, Acharya Chandana ji is so much more than a religious leader because she strongly believes that religion is not about finding Moksha but about striving to resolve the everyday challenges of people and bring peace to their lives. Most importantly, she vehemently focuses on serving people rather than preaching about compassion.

Regarded as one of the rarest, most precious souls in the history of Jain spirituality, Acharya Shri Chandanaji, known to the world as Tai Maharaj, is the vision of peace who believes "Religion accepts life in its entirety. To work towards getting rid of any physical or mental suffering is true religion. Service is no different from spirituality, service is spirituality."

She embraced diksha (renunciation of the material world) at the tender age of 14. As a Sadhvi, she also took a vow of silence, one that lasted 12 years. When the seed for a cause such as Veerayatan was sowed in her heart and mind, she first questioned why Sadhus and Sadhvis could not physically contribute in making a difference

to society.

A clairvoyant and thinking leader, Tai Maharaj then decided to add onto the traditional Jain school of thought. She began her journey to tangibly uplift and impact those facing everyday challenges of survival.

Simply clad in a white sari, always accompanied by a smile on her face, Tai Maharaj unrestrictedly showers her blessings and kindness. She is a ray of sunshine in the sorrow-struck lives of millions. TAX DEPT SEIZE RS 400 CR NOIDA PLOT BELONGING TO MAYAWATI'S BROTHER

NEW DELHI (TIP): The Income Tax Department said on Thursday it has attached a benami plot in Noida worth Rs 400 crore belonging to BSP chief Mayawati's brother Anand Kumar and his wife ahead of by-elections in Uttar Pradesh.

A senior IT official told IANS that the wealth of Anand Kumar and his wife rose steeply between 2007 to 2012, coinciding with the years Mayawati was the Uttar Pradesh Chief Minister.

The official said that Anand Kumar, a businessman who maintains a low profile in the party, had been on the radar of the Income Tax Department even before the 2017 Uttar Pradesh Assembly elections that brought the BJP to power.

The total properties apparently belonging to Anand Kumar and his wife are estimated at ₹1,300 crore.

The official revealed that Anand Kumar was the proprietor of over 12 companies and had amassed a wealth of over Rs 440 crore in cash and properties worth Rs 870 crore.

According to BSP leaders, Anand Kumar is currently the BSP Vice President while his son Akash Anand is National Coordinator.

Finance Bill passed in LS, cess on petrol, diesel stays

NEW DELHI (TIP): The Lok Sabha today passed the Finance Bill 2019 to give effect to the tax proposals for 2019-2020 with Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman saying the proposals would boost "Make in India", less-cash economy and ease the pain of the common person.

Sitharaman, while replying to the debate on the Bill, did not relax tax proposals – a demand most Opposition MPs made. She disagreed with the Opposition suggestion of removing the cess on petrol and diesel and reconsidering 2 per cent TDS on withdrawals of more than Rs 1 crore annually.

The minister was silent on raised customs duty on newsprint to 10 per cent. This hike was opposed by several Opposition MPs.

On the issue of proposed raise in tax liability on people earning more than Rs 2 crore a year, she said the proposal won't impact Foreign Portfolio Investors (FPIs) if they organised themselves as a company.

"There is an option for FPIs to register as a company. When that's done, you don't have a problem of tax which some members have raised," she said, describing a trust as a taxable entity.

Ayodhya: SC seeks report on mediation by August 1



NEW DELHI (TIP): The Supreme Court today allowed the mediation process to continue in the politically sensitive Ram Janmabhoomi-Babri Masjid land dispute case and sought a report on its outcome by August 1.

A five-judge Constitution Bench, headed by Chief Justice Ranjan Gogoi, said after perusing the report filed by the mediation panel, it will take a call on August 2 on whether hearing is required in the case. The Bench, which perused a report about the progress of mediation process till July 18, said its contents would remain confidential as per its earlier order.

"However, taking into account what has been brought to our notice by the said report, we now fix hearing of the case, if required, on and from August 2," the Bench, also comprising justices SA Bobde, DY Chandrachud, Ashok Bhushan and SA Nazeer, said.

India submits dossier to Pak on pro-Khalistan activities on its soil

NEW DELHI (TIP): India has conveyed to Pakistan that Sikh pilgrims visiting that country are regularly subjected to anti-India propaganda and Khalistan agenda and elements based there burn the tricolour to hurt their sentiments. In a dossier given to Pakistan, New Delhi also said a federal minister of Pakistan even eulogised slain Hizbul Mujahideen terrorist Burhan Wani and told the Sikh pilgrims in an address that Sikhs and Kashmiris are treated like "slaves" by the Indian government.

The four annual Indian Sikh 'Jathas' that visit important gurdwaras in Pakistan every year under the bilateral Protocol to visit Religious Shrines, 1974, have been regularly subjected to anti-India propaganda during their visit against the spirit of the visit and in complete subversion of the objectives of the bilateral arrangement, the 23-page dossier, accompanied by pictures, said. The dossier, presented to Pakistan during the recently-concluded bilateral meeting on the Kartarpur Sahib corridor held in Wagah, has in its cover a picture of former general secretary of Pakistan Sikh Gurdwara Prabandhak Committee Gopal Singh Chawla burning the Indian flag.

"Unfortunately, a large part of this propaganda is perpetuated during the religious functions organised by Evacuee Trust Property Board, Pakistan and the forum has been exploited to promote the agenda of Khalistan instead of focusing on the religious discourse," it said. Some blatant instances of such anti-India propaganda during the visits of Indian Jathas in the recent years were also narrated in the dossier, accessed by PTI.

The dossier gives details of several pro-Khalistan groups, including Sikhs For Justice (SFJ), operating freely in Pakistan. The SFJ was recently banned by India. The dossier also contains picture of



Chawla's meeting with Lashkar-e-Taiba founder and Mumbai terror attacks mastermind Hafiz Saeed. In 2016, during the Guru Nanak anniversary, Sardar Mohammad Yousuf, Federal Minister for Religious Affairs and Harmony, in his address at the main function in Gurdwara Nankana Sahib, eulogised Burhan Wani and alleged that the Sikhs and Kashmiris are treated like "slaves" by the Indian government, the dossier said. In the same meeting where the Pakistan federal minister spoke, Chawla raised the demand of Khalistan and even advocated violent means to achieve it.

Chawla asked the Indian Sikh pilgrims to revolt against the Supreme Court's decision in inter-state water agreement involving Punjab and raised anti-India slogans from the dias. During the 'Nagar Kirtan' on November 14, 2016, a pro-Khalistan group carried banners depicting photographs of Sikh militants Jarnail Singh Bhindranwale and Subheg Singh and pro-Khalistan literature was openly distributed.

Pro-Khalistan radical Sikhs had set up the usual Khalistan stage at Gurdwara Nankana Sahib on November 14, 2016 and several speakers, including Chawla criticised Indian government and raised the demand for creation of Khalistan.

A seminar was organised on November 18 at Lahore on

contentious 'Nanakshahi' calendar where speakers accused India of not protecting the interests of Sikhs and Muslims and extended their full support to militancy in Kashmir. "Attempts were made to instigate the Sikh pilgrims against Indian government over the issues like demonetisation, denial of permission for unauthorised 'Sarbat Khalsa', inter-state dispute involving Punjab and creation of Khalistan," the dossier said. During the pilgrimage in November 2016, one Jagroop Singh alias Rupa instigated youths to carry out terror attacks in India.

In April 2017, during 'Baisakhi jathas', UK-based pro-Khalistan element Manmohan Singh Bajaj was allowed to address the pilgrims in Gurdwara Panja Sahib where he raised pro-Khalistan slogans and unequivocally stated that he was fighting for the cause of Khalistan. During the main function, many posters of secessionist campaign 'Referendum 2020', 'Get Ready For Referendum 2020' were permitted to be prominently displayed at the premises of Panja Sahib gurdwara and Bhindranwale's posters with slogans like 'Be Khalsa, Get Khalistan' were displayed.

During the birth anniversary celebration of Guru Nanak Dev in November 2017, pro-Khalistan posters and banners were openly and prominently displayed at various gurdwaras wherever the pilgrims visited.

'UNCLE NELSON' FIRST TOLD ME TO JOIN POLITICS, SAYS PRIYANKA ON MANDELA'S 101ST BIRTH ANNIV

NEW DELHI (TIP): Calling Nelson Mandela her inspiration and guide, Congress general secretary Priyanka Gandhi Vadra on Thursday said the anti-apartheid icon told her that she ought to be in politics long before anyone else did.

Remembering the former South African president on his 101st birth anniversary, she said the world misses men like Mandela more than ever today. His life was a testament to truth, love and freedom, Priyanka Gandhi added.

"To me, he was Uncle Nelson (who told me I ought to be in politics long before anyone else did!). He will always be my inspiration and my guide," she tweeted.

Priyanka Gandhi also posted her photograph with Mandela, captioning it, "Laughing heartily at my son's fancy topi in 2001".

Ending years of speculation, Priyanka Gandhi formally entered politics in January with the Congress appointing her general secretary for Uttar Pradesh East.

Dosas, floor beds in BJP's Karnataka assembly sleepover

BENGALURU (TIP): Upping the ante, about 100 Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) legislators are sleeping in the Karnataka Assembly from Thursday night to protest against the delay in taking the floor test by Chief Minister H.D. Kumaraswamy on the confidence motion he moved on Thursday to prove that his Congress-JD-S coalition government has majority.

"About 100 of our MLAs are on an overnight stay in the Assembly precincts after Speaker KR Ramesh Kumar abruptly adjourned the House without the trust vote despite Governor Vajubhai Vala directing the latter to hold it by the end of the day 7," party's state unit spokesman G Madhusudan told IANS.

The legislators had 'masala dosa' and curd rice for supper in the assembly lounges. Many went to

sleep early after a long day in the House due to heated exchanges and acrimonious scenes in the House, as the ruling combine was reportedly delayed in going through the crucial vote.

Though most of the party lawmakers have been staying at a resort on the city's northwest suburb since July 12 when the 10-day monsoon session began, they are overnight staying to ensure the floor test is conducted on Friday by 1.30 p.m. as Vala directed the Chief Minister.

As many of them didn't have pillows and bedsheets, some rebels bought them from nearby shops to sleep on the floor on bedsheets and rest their heads on soft pillows for a sound sleep.

"We will not budge from the Assembly till the confidence motion

is put to vote for the floor test to prove the ruling allies have the majority of the House," a BJP lawmaker told IANS on the condition of anonymity.

Some of the legislators watched a movie on TV sets in the lobby where they were shown before going to sleep, others were in serious discussions over the strategy to be adopted for the Friday trust vote.

The legislators have decided to go back to resort or their rooms in the adjacent Legislature Home on early Friday and return to the Assembly for the session from 11 am. to resume the inconclusive debate on the motion.

With the Governor writing to the Chief Minister to prove majority in the House by 1.30 p.m. on Friday, uncertainty continues to dog the legislators.



