NEW YORK (TIP): Dozens of people were killed across New York and New Jersey - including a 2-year-old boy and his parents who drowned in a basement apartment in Queens - as the tail-end of Hurricane Ida ravaged the northeast, says a New York Post report.

The storm knocked out power and flooded streets, homes and subways - prompting the first-ever flash flood emergency for the Big Apple and leaving a trail of devastation from Maryland to New York.

Thirteen people in the five boroughs were reported killed by late Thursday evening, according to NYPD Chief of Department Rodney Harrison. Many of the victims became trapped in flooded basement apartments and one person

LJUBLJANA (TIP): External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar on Thursday met Slovenian President Borut Pahor and discussed key challenges facing India and the European Union (EU).

Slovenia holds the presidency of the Council of the European Union.

Jaishankar is in the central European nation as part of his four-day visit to Slovenia, Croatia and Denmark to boost bilateral ties and strengthen India's

cooperation with the EU.

Jaishankar in a tweet thanked President Pahor for his gracious welcome.

"Deeply appreciate his long standing support for our relationship. Discussed key challenges facing India and EU," he added, sharing a photograph of the meeting. Jaishankar also met with Slovenian counterpart Anze Logar

Foreign Secretary Harsh Vardhan Shringla visits Washington for talks with U.S. officials



ERASING NEHRU

POSTER ON 75 YEARS OF INDEPENDENCE REEKS OF PETTINESS

Indian history has always been a battleground of identity politics and a contested territory of colonial, anti-colonial and post-modern historiographies. While the neo-colonial historians and intellectuals keep trying to belittle the national movement and to pit Gandhi against Ambedkar, creating a false binary to paint the former as some sort of a feudal casteist, the Hindutvavadi historians have been attempting to whitewash their icons and erase their ideological rivals. It is a miracle that the Mahatma has so far survived the Hindutva censorship scissors, for Gandhi and Nehru had all along been blamed for all that had gone wrong with the nation. The 'what if' history-writers have wanted Subhas Chandra Bose as India's first Prime Minister and they finally seem to have succeeded in at least releasing a poster as part of Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav celebrations with the first President, Rajendra Prasad, to Gandhi's left and Bose to his right, with Nehru completely absent.

The erasure of Nehru and the inclusion of VD Savarkar ought to lead any history enthusiast to a 'what if' question: what if the Nehru government had vigorously prosecuted the Gandhi murder case and refused to accept the acquittal of Savarkar by the trial court? All those who celebrate Savarkar in the Indian Council for Historical Research poster should thank Nehru for not appealing against the trial court order. They ought to be grateful to Indira Gandhi too for legitimizing Savarkar's memory by issuing a postage stamp just a year after the JL Kapur Commission probing the Gandhi assassination found that 'all these facts taken together were destructive of any theory other than the conspiracy to murder by Savarkar

and his group'.

Noble intentions: On the U.N. and the Taliban

THE U.N. MUST ENSURE THAT THE TALIBAN UPHOLD HUMAN RIGHTS AND GIVE UP TERROR TACTICS

As India ended its month-long presidency of the U.N. Security Council this week, the government claimed a victory of sorts for chairing a session that resulted in the adoption of UNSC Resolution 2593, condemning terrorism and urging the Taliban to ensure human rights in Afghanistan. The government has said that the resolution - sponsored by the U.S., the U.K. and France - addressed key Indian concerns, calling for the Taliban to ensure safe evacuations of Afghans wishing to leave and not allowing Afghan soil to be used for terrorist activity. The passage of the resolution was timely, practically coinciding with the exit of the last U.S. troops from Kabul, and the Taliban's declaration of complete victory. It also followed on three discussions held under India's chairmanship that have set out the expectations from the new regime in Afghanistan: the importance of upholding rights; to push for an

inclusive, negotiated political settlement for government, and condemning all acts of terror, including the recent attack on Kabul airport; preventing any future attacks, and combating of the presence of UN-designated entities. However, the resolution did not contain any consequential language that would give the UNSC's stated intentions any real teeth, and appears to accept the Taliban regime as the default force in Afghanistan.