India on Thursday called on Pakistan to immediately release Kulbhushan Jadhav.

AFTER ICJ VERDICT, INDIA CALLS FOR JADHAV RELEASE

NEW DELHI (TIP): India on Thursday called on Pakistan to immediately release Kulbhushan Jadhav, on death row following his conviction on charges of espionage, in view of the International Court of Justice's ruling, asking for a review of the former naval officer's sentence.

The Hague-based top court of the United Nations declared on Wednesday that Pakistan had violated Jadhav's rights under the Vienna Convention on Consular Relations, and called for an effective review and reconsideration of the death sentence given to him by a military court.

In a statement made in both houses of Parliament, external affairs minister S Jaishankar said Jadhav was innocent of the charges levelled against him and a forced confession without legal representation and due process wouldn't change this fact.

"We, once again call upon Pakistan to release and repatriate him forthwith... I can assure that the government will vigorously continue its efforts to ensure Shri Jadhav's safety and well-being as well as his early return to India," he said.

Jadhav, 49, was sentenced to death about a year after he was arrested in Balochistan in March 2016 on charges of involvement in spying and subversive activities. After India petitioned the ICJ in May 2017, the court directed Pakistan to stay Jadhav's execution.

In its ruling on Wednesday, the ICJ said the continued stay of Jadhav's execution was an "indispensable condition" for the review of his conviction at a forum of Pakistan's choice.

Pakistani officials have said they will proceed according to the country's laws. Prime Minister Imran Khan tweeted on Thursday: "Appreciate ICJ's decision not to acquit, release & return Commander Kulbhushan Jadhav to India. He is guilty of crimes against the people of Pakistan. Pakistan shall proceed further as per law."

Jaishankar said Jadhav continued to be in Pakistan's "illegal custody" after being sentenced to death sentence on "fabricated charges". The ICJ's judgment is a vindication for India, Jadhav and all who believe in rule of law, he added.

Noting that the ICJ had made it clear its judgment is "final, binding and without appeal", external affairs ministry spokesperson Raveesh Kumar told a news briefing: "We expect Pakistan to implement the directive immediately without any further delay."

The verdict went in India's favour on eight points cited by the ICJ, either through a unanimous decision or majority decisions by the 16-judge bench, he said. These points include the jurisdiction of the ICJ, the admissibility of India's petition and the violation of Jadhav's rights under the Vienna Convention.

Kumar said Pakistan must now grant consular access to Jadhav and conduct an effective review of his case.

Asked about claims in Pakistan that the verdict had gone in Islamabad's favour, he said, "It seems to me they are reading from a completely different verdict. Each and every point was ruled in favour of India and there is no confusion. I think they have their own compulsions as to why they have to lie to their own people." *Source: HT*

ARMY MONITORING CHINESE ACTIVITIES ON DOKLAM PLATEAU: DEFENCE MINISTRY REPORT

NEW DELHI (TIP): India and China have reduced their presence on the Doklam plateau post the disengagement in 2017, but the India Army is monitoring Chinese activities in the area and is adequately prepared to respond to any contingency, the Defence Ministry said in a report.

In its annual report 2018-19, the ministry also said that Pakistan should take "credible and irreversible" steps to stop supporting terrorists and terror groups operating from territories under its control and dismantle infrastructure operated by them.

It said India will continue to take "robust and decisive" steps to ensure its national security.

Following the disengagement on August 28, 2017, after a 72-day standoff at Doklam, Indian and Chinese troops were redeployed away from their respective positions. This year, the number of Chinese transgressions have considerably reduced, so has the faceoffs, aggressive interactions during such instances.

"(But) the Indian Army is continuously monitoring Chinese activities in the area and is adequately prepared to respond to any contingency," the defence ministry report said. It noted that the situation along the India-China border has remained peaceful.

There are a few areas along the border where there are differing

perceptions of the Line of Actual Control. Both sides patrol up to their respective perceptions of LAC, it added. The standoff at Charding-Ninglung Nallah (CNN) junction in eastern Ladakh due to construction of a benign track and the constant raising of construction of a temporary operating base in Arunachal Pradesh by India were the only two instances where there was a major difference of opinion between the two sides.

"Post Wuhan Summit, there has been an increase in the number of flag meetings. This may be attributed to intent of resolving outstanding issues through discussions at various levels," the report said.

Send Jadhav home; It could trigger a fresh start for Indo-Pak talks

Every new path in Indo-Pak relations ends in a treacherous cul-de-sac. Yet, after every ambush the twins born of colonial cunning go back to start it all over again. Even Ajmal Kasab walking up and down the South Mumbai streets with an automatic rifle in hand did not change the pattern; nor did four wars and the splitting of Pakistan into two. Indira's generosity after victory, Vajpayee's peace bus, Manmohan Singh's Sharm el-Sheikh blunder and Modi's surprise birthday gift for Nawaz Sharif, nothing ever changed the

Pakistan deep state's attempts to bleed India with a thousand cuts and a million mutinies. But the Pulwama bomb attack and the retaliatory Balakot airstrikes have broken the cycle of Pak attacks and Indian negotiations.

It is in this context we need to look at the recent events: the verdict of the International Court of Justice (ICJ) asking Pakistan to review its decision to execute Kulbhushan Jadhav, the arrest of Hafiz Saeed the very same day and the just-concluded Kartarpur corridor talks. The Government of India, with great reverence to the Guru,

upholding the Sikh sentiments, has rightly kept the Kartarpur corridor out of the ambit of Indo-Pak negotiations. Apart from Sikhs, only Hindus worship at gurdwaras and revere the Guru, yet Pakistan tried its best to ban Hindus to turn the corridor communal. Despite all these provocations and the legitimate fear of Pakistan fanning 2020 secessionist fires, New Delhi has honored the wishes of its Sikh and Hindu believers by building the corridor.

Now, if Pakistan really wants to break out of its vicious cycle of terror

and talks, it should let Jadhav go home. The ICJ verdict does not acquit Jadhav, as it did not have the jurisdiction to examine the evidence for and against the accused. But the spirit of the ICJ decision is in favor of Jadhav's return. Beyond the breach of Article 36, 1 (b) of the Vienna Convention, what have been exposed are the mock trial and the use of a former Indian Naval officer as a tool to settle diplomatic scores. Pakistan cannot achieve anything more by keeping Jadhav in its custody. Jadhav's release can lure India back to the talks table. *(Tribune, India)*

Reading Pak gestures carefully after Jadhav verdict

India needs to thoroughly explore Pakistan's recent behavioral pattern against the backdrop of its extraordinary victory in the four-decades-old Afghan civil war that is finally sailing into view - after so much of trials and tribulations, risking Pakistan's internal stability.

Shock and awe in the world of politics work in unpredictable ways. They could have disastrous consequences or could have a salutary effect on the protagonists involved and have a chastening influence, leading to something good.

The shock and awe that the then US President George W Bush hoped to administer to Iraq by invading that country destroyed that country and led to mayhem.

In comparison, the shock and awe that the then Soviet leader Nikita Khrushchev gave to his American counterpart John Kennedy in 1962 by dispatching radars and missiles to Cuba had the desired effect. Khrushchev prevailed upon the US to remove the nuclear missiles deployed in Turkey as a reciprocal step for his willingness to not press ahead with the planned deployment of the Soviet missiles on the Caribbean island-state.

The invocation of such poignant slices of modern history helps to underscore that the shock and awe of the imminent specter of the return of the Taliban to the mainstream political life in Afghanistan - and Pakistan's success in bringing it about - need not necessarily be taken as defeat from the Indian point of view.

Henry Ford, the great American industrialist who founded the iconic motor company, once said, "Failure is simply the opportunity to begin again, this time more intelligently."

The clue almost always lies in humility, which keeps out hubris. There was no rationale for waging a proxy war with Pakistan on the tragic Afghan turf, since no matter how anyone tried, Pakistan wouldn't have caved in, given the high stakes involved. If nothing else, the 2,200-kilometre long open border with Afghanistan alone could have motivated Islamabad to seek a friendly government in Kabul that is receptive to its core

concerns and vital interests of national security.

A former Director General of Pakistan's Inter-Services Intelligence (ISI) once told this writer that if an Afghan had a toothache, he got it fixed by a dentist in Peshawar.

India can and should learn to live with the emerging reality in our region - Taliban's ascendancy to power in Kabul, Pakistan's reasonable success in ensuring that the future power brokers on the northern side of the Durand Line are friendly and cooperative, and, third, Afghanistan's inexorable transformation as a regional hub of China's Belt and Road Initiative.

The time has come to address India-Pakistan tensions, which is fundamental to regional security and stability. Signs are looking good that Pakistan is in the

least interested in triumphalism. Three most recent trends must be noted. One, the guns have fallen silent on the border and incidents of infiltration sharply declined. Two, Pakistan bowed to make concessions on the Kartarpur Sahib pilgrimage. And, three, Pakistan has unceremoniously reopened its airspace, bringing much relief to Indian travelers.

What lends enchantment to the view is that these nascent trends appeared as the countdown began for the verdict by the International Court of Justice (ICJ) at The Hague in the case of Kulbhushan Jadhav, who is on death row in a Pakistani jail.

A consensus ICJ ruling is usually arrived at through candid discussions, which the plaintiff and the defendant are privy to, informally. Quite obviously, such a fair denouement may provide the exit door for both Islamabad and New Delhi to move on, and it is entirely conceivable that both countries are in a chastened mood today over an a priori history that is best laid to rest.

Surely, this is where the most recent 'goodwill gesture' by Pakistan over the Kartarpur Sahib pilgrimage assumes particular significance. The differences between the two countries dramatically narrowed once Pakistan assured India without caveats that it will not allow pro-Khalistan activists to use the 'Peace Corridor' to indulge in anti-India activities. Indeed, very little time is left before the 550th birth anniversary of Guru Nanak in November.

It is often the case in life that others may open the doors, but you must enter by yourself. To be sure, India needs to

thoroughly explore Pakistan's recent behavioral pattern against the backdrop of its extraordinary victory in the four-decades-old Afghan civil war that is finally sailing into view - after so much of trials and tribulations and after committing such massive resources in men and material, risking Pakistan's own internal stability.

The recent Pakistani stance vis-a-vis India is devoid of any traces of triumphalism. The time has come for the Indian leadership to take a big leap forward to begin a serious conversation with Pakistan. The heart of the matter is that a rare opportunity may be at hand for the two countries to discuss the rites of passage to a new era based on a moratorium on asymmetrical or proxy wars. This needs to be done at the leadership level.

An improvement in the India-Pakistan relationship will provide an open sesame to the emerging regional security scenario to turn it into an opportunity for India's development. It will require that India jettisons its notions of the Taliban being a creature of darkness and a reset of regional policies that puts in perspective the tumultuous period that followed the Saur Revolution in 1978, which is breaking loose and drifting into history books. Importantly, the normalization of the India-Pakistan ties - and making them predictable - is the sine qua non for a steady enhancement of India's partnership with China to make it strategic, which Prime Minister Narendra Modi has set his eyes upon as a historic legacy of his leadership.

India-US ties and the Soviet baggage

Till about a decade ago, India and the US were talking to each other on 38 platforms. Now they are talking at one another. Such difficulties have been compounded by a tendency in India to run down Trump and view him as a bull in the global diplomatic China shop. But there is hope as the new External Affairs Minister, S Jaishankar, does not believe in demonizing Trump.

At the root of most of the gripe in recent weeks about the state of relations between New Delhi and Washington is a long-standing popular expectation since the demise of the Soviet Union that as India and the US got closer, the latter would become a substitute for Russia. Because of the heavy American influence on the think tank community and non-governmental organisations (NGOs), the public discourse on Indo-US relations has also fostered such an expectation.

Policymakers within successive Indian governments since then Prime Minister PV Narasimha Rao - during whose tenure the Soviet Union collapsed - have mostly had serious reservations about such a perception. Unfortunately, their American counterparts have both publicly and privately encouraged the policy line that with the fall of the Berlin Wall and with the East bloc gone, all that was needed was for India and America to consummate their marriage that was made in heaven and ordained by their horoscopes matched by the constellations of democracy, English language, the rule of law and so on.

Additionally, after the George W Bush-Manmohan Singh nuclear deal, which ended India's long nuclear winter, Americans at every level of strategic thought, both within their administrations and outside, nursed a sense of entitlement about India. When Sanjaya Baru, then PM's Media Adviser, handed over the first consignment of Alphonso mangoes to then US Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice in June 2007 at the annual meeting of the US-India Business Council, a senior State Department official standing next to this writer loudly exclaimed: "We give India the nuclear bomb and all we get in return is a basket of mangoes."

This official's reaction was patently an exaggeration, but it reflected the strong feelings within the Washington establishment then - as also now. Till 2007, mangoes - like many other Indian agricultural products - could not be exported to the US despite New Delhi's

strenuous efforts because of stringent US regulations.

In May 2006, Boeing invited Indian journalists based in Washington to visit the company's highly secure and heavily restricted Integrated Defense Systems headquarters in St Louis, Missouri, where its modern military aircraft were being designed and developed. Word had been out then that India was about to order 126 medium multi-role combat aircraft (MMRCA), the biggest military aviation deal in history. Indo-US defense trade had not picked up in 2006 to anywhere near what it is today.

Pin-stripe-suited Boeing senior executives, who flew down to St Louis to smoke exquisite cigars and sip premium cognac with the journalists at the Ritz Carlton's Cigar Club, were smug in their belief that the MMRCA deal would go to US companies which were preparing to bid as soon as the tendering process was set in motion by the Congress-led government. "We have been told that in six months everything would be completed once the process begins," he said confidently.

In the end, it took a decade to sign an agreement for partial purchase of the original 126 planes and the deal did not go to American companies. This anecdote is worth narrating because it is just one of the many examples of how companies in the US have little idea of how to do business in India and are ill-equipped to cope with the peculiarities of decision-making in the Indian government.

Just as US administrations want to send Indian-Americans as Ambassadors to India in the belief that they can swing things for them in New Delhi, US companies and lobbying groups hire retired bureaucrats from Lutyens' Delhi whose contacts are from a bygone era. But when things go wrong, the blame is on India, as many Americans in the Donald Trump administration and outside are doing now.

But six months after Hillary Clinton became Secretary of State, she found these 38 groups to be mere talking shops. During a visit to New Delhi in July 2009, she persuaded her Indian counterpart SM Krishna to scrap these working groups. In their place, Clinton and



Krishna created the lofty sounding 'five principal pillars' of their relationship: strategic cooperation; energy and climate change; education and development; economics, trade and agriculture; science, technology, health and innovation.

In retrospect, this was a mistake. When there were 38 working groups, there was constant toing and froing between the two sides and they were in constant and unbroken dialogue offering numerous windows to understand differences and disputes. India and the US were talking to each other then on 38 platforms. Now they are talking at one another.

Such difficulties have been compounded by a tendency in India to run down Trump and view him as a bull in the global diplomatic China shop. But there is hope because the new External Affairs Minister, S Jaishankar, does not believe in demonizing Trump. When he was Foreign Secretary, within a month of Trump's inauguration as President, Jaishankar began advising those in India who practice diplomacy and engage in strategic thought. "Do not demonize Trump, analyses Trump. He represents a thought process. It is not a momentary expression" what Trump is saying, has been Jaishankar's approach. If Trump is re-elected President next year, India will have to follow this advice in letter and spirit or give up on India's most important foreign policy priority.

The Kulbhushan Jadhav Case at the International Court of Justice

In March 2016, Kulbhushan Sudhir Jadhav, an Indian national, was detained by Pakistan, accused of performing acts of espionage and terrorism on behalf of India. In April 2017, he was sentenced to death by a military court in Pakistan. On 8 May 2017, India filed a case against Pakistan at the International Court of Justice or ICJ in The Hague, alleging violations by Pakistan of its obligations under the Vienna Convention on Consular Relations of 1963. Article 36 of the Convention specifically required Pakistan to inform India, "without delay", of the detention of Kulbhushan Jadhav, inform Kulbhushan Jadhav of his rights, and allow Indian consular officials access to Kulbhushan Jadhav.

Pakistan rejected India's claims by using a variety of legal arguments during the hearing of the case at the ICJ. On 17 July

2019, the ICJ delivered its judgement, stating that the "Court finds that the Islamic Republic of Pakistan, in the matter of the detention and trial of an Indian national, Mr. Kulbhushan Sudhir Jadhav, has acted in breach of the obligations incumbent on it under Article 36 of the Vienna Convention on Consular Relations." In the landmark judgement, the ICJ unanimously asserted that it had jurisdiction over the case, since both India and Pakistan were signatories of the Vienna Convention. The ICJ rejected Pakistan's efforts to divert the case to either an arbitral tribunal or a conciliation commission, holding that India had the right to approach the ICJ directly in this matter. The ICJ rejected Pakistan's argument that the Vienna Convention did not apply to cases of persons detained for alleged espionage. The Court found that Pakistan, by not informing India for three weeks of Kulbhushan Jadhav's arrest, and not providing India consular access, had violated its obligations under the Vienna Convention which required it to do so "without delay". The ICJ rejected Pakistan's attempt to apply its obligations under Article 36 of the Vienna Convention

in a conditional manner, dependent on India's actions on other issues.

The heart of the ICJ judgment is contained in Section 6, which recommends ways to remedy this violation of the Vienna Convention by Pakistan. Calling Pakistan's denial of its obligations to uphold Kulbhushan Jadhav's rights, including the right to consular access, "internationally wrongful acts of a continuing character", the ICJ has asked Pakistan to comply with both obligations. It has opined that the "appropriate remedy in this case to be effective review and reconsideration of the conviction and sentence of Mr. Jadhav", which "must be performed unconditionally" by Pakistan. This would include Pakistan "enacting appropriate legislation" if needed to ensure justice. Till then, the ICJ has ordered the "continued stay of execution" as an "indispensable condition for the effective review and reconsideration of the conviction and sentence of Mr. Jadhav."

As Prime Minister Narendra Modi said after the judgment, "Truth and justice have prevailed. Congratulations to the ICJ for a verdict based on extensive study of facts. I am sure Kulbhushan Jadhav will get

justice. Our Government will always work for the safety and welfare of every Indian."

The ICJ judgement is significant for at least three reasons. First, the judgement is binding on "the parties and in respect of that particular case" according to Article 59 of the ICJ Statute. Second, the judgement vindicates India's consistent belief and advocacy in using the rule of law to ensure justice for her citizens, and the peaceful settlement of disputes between states. Third, implementing the judgement will act as a litmus test for the principle of international cooperation, on which the current multilateral system, including the rule of law, is founded. In the wider framework, the ICJ judgment embellishes India's track record since 1947 of giving substance to Article 13.1 of the UN Charter, which calls for "the progressive development of international law and its codification". The provisions of the Vienna Convention on Consular Relations have been significantly amplified by this case.

Taliban close Afghan health facilities run by Swedish group

KABUL (TIP): The Taliban forced a Swedish non-profit group to close 42 health facilities it runs in eastern Afghanistan, the organisation said July 17, the latest attempt by the insurgents to show strength amid negotiations to end the country's nearly 18-year war.

The Taliban currently control nearly half of Afghanistan and are more powerful than at any time since the 2001 US-led invasion.

In Sweden, Sonny Mansson, the country director of the Swedish Committee for Afghanistan, told The Associated Press that the Taliban threatened the NGO's staff by saying that if they do not close the facilities, "it would have consequences for themselves and their families."

Parwiz Ahmad Faizi, the group's communications manager, said the facilities were closed after Afghan forces last week raided a clinic run by the NGO in Daimirdad district. The Afghan troops, acting on intelligence, were allegedly looking for suspected Taliban fighters hiding in the clinic. — AP

Afghan radio station closes down following Taliban threats

KABUL (TIP): The head of a local radio station in eastern Afghanistan says it was shut down after repeated threats from the area's Taliban commander. Ramez Azimi, director of the Samaa station in the city of Ghazni, the capital of eastern Ghazni province, says he received phone calls as well as written warning notes purportedly from the Taliban commander. Azimi says the Taliban, who control several districts in Ghazni province, threatened them because three of the station's 16 employees are women. Zabihullah Mujahid, a Taliban spokesman, denied the insurgents had threatened Samaa. AP

52 rescued after cloud burst wreaks havoc in Pakistan

ISLAMABAD (TIP): The Pakistani military rescued 52 people in a remote village of Pakistan's Neelum Valley where torrential rains triggered off by a cloudburst wreaked havoc in the region, an Army statement said on Tuesday.

According to the the army's media wing Inter-Services Public Relations, the 52 individuals have been evacuated to camps and safer places. Search operation for drowned persons is in progress, Xinhua news agency reported.

Local media reports said that 22 people -- two security personnel, nine locals and 11 preachers who were staying in a mosque were killed after being wiped out by flashflood in the region on Monday. IANS

Pak's anti-graft agency arrests ex-PM Abbasi

LAHORE (PAKISTAN) (TIP): Pakistan's anti-corruption agency arrested former Prime Minister Shahid Khaqan Abbasi on July 18, drawing a furious response from opposition parties, which accused the government of trying to silence its opponents.

The National Accountability Bureau said in a statement, Abbasi had been arrested in a case that was opened last year over a liquefied natural gas (LNG) terminal project.

The arrest, as Abbasi was on his way to a news conference in the eastern city of Lahore, adds to a political scene already thick with accusations of corruption and abuse of office with opposition parties planning a day of protest next week.

"I believe today is yet another black day in Pakistan's history," Ahsan Iqbal, a senior parliamentarian from Abbasi's Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N) party, told reporters, accusing Prime Minister Imran Khan of trying to suppress opposition. "We are not afraid of your fascist acts. Don't think that you will gag our voices through such arrests," he said.