While it is very early to consider more punitive action against the Taliban for violating their commitments by using the U.N. Charter's "Chapter 7" mandate, that empowers the UNSC to maintain peace, it is disappointing that the India-chaired resolution does not contain language that would hold the new regime more accountable. The watered-down language was probably on account of severe opposition from Russia and China, who later decided to abstain. This divide in the P-5 nations will only prove

to be counterproductive if the UNSC wants to remain "seized" of the situation, as the resolution affirms. It is hoped that the U.N. system acknowledges the powerful leverage it has in Afghanistan's future and actualizes all mechanisms in its mandate to monitor the progress of government formation. A major tool is the India-chaired 1988 (Taliban) Sanctions Committee, due to meet soon, which needs to ensure that no designated leader of the Taliban and their associates are given recourse to funds, arms or travel permission unless they show a commitment to international principles. The renewal, on September 17, of the UN Assistance Mission in Afghanistan's mandate is another lever. As a concerned neighbor of Afghanistan, one that could be drastically affected by an uptick in terrorism there, and a believer in the UN-led multilateral order, India still has a role in Afghan's future. While it has decided to embark on talks with the Taliban in Doha, it must continue to play that role on the world stage.

Celebrating Teacher Extraordinaire Dr. Sarvepalli Radhakrishnan

DR. SARVEPALLI RADHAKRISHNAN'S BIRTHDAY ON SEPTEMBER 5 IS CELEBRATED IN INDIA AS TEACHER'S DAY

Margaret Mead, a great American anthropologist, when she was a little girl, asked her father, who was a professor, "Father, who is a professor? He replied, "Professor is one who keeps learning, and teaches what he learned". What an extraordinary and unusual reply!

Dr. Radhakrishnan was a teacher, scholar, philosopher and humanitarian par excellence. His birthday, September 5th, is celebrated in India as Teacher's Day. I will essay to summarize Dr. Radhakrishnan's life as a teacher.

Plato's concept of philosophy king and the Indian idea of Rajarishi have striking similarities. The idea was realized in Marcus Aurelius, Janaka, Emperor Ashoka and Akbar. In modern times Dr.


Radhakrishnan exemplifies this concept. In 1964, the Pope conferred on Dr. Radhakrishnan, in a declaration, as one of the Chiefs of Golden Army of Angels.

Early life

Radhakrishnan was born on Sept 5th, 1888, in Thiruttani, a small town near Andhra Pradesh-Tamil Nadu border in a Telugu speaking family. Dr. Radhakrishnan's family background coupled with his early demonstrated aptitude for learning took him in gradual stages to school and college. During his college days at Christian College, Madras, one of his senior cousins made him a gift of his old books-Stout's psychology, Welton's Logic, and Mackenzie's Ethics. He chose


philosophy as the main subject of his studies. He later reflects "the subject of philosophy I happened to take up by sheer accident. But when I look at the series of accidents that have shaped my life, I am persuaded that there is more in this life than meets the eye. Life is not a mere chain of physical causes and effects. Chance seems to form at the surface, but deep-down other forces are at work. If the universe is a living one, if it is spiritually alive nothing in it is merely accidental. The moving finger writes and having writ moves on."

The Christian atmosphere in Madras Christian College had both a positive and negative experiences on the mind of the young Radhakrishnan. He acquainted himself with the teaching of the New Testament.

Government Arts College Rajahmundry now known as Government College (Autonomous) is on the banks of River Godavari in Rajahmundry, Andhra Pradesh. It was established as a Zilla Parishad high school in 1853 and upgraded as a Provincial school of Madras Presidency in 1868. It became a college in 1885. It was affiliated to University of Madras in 1891 and

reaffiliated to Andhra University in 1926. Dr. S. Radhakrishnan served as a professor here from 1916 to 1918.

In the memory of the great teacher, the Goutami Eye Institute, Rajahmundry, AP and the Eye Foundation of America are sponsoring free eye examination to 100 teachers in the region on September 5, 2021.

It has been said he used to give brilliant lectures, unsurpassed in brevity and clarity. According to a veracious source, Radhakrishnan in his twenties was a "bohemian and temperamental, not very disciplined and prone to occasional outbursts of anger," but in later life he became free from all these tendencies and attained serenity and equipoise. In 1912 his lectures at Presidency were published as essentials of psychology - Oxford University press.

He was such a prolific writer, that before he turned 27, he had already contributed a number of essays. His diversity of interest on such wide-ranging themes as 'Karma and Free Will', 'Nature and Convention in Greek', 'Ethics of Bhagavad-Gita and Kant', 'Bergson's Idea of God', 'Morality and Religion in Education', 'A View from India on the War I'. These appeared in journals of international repute, such as, The Monist, The Quest, Mind, Journal of Philosophy and The International Journal of Ethics. His Second essay on 'A view from India on the War I' was not allowed to be published by the censors. In 1916, Radhakrishnan was promoted as a Professor and placed in the Provincial Grade and was posted at the Government Arts College, Rajahmundry (AP). He soon became an inspiring and beloved teacher. He stayed in Rajahmundry till 1918. He later said these were the happiest and most fulfilling years of his life.

It was during this period, he worked on the manuscript

of his book "The Philosophy of Rabindranath Tagore" which was published in 1918. Describing Tagore's philosophy, he says "Tagore's supreme spirit is not an abstract entity residing at a safe distance from the world, but is the concrete, dynamic life at the center of things, giving rise to the roar of the wind and the surf of the sea...Rabindranath is a wholeness of vision which cannot tolerate any absolute divisions."

From Mysore to Calcutta

Radhakrishnan was appointed as professor of Indian Philosophy at Mysore University in 1916. It was during his Mysore days that he published a series of articles in Mind in which he often examined Bergson's philosophy, attempted to prove that he was an Absolutist and wrote his second book, 'The Reign of Religion in Contemporary Philosophy' which was

published in 1920. Examining the philosophies of thinkers like William James, Rudolf Eucken, James Ward, Leibnitz, and others. RK condemned such dominance of religion in philosophy and pleaded for the development of a philosophy in which religion is neither the basis, nor the motivating force.

At University of Calcutta, he became successor to Brajendra Nath Seal (doyen of Indian Philosophy) perplexing many. In 1923, Radhakrishnan's monumental work, Indian Philosophy Vol 1 was published. The impact of this book was tremendous. It resulted in the vivification of philosophical thought in Indian universities.

He was a Professor in a small town, big cities, Vice chancellor of Andhra University, Banares Hindu University, Spalding Professor at Oxford, Ambassador to Moscow, Vice President and President of India. One can go on and on about Dr. Sarvepalli Radhakrishnan as a great teacher and an extraordinary Philosopher and Humanitarian. It may be said of a philosopher or a scientist that "the essential in the being" of such a man lies "in what and how he thinks, not in what he does or suffers". This is what Einstein said about himself. Radhakrishnan, for inscrutable reasons, said very little about himself (Acharya Devo Bhava).

INDIAN-ORIGIN YOUTH VISHAL JOOD PLEADS GUILTY FOR ASSAULT ON SIKHS IN AUSTRALIA



A court in Australia sentenced 'Tiranga Warrior' Vishal Jood, a youth from Haryana living on an expired visa, to a prison term for attacking Sikhs in a series of violent assaults in Sydney.

SYDNEY, AUSTRALIA (TIP): A court in Australia sentenced 'Tiranga Warrior' Vishal Jood, a youth from Haryana living on an expired visa, to a prison term for attacking Sikhs in a series of violent assaults in Sydney.

Haryana Chief Minister ML Khattar, BJP leader Kapil Mishra, Olympian Yogeshwar Dutt and Delhi BJP spokesperson Tejinder Bagga have sought Jood's release.

There is also a social media campaign claiming that Jood was actually a 'Tiranga Warrior' who was trying to protect the Indian flag from being dishonored by 'Khalistanis'.

Magistrate K Thompson in a Parramatta Court on Thursday sentenced Jood, in jail since April, said Vivek Asri of NRI Affairs, Australia, who has been tracking the case.

The sentence carries six months of parole. As Jood has already spent 4 months and 17 days in jail, he could become eligible for parole on 15 October. However, his expired visa clouds the prospects of his early release, as it is likely that he will be sent to a detention center awaiting deportation.

In a plea-bargaining process, Jood pleaded guilty to three main charges. These included assault, 'occasioning actual bodily harm in company of others' and 'armed with intention to commit indictable offence'. The prosecution dropped the other charges.

Jood's lawyer, Asri, told the court that the Haryana youth comes from a place where Hindus and Sikhs co-exist 'in peace' and argued that his action was spontaneous and out of fear. There was no evidence that it was motivated because of the victim's Sikh faith, he pleaded.

The magistrate noted that it was "one of the burdens of living in the society to not to succumb to provocation".

He said that the urge to pick up an object and strike someone, especially when they are down on the ground, must be resisted. Such behavior cannot be condoned, Magistrate Thompson added, reported NRI Affairs.

He had last appeared before the court on August 12 when the court had set new hearing dates in January 2022.

Indian-origin In Canada Develops Web System to Limit Covid-19 Misinformation

TORONTO (TIP): A team led by an Indian-origin researcher in Canada has developed a new system that increases the correctness and reliability of online health-related searches by 80 per cent to help people make better decisions about topics such as COVID-19.