Bilawal Bhutto Zardari, the head of



the Pakistan People's Party (PPP), the other main opposition party, condemned Abbasi's arrest, which he said was part of a government "witchhunt" against elected representatives. The PML-N was already engaged in a bitter standoff with Khan's government, which came to

power last year accusing Abbasi and his predecessor, Nawaz Sharif, of large-scale corruption and mismanagement of the economy. Sharif was disqualified by the Supreme Court in 2017 over accusations that eventually led to a seven-year jail sentence for receiving undeclared income. — Reuters

US ban on Myanmar army chief not enough, says UN



KUALA LUMPUR (TIP): A US travel ban on Myanmar's army chief and three other top officers for their role in orchestrating a crackdown against Rohingya Muslims does not go far enough, a UN rights investigator said on July 18. The sanctions announced on Tuesday were the strongest censure yet from a Western power since the army launched its offensive against the stateless minority in August 2017 following attacks on police posts.

Secretary of State Mike Pompeo said army chief Min Aung Hlaing and the other officers were responsible for human rights violations—including extrajudicial killings during the "ethnic cleansing" of Rohingya when more than 740,000 people were driven into Bangladesh. But the United Nations

Special Rapporteur to Myanmar, Yanghee Lee, said the US move "does not go far enough, it should go further".

Lee, during a visit to Malaysia, criticised the sanctions as unrealistic, saying that the officers were unlikely to travel to the US anyway.

Washington should go further by seizing their assets, and those of their families, and extending the sanctions to cover other senior commanders, she said. Myanmar does not recognise the Rohingya as one of its many official ethnicities, insisting they are interlopers from Bangladesh.

The US, Canada and the European Union have previously passed sanctions against members of the powerful military, but stopped short of reaching the very top of leadership. AFP

Thailand's new Cabinet sworn in, ending rule by army junta

BANGKOK (TIP): Thailand's new Cabinet was sworn in on Tuesday, creating a nominally elected government after five years of military rule but keeping power in the hands of the same allies of the army.

King Maha Vajiralongkorn presided over the swearing-in of the 36-member Cabinet, during which they pledged their loyalty to the constitutional monarch.

"Every task has obstacles. Every mission faces problems," he told them in brief remarks. "It is normal to take on work and solve problems so that the country can be run smoothly according to circumstances."

The Cabinet afterward regrouped at Government House for its first meeting.

Prayuth Chan-ocha, who as army commander seized power in a 2014 coup and then served as junta leader and prime minister, returns to serve again as prime minister.

This time he was elected by a parliamentary vote after a March general election gave pro-military parties a majority.

The junta, which had given itself almost unlimited powers without oversight, was dissolved with the inauguration of the new Cabinet.

The election was held under a new constitution and laws enacted by Prayuth's junta aimed at disadvantaging established political parties.

Critics say the vote was undemocratic and engineered to prolong rule by the military and its conservative allies. AP

‘Make South America Great Again’: Brazil’s Bolsonaro borrows slogan from Trump

SANTA FE (ARGENTINA) (TIP): Brazilian President Jair Bolsonaro has urged his South American colleagues to borrow a slogan from Donald Trump and focus on making their own nations great rather than emphasising regional brotherhood.

“We don’t want a ‘Great homeland,’” the far-right Bolsonaro said on Wednesday at a meeting of the Mercosur trade bloc, using a frequent slogan of Venezuela’s late socialist leader Hugo Chavez to refer to the regional integration of South America.

“We want every country in South America to be autonomous, democratic, and that each country can be great. Just like Trump says that he wants to ‘Make America great again,’ I want to make Brazil great, Paraguay great, Bolivia great, Uruguay — all of our countries.”

The meeting of the Mercosur group — Argentina, Brazil, Paraguay and Uruguay — comes after the bloc’s June 28 signing of a trade deal with the European Union following two decades of negotiations.

Bolsonaro’s sought to strike a marked difference with the centre-left politics that dominated Mercosur until a rightward shift in politics left the region more polarised than it has been in decades. “We can’t allow what’s happening in Venezuela to happen to another country,” he said about the crisis-torn nation that was suspended from Mercosur in 2017 for failing to uphold democratic norms amid an intensifying crackdown on dissent.

“How can a country as rich as Venezuela reach this point? We all know that all of this was born out of populism and the irresponsibility of a power project on a country that knew no bounds ...,” Bolsonaro said.

The United Nations estimates that more than 4 million Venezuelans have fled their country’s economic and humanitarian crisis in recent years in what has become the largest exodus in modern Latin American history.

Dozens of nations say Venezuelan President Nicolás Maduro won a new



presidential term in an illegitimate election last year.

Juan Guaidó, head of the opposition-dominated congress, has won recognition as the country’s rightful leader from more than 50 nations, including the United States, but he has been unable to wrest power from Maduro.

Argentina, Brazil and Paraguay also recognise Guaidó as Venezuela’s leader, but Mercosur has not done so, because the centre-left government of Uruguay opposes doing that.

Turning to trade, the Mercosur leaders agreed Wednesday to try to speed up the implementation of the free-trade agreement with the EU.

The deal, which came amid global trade tensions and rising protectionism, has been hailed as a way to integrate the blocs into a market of some 800 million people. But it must still be ratified by the legislatures of the countries involved and it has raised concerns about competition on both sides of the Atlantic.

The French government recently said it was not yet ready to ratify the pact, saying Brazil must “respect its commitments” to protecting its

rainforest.

Before the deal was finalised, French President Emmanuel Macron had said France would not sign if Brazil did not continue within the Paris climate agreement.

“We hope it benefits all of the citizens of our countries,” Uruguayan President Tabaré Vázquez said Wednesday.

The deal would integrate nearly a fourth of the world’s gross domestic product and more than USD 100 billion in bilateral trade of goods and services.

The European Commission has said it would also remove most tariffs on EU exports to Mercosur, cutting more than 4 billion euros (USD 4.5 billion) worth of duties each year.

The commission says the agreement is particularly important for industrial sectors like cars and car parts, machinery, chemicals and pharmaceuticals.

Mercosur hopes to benefit with more exports of its agricultural products, including beef, poultry and sugar.

“It’s a clear sign to the world that Mercosur must be an open and dynamic bloc,” Macri said. “It must have clear rules for businesses and investments.” — AP

Donkeys painted to look like zebras for theme wedding causes outrage

MADRID (TIP): Two donkeys were painted black and white to resemble zebras for a safari-themed wedding reception in a Spanish beach town, triggering outrage online, where pictures of the painted donkeys were shared.

The incident took place in Cadiz where the painted donkeys were filmed grazing close to a bar in El Palmar town while celebrations were going on.

A concerned local filmed the animals and reported the incident to animal rights activists.

Angel Tomas Herrera Pelaez, who filmed the donkeys, termed the sight as “shameful” and shared the video and the images in a Facebook post which has now gone viral.

His post prompted other netizens to criticize the mistreatment of the animals.

One user wrote, “You had to paint them for the wedding? This type of activities makes me very embarrassed to think that I belong to the same species.” “I have not seen it with my own eyes, but come on, I will not see it either, because my face would fall out of shame. If someone is going to promote some action, please keep them informed,” wrote another.

The matter was brought to the attention of the Agrarian Regional Office of Medina Sidonia as well as the Nature Protection Service of Spain. An investigation into the incident was launched. — IANS

4-year-old Aussie boy claims to be reincarnation of Princess Diana

LONDON (TIP): A four-year-old Australian boy has bizarrely claimed to be the reincarnation of Britain’s Princess Diana.

The boy’s father, a noted Australian television presenter, has said that his son believes he is the reincarnated embodiment of Diana, a UK media report said. Billy Campbell, son of Australian TV personality David Campbell, was born 18 years after the Princess’s death in a car crash in 1997. The bemused father said: “Billy (aged two at this time) pointed and said, ‘Look! It’s me when I was a Princess,’” when he spotted Diana on a card. However, David goes on to say that the kid’s obsession with Diana didn’t stop there. Peculiarly, Billy could apparently recount details about Diana’s life as a toddler, he would refer to Princes William and Harry as his “sons” and have conversations with freaked-out family members in which he would casually mention his “boys”. Even more ludicrously, David alleges that his son would talk about Diana’s brother John, who sadly died as a baby just hours after his birth. — IANS

Germany makes measles vaccination compulsory for children

BERLIN (TIP): Germany will make childhood measles vaccinations mandatory from March 2020, aiming to wipe out the resurgent and potentially deadly disease, Chancellor Angela Merkel’s cabinet decided on Wednesday.

Children will only be admitted to kindergarten or school if they have had the jabs, and vaccinations will also be compulsory for staff in day-care centres, educational institutions, medical facilities and refugee shelters.

“We want to protect as many children as possible from a measles infection,” said Health Minister Jens Spahn, who is aiming for at least 95 per cent coverage.

Violations will lead to fines of up to 2,500 euros (USD2,800) under the Bill that is expected to pass easily through the Bundestag lower house of parliament.

Germany’s paediatricians’ association has long demanded mandatory childhood vaccinations against measles and a range of other diseases.

The UN World Health Organization (WHO) has warned that global efforts to increase immunisation coverage against deadly diseases are stagnating. Last year, 350,000 cases of measles were reported worldwide, more than double the number for 2017. And they increased fourfold globally in the first quarter of 2019 compared to the same period last year, according to WHO.

Germany recorded 543 cases last year, and hundreds so far this year. The resurgence of the disease in some countries has been blamed on the so-called “anti-vax” movement, which is largely based on a 1998 publication linking the measles vaccine and autism that has since been debunked. — AFP

Ryan Reynolds has joined Gal Gadot and Dwayne Johnson in action heist thriller *Red Notice*. The film, which was earlier set at Universal Pictures, is now moving forward at Netflix, reported *Deadline*.

A major coup for the streaming service, the Rawson Marshall Thurber-directed movie will start production in 2020. Gadot and Johnson were attached with the project when Universal acquired the project as a pitch early following a bidding battle last year, one where Netflix came in second.

But Universal announced Monday that it will now release an untitled film in place of the previously announced

November 13, 2020 debut of *Red Notice*. According to *Deadline*, after Thurber drafted his pitch into a screenplay with a budget, the filmmakers sensed hesitation from Universal in a meeting late last month.

When Thurber's finished script was shown to Netflix 10 days ago, the streaming platform committed to everything the filmmakers delivered and a complex deal was brokered during the holiday break.

Thurber has earlier directed Johnson in *Central Intelligence* and *Skyscraper* and Gadot will re-team with her *Fast and Furious* co-star Johnson on the project.

Beyonce sported a custom off-the-shoulder gold pleated gown with a thigh-high slit by Cong Tri, paired with fancy coloured diamond Lorraine Schwartz earrings and diamond rings, as she walked the film's red carpet at Leicester Square Gardens with her husband Jay-Z, reported *People*.

The singer voices Nala in the upcoming remake of the beloved 1994 Disney film. While, Meghan has walked plenty of red carpets as an actor earlier, this marked her first film premiere as a

royal. The Duchess of Sussex wore a semi-sheer Jason Wu black dress, paired with Aquazzura slingback heels and a black Gucci clutch. She was accompanied by her husband Prince Harry, who rocked a classic tuxedo for the event.