The team at the University of Waterloo in Canada noted that the Internet search engines are the most common tools the public uses to look for facts about COVID-19 and its effect on their health.

A proliferation of misinformation can have real consequences, so the team created a way to make these searches more reliable.

"With so much new information coming out all the time, it can be challenging for people to know what is true and what is not," said Ronak Pradeep, a PhD student in the Cheriton School of Computer Science at Waterloo and lead author of a study.

"But the consequences of misinformation can be pretty bad, like people going out and buying medicines or using home remedies that can hurt them," Mr. Pradeep said.

The researchers said even the big



search engines that host billions of searches every day cannot keep up since there has been so much scientific data and research on COVID-19 in such a short time.

"Most of the systems are trained on well-curated data, so they don't always know how to differentiate between an article promoting drinking bleach to prevent COVID-19 as opposed to real health information," Mr. Pradeep said.

"Our goal is to help people see the right articles and get the right information so they can make better decisions in general with things like COVID," he added.

Mr. Pradeep said the project aims to refine Internet search programs to promote the best health information for users.

The team has leveraged its two-stage neural re-ranking architecture for search which they augmented with a label prediction system trained to discern correct from dubious and incorrect information.

The system links with a search protocol that relies on data from the World Health Organization (WHO) and verified information as the basis for ranking, promoting and sometimes even excluding online articles.

"Our design can potentially improve consumer health search to combat misinformation, a challenge recently amplified by the COVID-19 pandemic," the authors of the study wrote.

Mr. Pradeep and other authors Xueguang Ma, Rodrigo Nogueira and Jimmy Lin, from the University of Waterloo, presented a paper on the preliminary findings of the system at SIGIR '21, a conference on research and development in information retrieval, held between July 11-15 online."

Indian-origin man sentenced to 6-month reformatory training for sexually assaulting his friend in Singapore

THE ACCUSED HARI KISHEN BALAKRISHNAN SEXUALLY ASSAULTED HIS VICTIM FOR ABOUT 17 MINUTES IN A BEDROOM OF A FRIEND'S APARTMENT

SINGAPORE (TIP): An Indian-origin man in Singapore was sentenced on Wednesday, September 1, to at least six months' reformatory training, a regimented rehabilitation programme for under 21 years who commit serious crimes, for performing sexual acts on his drunk friend.

Hari Kishen Balakrishnan, 20, had pleaded guilty earlier this year to one count each of sexual assault by penetration and making an obscene film. Another charge of molestation was taken into consideration for sentencing. He committed the offence on November 7 last year.

Balakrishnan, took seven video clips of him performing sex acts on the drunk and naked 23-year-old victim, a friend whom he had given alcohol, the Today newspaper reported.

Though he had deleted the clips of sexual acts, police later recovered them during forensic investigations, it said.

The prosecution pointed out that if Balakrishnan was sentenced as an adult offender, he could have been jailed for at least six years and subjected to caning. Offenders are given a minimum period of



reformatory training that is subject to how they respond to the rehabilitation.

District Judge May Mesenas stressed that rehabilitation was the predominant sentencing consideration for young offenders, but given the seriousness of Balakrishnan's offences, deterrence had to feature in the punishment as well.

The accused sexually assaulted his victim for about 17 minutes in a bedroom of a friend's apartment.

The victim was almost unconscious and had no strength to open her eyes or fight back, but could feel what the accused was doing, the court heard.

Balakrishnan was arrested a day after committing the offence. Police officers seized the phone that he had used to film the victim, the report said.

Adult offenders convicted of sexual assault by penetration can be jailed for up to 20 years, as well as fined or caned.

For making an obscene film, offenders can be fined between Singapore dollars 20,000 to 40,000 or jailed up to two years, or both. (Source: PTI)



Indian American Saurabh Mehta awarded endowed professorship by Cornell University

NEW YORK (TIP): Indian American researcher Saurabh Mehta is among four professors from Cornell University's College of Human Ecology who have been awarded endowed professorships for ground-breaking research and outreach in a broad range of disciplines.

Mehta, a physician and epidemiologist with expertise in nutrition, infectious disease and diagnostics, has been named the Janet and Gordon Lankton Professor in the Division of Nutritional Sciences, Ithaca, New York based private Ivy League institution announced.

The focus of Mehta's research is the interplay between nutrition, inflammation and disease during pregnancy and early childhood.