They were spotted talking to Beyonce and her husband. The ladies seemed happy around each other and hugged it out immediately. This marked the first time they have been captured together and is believed to be the first time that they have met, reported *E! News*.

Harry kissed Beyonce on both cheeks in greeting and Jay-Z told Meghan and Harry, congrats for welcoming their son Archie Harrison, who was born two months ago.

Iran Guards seize foreign oil tanker

TEHRAN (TIP): Iran's Revolutionary Guards said on July 18 they had detained a "foreign tanker" and its crew for allegedly smuggling fuel in the Gulf.

The tanker was seized on Sunday "south of the (Iranian) island of Larak" in the strategic Strait of Hormuz, the force's Sepahnews website said. The guards did not detail the name or provenance of the vessel.

"With a capacity of two million barrels and 12 foreign crew on board, the vessel was en route to deliver contraband fuel received from Iranian boats to foreign ships in farther regions when it was intercepted," the force said. The announcement comes two days after Iran said it had come to the aid of a foreign tanker after receiving a distress call -- making no mention of the vessel being seized.

"Iranian forces approached it and using a tugboat brought it into Iranian waters for necessary repairs," foreign ministry spokesman Abbas Mousavi said. — AFP

Manchester bomber's brother appears in UK court charged with murder

LONDON (TIP): The brother of the suicide bomber who blew himself up in a deadly 2017 attack in the northern city of Manchester appeared in a London court on July 18 after his extradition from Libya.

Hashem Abedi, 22, who returned to the UK on Wednesday, appeared at Westminster Magistrates' Court charged with the murder of the 22 people who died in the explosion, attempted murder and conspiracy to cause an explosion.

His lawyer said he would be denying the charges.

Wearing glasses and a grey tracksuit, Abedi stood to confirm his name, date of birth and to confirm he currently had no fixed address.

When asked for his nationality, he replied "British".

His older brother Salman Abedi blew himself up at the end of a show by US singer Ariana Grande at the Manchester Arena two years ago.

Zafar Ali, representing Abedi, said his client denied all the charges and had not opposed his extradition back to the UK because he wanted to clear his name. Abedi will next appear via video-link at Oxford Crown Court on July 22 for a bail hearing. A pre-trial hearing will take place at the Old Bailey court in London on July 30. — Reuters

Arson attack on Japanese animation studio kills 33

TOKYO (TIP): A man shouted "die" as he doused an animation studio with fuel and set it ablaze in Japan on July 18, public broadcaster NHK said, killing at least 33 people in the nation's worst mass murder in nearly two decades.

Prime Minister Shinzo Abe called the attack in the city of Kyoto - the latest grisly killing in a nation widely known for its low crime rates - "too appalling for words" on Twitter and offered condolences.

Police detained a 41-year-old man who had shouted "die" as he poured what appeared to be petrol around the three-storey Kyoto Animation building shortly after 10 am, public broadcaster NHK reported.

Thirty-three people were confirmed dead, an official for the Kyoto City Fire Department said.

Fire engulfed the building as white and black smoke billowed from its charred windows. It was Japan's worst mass killing since a suspected arson attack on a Tokyo building in 2001. Shiro Misaki, a 47-year-old owner of a neighbourhood bar five minutes from the studio, said he was driving nearby when he saw the thick smoke. "Policemen were stopping traffic and it was really hazy with smoke," he said. "Even after I got back to my restaurant I could smell the smoke."

The Prime Minister said the cause was arson. "Today, many people were killed and wounded in an arson murder case in



Kyoto," Abe said in a post on Twitter. "It is too appalling for words."

Some of the victims were found in the studio, some on the third floor and others in a staircase leading up to the roof, the fire official said. Another 36 were injured, 10 of them seriously, the official said. The suspected arsonist was injured and was being treated in a hospital, so the police could not question him, NHK said. The Kyoto police declined to comment.

The studio produces popular series such as the "Sound! Euphonium". — Reuters

Boy finds 50-year-old message in a bottle on remote Australian beach

SYDNEY (TIP): An Australian boy who discovered a message in a bottle on a remote beach may have a new penpal after the Englishman who dropped it from an Australia-bound ship 50 years ago was tracked down.

But Jyah Elliott, aged nine, may have to wait some time as the message's now 63-year-old author is once again at sea—this time on a cruise in the Baltic, the ABC reported.

Jyah discovered the decades-old treasure in sand dunes on a South Australian beach on Tuesday and by the next day the writer had been located.

Paul Gilmore was just 13 when on November 17, 1969 he dropped the bottle into the Indian Ocean hoping to reach a new friend.

The letter, which gave the ship's location as "1,000 miles east of Fremantle, Western Australia, asked its recipient to "Please Reply".

Although Jyah initially thought the letter was a fake, he was quick to post a reply on July 17.



"He was so excited," his mother Carla Elliott told the ABC.

Gilmore's sister Annie Crossland told the ABC that her brother was currently cruising but would be sure to contact Jyah when he returns home.

"It's amazing, absolutely incredible," Crossland said. "He'll be chuffed to bits." She said the family had long ago moved on from the reply address on the letter.

Gilmore sent six bottles from the TSS Fairstar, a ship that transported so-called "10-pound Pom" migrants from Great Britain to Australia.

"The last time he was on a ship was probably going to Australia," she said. "Cruises aren't his thing." AFP

Israeli education minister apologises for remarks on gays

JERUSALEM (TIP): Israel's education minister has apologised for controversial remarks about homosexual "conversion therapy" and intermarriage among Diaspora Jews that drew widespread criticism in Israel and the US.

Rafi Peretz, leader of a small religious nationalist party, wrote in a letter to the head of the Jewish Agency on Tuesday that his likening of marriage between Diaspora Jews and non-Jews to a "second Holocaust" was "misplaced".

Peretz's comment at a Cabinet meeting was leaked to the press last week.

In another letter to school administrators, Peretz said he "vehemently opposed" a controversial technique that seeks to convert gay men into heterosexuals after originally saying he supported it.

The minister's comments about conversion therapy drew widespread condemnation and hundreds protested in Tel Aviv.

Peretz, a former chief rabbi in Israel's military, assumed office in Israel's interim government last month. —AP

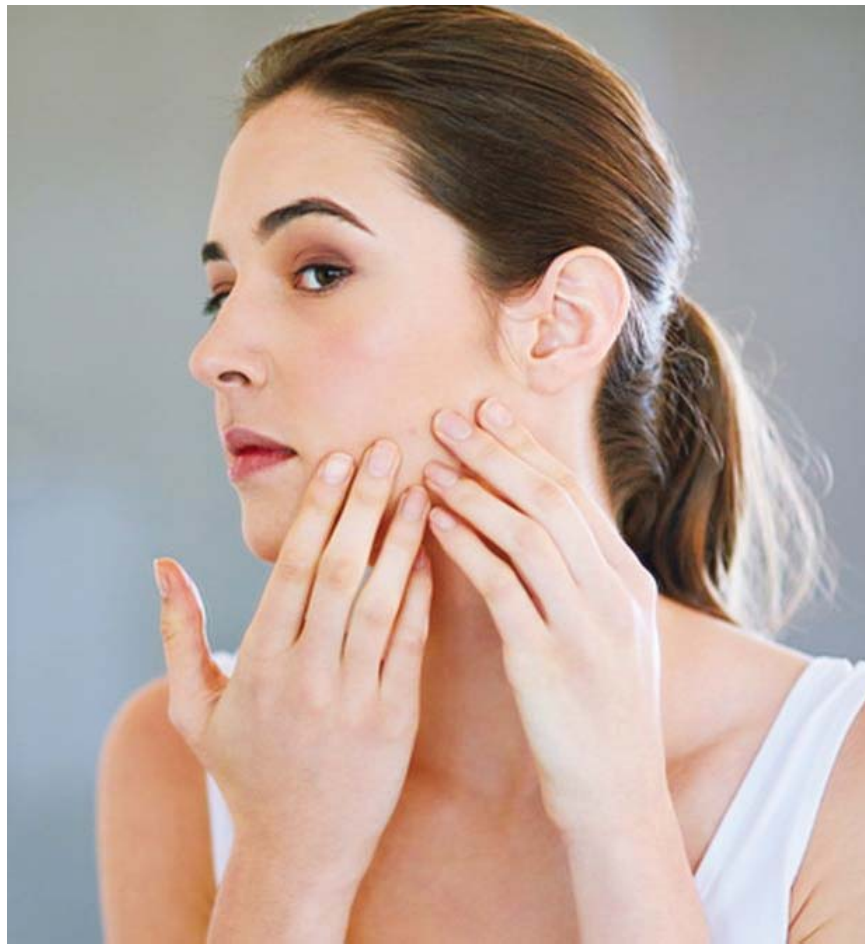

- 1 tsp ginger garlic paste
- 1 tsp oil or ghee

wash the dal and mutton . take oil or ghee in the cooker put curry leaves , mint leaves and Ginger garlic paste and slit green chillies last add nicely diced tomatoes and fry over sim for Few moments then add mutton and cook till the mutton is nicely covered in the masalas and Then add all the dry masalas let the mutton roast for sometime now add the dal and 1 glass Full of water and put the cooker lid on. Cook for ½ an hour. Open and add finely chopped Coriander leaves.

Brown rice



Ingredients

SCIENTISTS FIND A CELL THAT HELPS HEAL THE HEART

Researchers have discovered a previously unidentified cell population which could lead to new treatments for patients with injured hearts.

The cell, described in the journal *Immunity*, was discovered in the pericardial fluid found in the sac around the heart of a mouse with heart injury.

The researchers from the University of Calgary in Canada found that a specific cell, a Gata6+ pericardial cavity macrophage, helps heal an injured heart in mice.

The same cells were also found within the human pericardium of people with injured hearts, confirming that the repair cells offer the promise of a new therapy for patients with heart disease.

"Our discovery of a new cell that can help heal injured heart muscle will open the door to new therapies and hope for the millions of people who suffer from heart disease," said Paul Fedak, a professor at the University of Calgary.

"The possibilities for further discovery and innovative new therapies are exciting and important," said Fedak.

Heart doctors had never before explored the possibility that cells



just outside the heart could participate in healing and repair of hearts after injury, researchers said.

Unlike other organs, the heart has a very limited capacity to repair itself which is why heart disease is the number one cause of death in North America, they said.

"We always knew that the heart sits inside a sac filled with a strange fluid," said Fedak.

"Now we know that this pericardial fluid is rich with healing cells. These cells may hold the secret to repair and regeneration of new heart muscle," he said. *Source: PTI*



MORE BREASTFEEDING COULD SAVE THE WORLD \$1 BILLION EVERY DAY

Not enough breastfeeding costs the global economy almost \$1 billion each day due to lost productivity and healthcare costs, researchers said on Friday, as health experts urged more support for nursing mothers.