This is achieved through a combination of active surveillance programs, invention of point-of-care diagnostics and randomized controlled trials in resource-limited settings in India, Sub-Saharan Africa and South America.

Mehta is currently the principal investigator on two randomized clinical trials - one in the urban slums of Mumbai and one in rural southern India - to determine the effects of delivering nutrients such as iron and vitamin A through biofortified crops on nutrition, immune function and the gut microbiome in infants.

He is also the co-inventor of the

Cornell NutriPhone and FeverPhone, a platform funded by the National Institute of Health and the National Science Foundation that provides point-of-care diagnosis of nutritional status and infections.

This platform is field-friendly, non-invasive and inexpensive, requires minimal infrastructure or training, and yields results in as little as 15 minutes.

Amarinder Singh. The CM has warned Pannu against any attempt to disturb peace and communal harmony in the state. In a statement, the CM said any bid by the banned Sikhs for Justice (SFJ) and its self-styled general counsel to create trouble in Punjab would be countered with the full might of the government. The FIR has been registered against Pannu, his associates, and SFJ members at the state cybercrime police station, SAS Nagar.

Indian Americans hold candlelight vigil in honor of 13 US soldiers killed in Kabul attack

WASHINGTON (TIP), August 30: Mourning the loss of 13 American soldiers in a terrorist attack in Kabul last week, Indian-Americans held candlelight peace vigils in various cities across the country and urged the Biden administration to ensure that the perpetrators of the act are brought to justice.

A small group of about 20 Indian Americans gathered at the reflecting pond in front of the US Capitol for a candlelight vigil for US service members killed in the suicide attack at the Kabul airport.

"We have gathered here to mourn the loss of our fallen soldiers in Kabul. This is a heinous act of terrorism. Coming from India, which has been a victim of terrorism, we urge the US government to take strong action against all those involved in terrorism," community activist Adapa Prasad said.

"The Indian American community stands with the families of the fallen soldiers in Afghanistan, who made the supreme sacrifice for the country in the

line of duty. They will never be forgotten", Achalesh Amar, long-time community member and activist, said.

Several people were holding flowers, placards, flags and pictures of the fallen members in Houston, Texas. A few members of the Afghan-American community also joined the vigil.

Local veteran groups have also responded to the passing of Texas fallen soldier David Lee Espinoza. The local chapter of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, whose members have fought in international conflicts like Afghanistan and elsewhere, said they offered their condolences and wishes to the family during this difficult time.

Texas Governor Greg Abbott on Friday had ordered all flags on state property lowered to half-staff to honor Espinoza, 20, and other military members killed in the Kabul attack.

Defendant sentenced to 15 Years in Prison after pleading guilty to Manslaughter for killing alleged rival

QUEENS, NY (TIP): Queens District Attorney Melinda Katz announced today that Chaz Reyes, 31, has been sentenced to 15 years in prison for the July 2017 shooting death of a 26-year-old man near a 21st Street bus stop in the vicinity of the Ravenswood Houses in Astoria, Queens.

District Attorney Katz said, "In pleading guilty, the defendant has admitted to killing a perceived rival when the victim happened to pass by him on a bicycle in broad daylight. Without regard for human life, the defendant fired multiple shots at the victim, who was near a bus stop and various businesses, in the middle of the day. The victim was killed, but anyone in the area

could have also been shot. The defendant has now been sentenced by the Court for his actions."

Reyes, of 36th Avenue in Long Island City, Queens, pleaded guilty on May 27, 2021, to manslaughter in the first degree before Queens Supreme Court Justice Kenneth Holder. Today, Justice Holder sentenced the Reyes to 15 years in prison, to be followed by five years' post release supervision.

District Attorney Katz said, according to court records, on July 16, 2017, at approximately noon, Reyes was walking near a bus stop at the intersection of 36th Avenue and 21st Street in Astoria, Queens, when he encountered Tyrell Smith. The victim was riding a bike at

the time. Reyes - armed with an illegal gun - fired multiple shots in Mr. Smith's direction. Three bullets ripped into the victim's chest. The defendant ran from the scene and into a nearby apartment building.

Mr. Smith was taken to a local hospital where he died from the injuries.

INDIA MADE ITS UNSC
PRESIDENCY COUNT

Focused on maritime security, peacekeeping and counterterrorism during its presidency of the UN Security Council in August

"Undoubtedly, it was the pandemic-induced virtual mode that allowed the Prime Minister to participate in the session. It is significant that background diplomacy couched the presidential statement under "Maintenance of international peace and security", which covered references to UNCLOS (United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea) despite Chinese objections. The ASEAN countries, currently represented by Vietnam in the UNSC, must be grateful for keeping this reference as they deal with China over a code of conduct in the South China Sea. China is not fond of the UNCLOS. The USA has not ratified it yet."