A new website developed by researchers in Canada and Asia showed that the world could have saved \$341 billion each year if mothers breastfed their children for longer, helping prevent early deaths and various diseases.

Known as the "Cost of Not Breastfeeding", the online tool used data from a six-year study supported by the U.S.-based maternal and child nutrition initiative, Alive & Thrive.

"It is a human right, it saves lives and improves the prosperity of economies," Canada-based health economics expert Dylan Walters said about the importance of breastfeeding.

Walters, who led the study of more than 100 countries, said the website was the first of its kind and aimed to help policymakers to measure economic losses in individual countries when they do not support breastfeeding.

The United Nations' World Health Organization (WHO) recommends that babies be breastfed exclusively at least their first six months, then have a diet of breast milk and other food until they are two years old.

Breastfeeding can help prevent diarrhea and pneumonia, two major causes of infant death, and protect mothers against ovarian and breast cancer, according to the U.N. agency.

But only 40% of infants under the age of six months are exclusively breastfed globally, while 820,000 child deaths could be avoided each year if the recommendation is followed, it said.

Obstacles to breastfeeding range from a lack of facilities and break times at places of work, aggressive marketing of baby formula, and harassment or stigma if women nurse in public.

FORGET SYNTHETIC MEAT, LAB GROWN DAIRY IS HERE

The search for sustainable, healthy alternatives to meat currently has two paths: the meat-mimicking veggie burger and lab-grown proteins. But in the land of dairy, there's only plant-based alternatives like cashew "butter" and almond milk.

Whether you're milking them or slaughtering them, industrial cattle husbandry is bad for the planet. Studies show it to be a key culprit in the climate crisis and a source of localized environmental damage. The refrigerator aisle has been full of plant-based dairy for some time, but now there are a few startups who, like the purveyors of cultured meat, want to take dairy one step further.

Already under siege by falling milk sales, Big Dairy lobbyists have been lashing out at makers of plant-based rivals as they grow market-share. But their next enemy may be coming from the laboratory, in the form of synthetic whey, and investors are already lining up.

While fewer people are drinking cow's milk, they're still eating yogurt and cheese, and a crucial protein that comes from making those products is whey. It's relatively flavorless and incorporates well into a range of food formulations for everyone from infants to adults. There's already a huge market for it, as demand for whey protein and whey-based products is on the



rise thanks to consumer demand for protein in everything, from bars to shakes.

The U.S. is the single largest exporter of whey products, with estimated sales of \$10 billion last year. BCC Research said the category will grow by 6% annually through 2023. But for all its popularity, all that whey still comes from cows, a fact increasingly seen as a liability for climate- and health-conscious dairy and protein lovers.

Ryan Pandya saw an opportunity in this consumer conundrum. He wants to be the first to market a non-animal whey protein through his San Francisco area-based company, Perfect Day. Like other

food startup founders, Pandya and partner Perumal Gandhi are both vegan. Rather than forego the taste of real cheese and dairy for poor vegan substitutes, the pair decided to invent their own version of the real thing. The startup focused on the well-worn food path of microbial fermentation—harnessing custom yeast and bacteria to grow the proteins that make milk taste like milk.

But first, the company and others like it face some big hurdles: consumer squeamishness and regulatory reviews that may end up focusing more on the genetically modified organisms [GMO] used to make lab-grown whey.

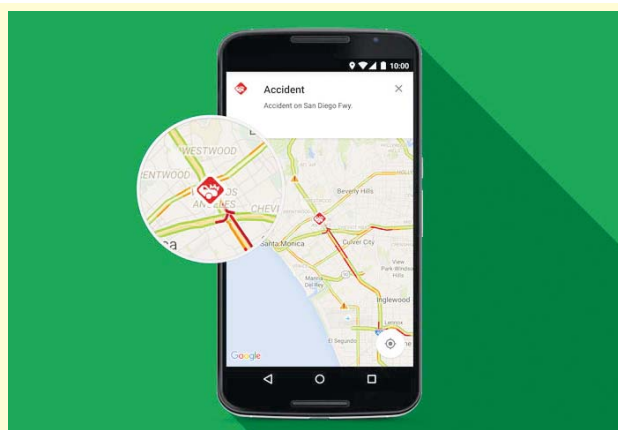
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GOOGLE MAPS TO SHOW BIKE SHARING STATIONS ON APP

To make Maps more useful for users, Google is adding support for bike-sharing stations to let people be informed on docked bike sharing services near them.

The feature has been testing in New York City for the last year and is now expanding to 23 more cities including Barcelona, Berlin, Brussels, Budapest, Chicago, London and Los Angeles among others, The Verge reported on Tuesday.

The new integration is made possible from data provided by Ito World, which provides information on where to find a bike-sharing station, how many bikes are available there and whether or not there's a space waiting for you to dock your bike when you arrive at your destination.

The feature is being rolled out to Android, as well as iOS devices and even though the feature has not reached India as yet, Google plans to expand the feature to other countries shortly.

On a similar issue, on December 2018, Google Maps gained a feature to direct users towards shared Lime scooters and bikes, the report said.

Since the beginning of 2019, Google has been testing and introducing several new features on Maps.

After running tests in the US and elsewhere, earlier in May, Google rolled out speed limits and mobile radar locations in over 40 countries, including India.

In July 2019, Maps also added more than 45,000 community and public toilets as part of the Central government's "Loo Review" campaign that covers 1,700 cities in India.

Besides, the search engine giant has introduced features like Augmented Reality (AR) navigation feature and off-route alert feature on Maps as well.

AI algorithm solves Rubik's Cube in less than a second

Researchers have developed an AI algorithm that can solve a Rubik's Cube in a fraction of a second, faster than most humans.

The work is a step toward making AI systems that can think, reason, plan and make decisions.

The study, published in the journal Nature Machine Intelligence, shows DeepCubeA—a deep reinforcement learning algorithm programmed by University of California computer scientists and mathematicians—can solve the Rubik's Cube in a fraction of a second, without any specific domain knowledge or in-game coaching from humans.

This is no simple task considering that the cube has completion paths numbering in the billions but only one goal state—each of six sides displaying a solid colour—which apparently cannot be found through random moves.

"Artificial Intelligence can defeat the world's best human chess and Go players, but some of the more difficult puzzles, such as the Rubik's Cube, had not been solved by computers, so we thought they were open for AI approaches," said study author Pierre Baldi, Professor at the University of California.

"The solution to the Rubik's Cube involves more symbolic, mathematical and abstract thinking, so a deep learning machine that can crack such a puzzle is getting closer to becoming a system that can think, reason, plan and make decisions," Baldi said.

For the study, the researchers demonstrated that DeepCubeA solved 100 percent of all test configurations, finding the shortest path to the goal state about 60 per cent of the time.

WHATSAPP, TELEGRAM MEDIA FILES CAN BE MANIPULATED

If you thought instant messaging platforms like WhatsApp and Telegram that provide end-to-end encryption give you rock-solid security, think again. Researchers from cybersecurity firm Symantec on Monday revealed vulnerabilities that allowed hackers to manipulate the images and audio files you receive on these platforms.

The security flaw, dubbed "Media File Jacking", affected WhatsApp for Android by default, and Telegram for Android if certain features were enabled, Symantec researchers said in a blog post.

According to the researchers, WhatsApp saves files to external storage automatically, while Telegram does so when the "Save to Gallery" feature is enabled. However, neither apps have any system in place to protect users from a Media File Jacking attack, the researchers from Symantec's Modern OS Security team explained.

Attackers could exploit this vulnerability to scam victims in various ways.

"If the security flaw is exploited, a malicious attacker could misuse and manipulate sensitive information such as personal



photos and videos, corporate documents, invoices, and voice memos," wrote Software Engineer Alon Gat and Yair Amit, Vice-President and Chief Technology Officer, Modern OS Security, Symantec.

Giving example of image manipulation, the researchers said a seemingly innocent, but actually malicious, app downloaded by a user could manipulate personal photos in near-real time and without the victim knowing.

The app runs in the background and performs a "Media File Jacking attack" while the victim

uses WhatsApp. It monitors for photos received through the app, identifies faces in photos, and replaces them with something else, such as other faces or objects.

"A WhatsApp user may send a family photo to one of their contacts, but what the recipient sees is actually a modified photo. While this attack may seem trivial and just a nuisance, it shows the feasibility of manipulating images on the fly," said the blog post.

Using the same vulnerability, the attackers could make payment spoofing or spread fake news.

Remember FaceApp? The Artificial Intelligence-based photo editing app is trending, once again. Since 2017, when the app went viral the last time, the AI photo editing app has become a lot better with better effects. It has also raced to top 4th grossing app on Google Play Store. If you're wondering why everyone's talking about it, here's what you need to know.

What is FaceApp?

FaceApp uses Artificial Intelligence to predict how you would look when you get old or younger. You can also artificially add beard, mustache style or certain look on the app. You can also swap gender or replace background with a single tap. The AI can also find the best hairstyle and colours for you. Unlike other free apps on Play Store, FaceApp's AI prediction looks much more realistic.

How to use

Download FaceApp from the Play Store. Launch the app and choose the photo you want to edit. The app also gives you the option to edit photos from Facebook or of celebrities. You can also use photos from the gallery on your phone. There's an in-app camera button to take photos and edit directly from the app.

Once you have selected the photo, you can apply filters appearing at the bottom of the screen. You can



choose between smiles, impression, age, beards, hair colour, hair styles, glasses and other effects.

Not all filters are free

FaceApp is free to download on Google Play Store and Apple App Store. The app, however, comes, a lot of in-app purchases. The developers are offering a premium version of the app as well called "FaceApp Pro." The premium version gives full size filters, filter updates, mix and match styles, and ad-free experience. The monthly subscription costs Rs 299 whereas an annual package will cost Rs 1,599. For Rs 3,099, you get the premium version forever.

Performance: Inconsistent

The AI photo editor does a good job at predicting how a person may look old or young. Like early days of

once-viral app Prisma, FaceApp is also slow at times and is unable to process the images in one-go. The performance, however, is much better than the early version of the app.

Privacy questions

Even as FaceApp has gone viral, people have raised concerns over how the app handles users' data. Some reports alleged FaceApp uploaded full camera roll to its servers. Top security researchers Baptiste Robert and Will Strafach, however, have given clean chit to the app. "Using a network traffic analyzer, I tried to replicate the thing people are talking about with FaceApp allegedly uploading your full camera roll to remote servers, but I did not see the reported activity occur," Strafach said in a tweet.

Trump says he could impose more China tariffs if he wants

Trump and Xi called a tariff ceasefire and agreed to resume trade talks after meeting at the Group-of-20 summit in Japan in late-June, breaking a six-week stalemate

President Donald Trump reiterated that he could impose additional tariffs on Chinese imports if he wants, after promising to hold off on more duties in a trade-war truce he reached with China's Xi Jinping last month.

"We have a long way to go as far as tariffs where China is concerned, if we want. We have another \$325 billion we can put a tariff on, if we want," Trump said. "So, we're talking to China about a deal, but I wish they didn't break the deal that we had."

China said Wednesday that further levies would complicate the negotiations.

"If the U.S. imposes new tariffs, this would create a new obstacle for U.S. and China trade negotiations, would make the road to coming to an agreement longer," Foreign Ministry spokesman Geng Shuang told reporters in Beijing. "China still hopes to resolve U.S.-China trade frictions through consultation and dialogue."

Trump and Xi called a tariff ceasefire and agreed to resume trade talks after meeting at the Group-of-20 summit in Japan in late-June, breaking a six-week stalemate. The U.S. president said he'd hold off on a threat to impose tariffs on an additional \$300 billion in Chinese imports, and that Xi had agreed to buy large amounts of U.S. farm goods in exchange.

No such deal to increase agricultural purchases was made,



Chinese officials familiar with the discussions said earlier. There hasn't been any large-scale buys since the meeting in late June.

Stocks fell from a record after Trump made the remarks at a cabinet meeting Tuesday at the White House. Treasury 10-year yields surged earlier in the day after solid economic data added to signs the U.S. expansion is holding up even as central bank officials indicated they're ready to cut rates.

Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin and U.S. Trade Representative Robert Lighthizer expect to have another call this week with top trade negotiators in China, and the two may travel to Beijing for meetings if the discussions by phone are

productive, Mnuchin said Monday.

Trump resumed pressure on China through tweets this week about the ongoing trade tensions. On Monday, the president indicated that the U.S. tariffs were having their intended impact by squeezing China's economy.

China released figures this week showing growth in the world's second-largest economy slowed to 6.2% in the second quarter, the weakest pace since at least 1992 when the country began collecting the data.

Meanwhile, Trump last week complained that China wasn't living up to its promise of increased purchases of American agricultural goods. "China is letting us down in that they have not been buying the agricultural products from our great Farmers that they said they would. Hopefully they will start soon!" Trump said on Twitter.

The U.S. expects China to announce significant purchases of from U.S. farmers, Trump's top economic adviser, Larry Kudlow, told reporters Monday, implying that the step is necessary for trade talks between two nations to advance.

The talks broke down in May after the U.S. accused China of reneging on commitments in a draft deal that Mnuchin said had been 90% completed. China has said there'll be no trade deal unless the U.S. removes all existing tariffs put in place during the year-long trade war.

LABOUR MINISTRY REJECTS MOVE TO LOWER EPFO RATE OF INTEREST

NEW DELHI (TIP): The labour ministry has rejected the finance ministry's request to reduce the 8.65% interest rate offered in 2018-19 by the Employee Provident Fund Organisation, the government owned pension fund manager, in a move that should bring cheer to 46 million subscribers whose funds are managed by EPFO.

Government officials familiar with the matter said the labour ministry is of the view that EPFO has sufficient surplus of over Rs 3,150 crore, mainly earned from investments in exchange traded funds (ETFs).

EPFO interest rate is determined by the organisation's Central Board of Trustees (CBT), which does so after assessing the annual returns on the investments. It is the duty of EPFO to pass on the rightful share of the subscribers, the government officials cited in the first instance added on condition of anonymity. EPFO does not take any money from the consolidated fund of the Government of India, and is not obliged to follow the finance ministry's suggestions, they added.

CBT is chaired by the labour minister and has representation of central and state government officials, trade unions and industry bodies.

"The finance ministry is worried that EPFO is offering significantly higher returns compared to similar funds managed by the central government. Instead of asking for the EPF interest rate to be slashed, it should make its fund management system more efficient," said one of the officials.

The finance ministry on Tuesday slashed interest rate on General Provident Fund (GPF) and other similar funds to 7.9% for the quarter ending September 30 as compared to 8% offered on pension funds of government employees the previous quarter.

Facebook's Libra prospects dim, but cryptocurrencies roll on

WASHINGTON (TIP): Facebook's planned global digital coin Libra has run into a wall of opposition in Washington that could prevent its launch as envisioned, but analysts say cryptocurrencies are likely to make gains around the world nonetheless.

The plan by Facebook and its partners has generated skepticism from US lawmakers and G7 finance ministers as well as from central banks and regulators globally.

Lawmakers have also raised concerns over Facebook's spotty record on privacy and data protection.

Facebook's scale—with some 2.7 billion users for all its applications—means the proposed Libra currency could roil the global financial system and make the job harder for the world's central banks.

"If people are using Libra as a stored value and holding a lot of money in it, you might have less effective monetary policy," said Martin Chorzempa, a research fellow at the Peterson Institute for International Economics.

The US Federal Reserve, for example, "can affect the dollar but it might not affect Libra in the same way."



Since the Libra would likely hold the dollar, euro and other major currencies as reserve assets, the impact could be significant in "emerging markets or developing countries where people want to get rid of those currencies," Chorzempa said.

"Imagine the demand for Libra in a place like Venezuela," where the currency has collapsed from hyperinflation.

Hoping to avoid the wild swings of other virtual currencies, Libra would be governed by a non-profit association backing up the coin with a basket of major global currencies.

Amazon in deal with German watchdog

FRANKFURT (TIP): Amazon has reached a deal with Germany's anti-trust authority to overhaul its terms of service for third-party merchants, taking action to appease regulators as pressure on the e-commerce giant grows in Europe and the United States.

The Federal Cartel Office said on Wednesday it was dropping a seven-month investigation after Amazon agreed to amend its Business Services Agreement that applies to merchants using its platform.

Neighbouring Austria ended a similar probe into Amazon, yet a full-blown European Union antitrust probe still looms.

Lawmakers in the United States meanwhile grilled an Amazon boss on Tuesday over how the company treats merchants.

Carlos Ghosn sues Mitsubishi, Nissan for breach of contract

PARIS (TIP): Former auto titan Carlos Ghosn, currently under house arrest in Tokyo, is suing Nissan and Mitsubishi in a Dutch court for "improper termination" of his contract, French newspaper Le Figaro reported on Wednesday.

Ghosn is accusing the Japanese manufacturers of breaching his contract as an employee of NMBV, their joint subsidiary based in the Netherlands, and seeking up to 15 million euros in damages, it said.

The former chief of Renault and Nissan is awaiting trial in Japan on charges of financial misconduct. He was kept behind bars for over 100 days before being granted bail and sacked from all his management roles.

India's Focus now is Private Sector led Growth, says NITI Aayog Vice-Chairman Rajiv Kumar

and status of a Cabinet Minister, on 1 September 2017. Highlighting the reform measures introduced in the recent budget, Dr Kumar said that there are more than a dozen provisions in the budget to encourage the private sector to lead India's growth and it's time to make space for them and give the private sector more incentive.

"The intention and the sharp focus of the Modi government is very clear and it is that private enterprise must be given the space, the incentives to play its role in the economy. The government has no intention at all to try and be the main driver of growth in the country because it is not possible," he said. "The next five years, India is going to be at the cusp of a major transformation and if we succeed, as this government is wanting to, you will see a decade plus more of sustained high growth which will be undertaken with inclusion but also with sustainability," he further added.

Dr Kumar acknowledged that there is still space for bolder reforms like changing the mindset. Noting that agriculture needs corporate investment, as there have hardly been any investments in that sector, but for that structural reforms are essential, he pointed out. Focus is also being given for major transformation in the mining, oil and natural gas sectors, electric mobility sectors, textile and leather, as well as 'sunshine' industry like tourism, he added.

During a Q&A session, answering a question by Prof Indrajit S Saluja, Chief Editor of The Indian Panorama about water scarcity in different states, Dr Kumar said the water index, introduced by NITI Aayog, has raised the alarm. He said the problem and its solution both are associated with agriculture. At the moment about 90 percent of the water is consumed by agriculture, he said. The agriculture has to be more water efficient and if there is a shift to horticulture, water could be freed up for other uses, he suggested.

Later, in a brief interview with The Indian Panorama, Dr Kumar answered a few questions from Chief Editor Prof Indrajit S Saluja.

Q. As in charge of policy planning in India, what would be your top priority? I am not talking about the government, what would be your top priority?

Ans. My top priority would be two - one is agricultural transformation and I stick by that. The other one is to eliminate mal nourishment. Our children and our women - 38% of our children are mal nourished - it's a shame. Fifteen percent of our women are anemic. If we can't change that, we are not going anywhere at all. And the third would be water. If I can solve these three, I would die as a satisfied person. I just headed a committee called the North East Water Management Authority. They did a very good job; we have to implement that. It would solve the Brahmaputra problem at least.

Q. When it comes to human beings, what kind of quality of life do you think you would be able to provide for people of India under your supervisory capacity as chief planner of India?

Ans. I am not a planner. I gave up planning. I am just a thinker. Our problem is much bigger than quality of life. You know if I can tackle, get people sufficient amount of potable good water and a clean environment, if I can get them quality education and health - that in the five years I am not promising. But the beginning is being made. Those are the areas we want to work on. For that (We need) domestic private investment. FDI contributes no more than 3 to 4 percent in our total investment. We have to depend on domestic investment and domestic investors.

US House votes to condemn Trump over his 'racist' tweets

The resolution also got support of four Republicans and an Independent in the House where the Democratic Party has a majority. Though the result carries no legal repercussions for President Trump, it was an embarrassing one for him.

Attendance at the summit will be free,

but passes will be required. Passes are available on a first-come-first-serve basis and exclusively through an online registration process (www.howdymodi.org). Hundreds of prominent business and community leaders from across America are expected to attend.

In addition to the Prime Minister's address, the program is expected to include a cultural program that showcases the Indian-American

community and will be broadcast live online and on television channels reaching over 1 Billion people across the United States and India.

This will be the first trip to the United States for Prime Minister Modi after his landslide victory in Indian elections earlier this year. The Prime Minister of India has previously addressed similar gatherings at Madison Square Garden in New York and the SAP Center in San Jose.

Trump secures billion dollar deal to eradicate AIDS from US in a decade

WASHINGTON (TIP): The US has now reached a stage wherein it can eradicate AIDS from the country in a decade, President Donald Trump has said. Health and Human Services Secretary Alex Azar told cabinet colleagues on Tuesday that the administration had entered into a tie up with Gilead, an American biotechnology company that focuses primarily on antiviral drugs used in the treatment of HIV, hepatitis B, hepatitis C and influenza.

"The President secured a historic deal to get 2,00,000 courses of treatment per year for the next 11 years of free drug for our program to be able to treat people that keeps them from being able to get HIV, even if they have at-risk behaviours" Azar said.

The deal is worth billions of dollars, which Gilead has promised to contribute over the next decade. "We're really at a point where we can eradicate AIDS from the United States within 10 years," Trump said. Terming it a "historic" agreement, Azar said the US has a chance to stop HIV within 10 years from being an "epidemic" in this country. "It is going to be one of President Trump's great legacies for history, is the eradication of HIV as an epidemic here in the United States," he added. PTI

U.S.-India Bilateral Trade Projected to Grow to \$238 billion by 2025, says Trade Report

WASHINGTON (TIP): The US-India Strategic Partnership Forum (USISPF) estimates that U.S.-India bilateral trade is likely to grow from \$143 billion to \$238 billion by 2025. This growth will occur if trade grows by 7.5% each year, as has been the trend for the last 7 years.

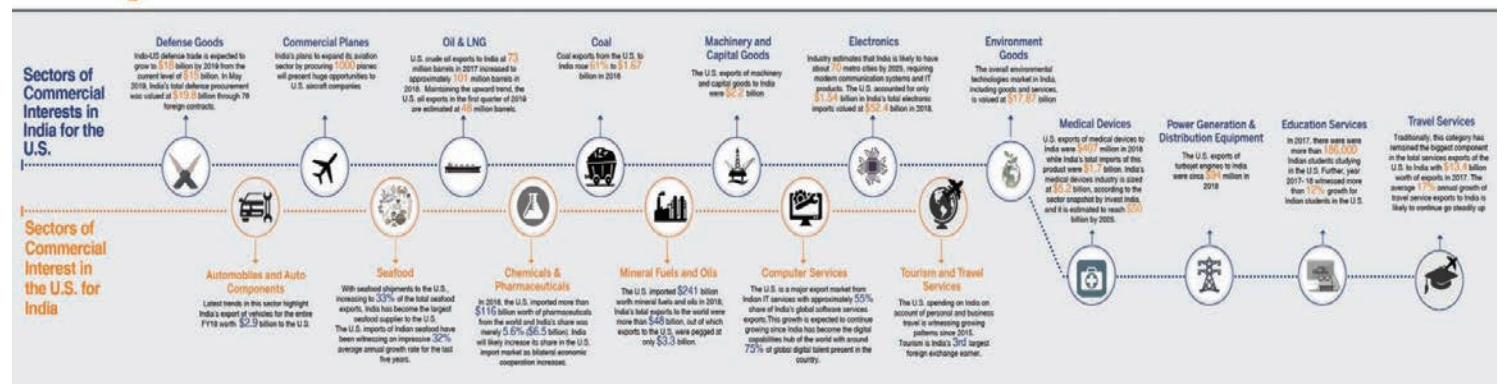
The estimate also projects that, by 2025, bilateral trade could range between \$283 billion to \$327 billion, at an annual average growth rate of 10%-12.5% (as witnessed in 2017 and 2018). The assessment underscores pathways for growth and economic opportunity in our bilateral ties by highlighting current trends. Sectors such as defense trade, commercial aircrafts, oil and LNG, coal, machinery and electronics are areas of potential growth in U.S. investments and commerce into India. Similarly, Indian industry has an opportunity to promote the automotive, pharmaceuticals, seafood, IT and travel services to the U.S. market.

The assessment was launched at USISPF's second annual leadership summit, amid overwhelming bipartisan support for U.S.-India ties. U.S. Cabinet officials in attendance included: Nancy Pelosi, Speaker of the United States House of Representatives; Rick Perry, United States Secretary of Energy; Wilbur Ross, U.S. Commerce Secretary; Jeffrey Gerrish, Deputy United States Trade Representative for Asia, Europe, the



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Middle East, and Industrial Competitiveness; U.S. Senator Dan Sullivan (R-AK); and India's Ambassador to the United States, Harsh Shringla. During the summit, speakers highlighted areas of bilateral cooperation, including: trade and investment; strategic energy ties; manufacturing, and the U.S.-India innovation partnership.

Speaking at the summit, USISPF Chair, John Chambers said, "Prime Minister Modi's re-election is the start of a new era for India and US-India relations. It is my honor to be in Washington, D.C. today to

commemorate the second annual USISPF leadership summit, where conversations with political and business leaders from both countries focused on India's projected growth in the coming months and years. While India's ambition to become a \$5 trillion economy by 2025 is certainly welcome for businesses, government, and individual citizens in the U.S. and India, it is essential that we level the playing field and stay away from protectionism. I am confident that we can achieve \$327 billion in bilateral trade by 2025 if we grow at 13% every year. I challenge the government and

industry to work together to advance this objective."

USISPF President and CEO Mukesh Aghi said, "In collaboration with government and industry leaders, we are making tremendous strides in moving the needle on our commercial priorities. Next week, the Atlantic Council and the Forum will release a report with recommendations to both governments on how to advance the bilateral trade relationship. We will also release recommendations on growing US-India cooperation in high-technology manufacturing sectors, such as aerospace and medical devices."

Selection meet postponed, focus on Dhoni's future, Kohli's availability

NEW DELHI (TIP): The national selection panel's meeting to pick squads for the West Indies tour has been pushed to Sunday amid intense focus on skipper Virat Kohli's availability and MS Dhoni's future.

The meeting was scheduled for Friday but was postponed following Committee of Administrators' (CoA) directive that the chairman of the panel, instead of BCCI secretary, will convene it. "There are some legal modalities that need to be followed due to the rule change and it took some time. Also the BCCI's cricket operations team needs to apprise the chairman of the availability of the captain for the meeting. The fitness reports of the players will be available on Saturday evening," a BCCI official said.

The 38-year old Dhoni would be the centre of discussion amid speculation that the Jharkhand player is contemplating retirement even though he hasn't spoken about it till now. Dhoni's selection or omission would be an indicator of things to come in the future. India are set to play three T20s, as many ODIs and two Tests in a full-fledged tour to the Caribbean islands, starting August 3.

Considering next year's T20 World Cup to be held in Australia, the selectors might opt for Rishabh Pant, who is seen as the heir apparent to Dhoni.

Dhoni was dropped from the T20 series against West Indies and



Australia last October and there is a strong chance that he won't be included this time around too. Pant was recently called up as a replacement for an injured opener Shikhar Dhawan in the World Cup.

Another issue that would surely be debated is the availability of Kohli, who has been on the road for a while.

There is a school of thought that the skipper could be rested considering the long domestic season ahead, which begins in September, and in this scenario, Rohit Sharma could be handed captaincy for the shorter formats. However, with the two Tests being part of the ICC Test Championship, Kohli could be included in the Test squad. A similar approach could be taken for pacer Jasprit Bumrah. The MSK Prasad-led panel would

also work on restructuring the middle-order as it was one of the primary reasons for India's exit from the World Cup semifinal. Picking the middle-order could lead to a big debate as the panel has a few choices among Karnataka's Mayank Agarwal, Manish Pandey and Mumbai's Shreyas Iyer.

Shubman in reckoning

The selectors may consider Punjab batsman Shubman Gill and Mumbai's Prithvi Shaw. But Shaw's hip injury could come in the way of him being considered. Gill has been among the runs in the West Indies tour for India A. It could also be end of the road for Dinesh Karthik and Kedar Jadhav, who failed to perform in the World Cup. If Dhawan is deemed fit, he would, in all probability, open with Rohit.



Sachin Tendulkar, Allan Donald inducted in ICC Hall of Fame

LONDON (TIP): Indian batting icon Sachin Tendulkar has been inducted into the International Cricket Council's Hall of Fame alongside South African pace legend Allan Donald. Joining Tendulkar and Donald in the Hall of Fame was two-time World Cup-winning Australian woman cricketer Cathryn Fitzpatrick.

"It's a huge honour for me," Tendulkar said at the induction ceremony held here on Sunday night.

The 46-year-old former right-hand batsman is regarded the greatest to have played the game along with Sir Donald Bradman and remains the top run-accumulator in both Tests and ODIs.

He has 34,357 runs across formats and is the only batsman to have 100 internationals hundreds under his belt. The 52-year-old Donald is one of the finest bowlers to have played the game and had 330 Test and 272 ODI wickets to his credit before calling it quits in 2003. Fitzpatrick is the second highest wicket-taker of all time in women's cricket with 180 ODI scalps and 60 in Tests. As a coach, she guided the Australian women's team to three World Cup titles.

ICC suspends Zimbabwe over government interference

LONDON (TIP): Zimbabwe were suspended from the International Cricket Council (ICC) on Thursday, with the world governing body saying the country's cricket administration was not free from government interference. The ICC Board unanimously decided to freeze funding to national governing body Zimbabwe Cricket (ZC) and ban the southern African country's teams from international events. Zimbabwe failed to qualify for the recent 50-overs World Cup, having struggled to schedule matches against the major teams in international cricket as their financial position worsened.

Novak Djokovic, Ashleigh Barty on top in latest tennis rankings

PARIS (TIP): Novak Djokovic's successful defence of his Wimbledon crown ensured that the Serb remained at world number one in the latest ATP rankings released on Monday.

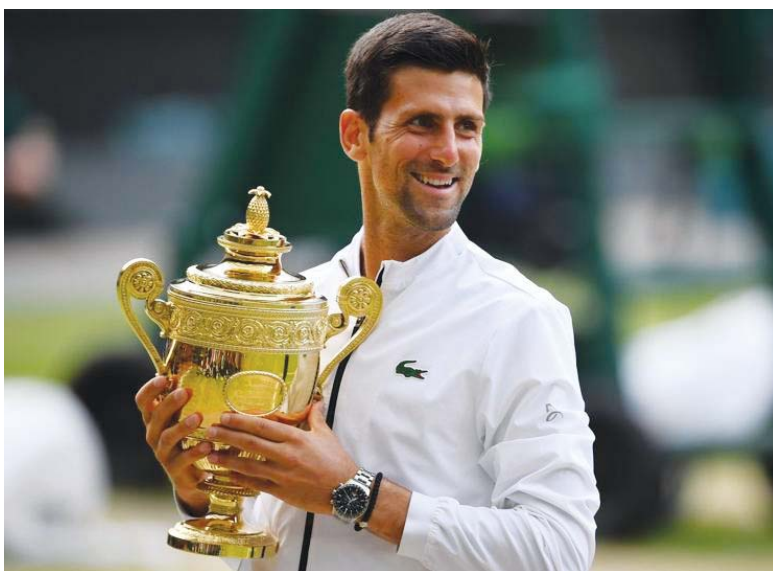
The 32-year-old collected his fifth Wimbledon title and 16th major Sunday with a thrilling five-set win over Roger Federer, a match that last three minutes short of five hours.

He is now 4,500 points clear of second-ranked Rafael Nadal who is just 485 points ahead of 37-year-old Federer.

The biggest climber is Roberto Bautista Agut whose ride to the semi-finals, where he lost in four sets to Djokovic, sees him rise nine places to 13, equalling his best ranking.

David Goffin, who lost to Djokovic in the quarters, returns to the Top 20, rising five places to 18th.

Barty retains top spot



Ashleigh Barty hung on to top place in the WTA rankings on Monday despite crashing out of Wimbledon in the last 16.

The French Open champion, who was hoping to become the first Australian to win at the All

Simona Halep, who demolished Serena Williams in under an hour in Saturday's final, moves up three places to number four.

Williams also moves up one place to nine.

Former world number one Angelique Kerber, who lost to Lauren Davis in the second round at Wimbledon, drops out of the top 10 to 13.