India held the month-long presidency of the United Nations Security Council (UNSC) during August. During the two-year term (2021-22), India will again have the opportunity to preside over the Security Council in December 2022.

Three initiatives were taken during India's presidency. These related to maritime security, UN peacekeeping and counterterrorism. This set agenda was effectively presented by India, as these are critical to the country's current policies.

Maritime security is a major issue, especially in the Indo-Pacific. The aggressive moves by China have led to the evolution of Indo-Pacific policies by several countries and the consolidation of the Quad. Keeping a rule-based order and preventing a hegemonistic role for China are critical for India's continuing rise. For this end, maritime security was indeed a wise move to focus the attention of the UNSC.

This was effectively communicated by the unique manner of having the Prime Minister himself chair the Security Council at that session. Never before has an Indian Prime Minister undertaken this role. It showed the seriousness with which India treated this at the UNSC, and the lead it intended to take. Thanks to the Prime Minister's participation, leaders like Russian President Putin, President Kenyatta of Kenya, the PM of Vietnam and the US Secretary of State, French Foreign Minister and the UK Defense Secretary also participated. It gave 'Enhancing maritime security' a much higher profile than it would have acquired otherwise.

Undoubtedly, it was the pandemic-induced virtual mode that allowed the Prime Minister to participate in the session. It is unlikely that had the virtual opportunity not existed, the Prime Minister would have

flown to New York to chair the session. It is significant that background diplomacy couched the presidential statement under "Maintenance of international peace and security", which covered references to UNCLOS (United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea) despite Chinese objections. The ASEAN countries, currently represented by Vietnam in the UNSC, must be grateful for keeping this reference as they deal with China over a code of conduct in the South China Sea. China is not fond of the UNCLOS. The USA has not ratified it yet.

A second initiative related to peacekeeping. India's credentials for a larger role in the world, and a permanent seat in the UNSC were initially buttressed by its superb role in peacekeeping since its inception. For many years, India was the leading troop-contributing country, and remains an important one. Now, India has been a member of the Peacebuilding Commission from its inception in 2005. The session to discuss peacekeeping operations (PKO) was chaired by the External Affairs Minister (EAM) S Jaishankar, who specially flew to New York for this purpose.

Prior to this, India announced a contribution of \$1 million for supporting the African Union Mission in Somalia (AMISOM). Many recall that in the 1990s, India was a major contributor to the UN Mission in Somalia. India contributed \$150,000 to the Peacebuilding Fund (PBF) this year, bringing the total to about \$6 million since its inception.

India's initiative on peacekeeping operations focused on 'Protecting the protectors. A resolution on 'Accountability of crimes against UN peacekeepers' and the first ever presidential statement on 'Technology for peacekeeping' were achieved.

The third initiative related to counterterrorism. There is no doubt about the validity of this issue. India has consistently been talking about it in bilateral and plurilateral meetings. India has endeavored to focus the attention of the world community on countering terror effectively, the role of Pakistan, and the emerging situation in Afghanistan which are a deep cause of concern. They are not ameliorated by sufficient action by the international community. Hence, the focus on counterterrorism by India was well thought out and constructive. The EAM spoke about the situation in Kabul, adding to the importance of the issue. Holding the Taliban accountable was the focus of the resolution

but due to the changed situation in Kabul, the reference to Taliban was omitted. Russia and China abstained from the resolution but it shows that the other powers too are ready to accommodate the Taliban and that is what India is cautious about.

The UNSC agenda is not solely decided by the president for the month. Therefore, if India could achieve its three major initiatives and put them on the agenda for discussion, it should be considered a sign of success for Indian diplomacy. A pat to the Permanent Mission of India in New York is recommended.

Obtaining agenda approval in a period of dynamic flux in international politics is by itself an achievement. Separately, India had to grapple with issues concerning Myanmar, Ethiopia, Mali and Sudan and the sudden turn of events in Afghanistan, where a calibrated US withdrawal by August 31 would have brought Afghanistan on the agenda in September. But the sudden takeover of Kabul by the Taliban brought the Afghanistan issue into prominence earlier than expected. The UNSC session on Afghanistan was chaired by Foreign Secretary Harsh Shringla on the last day of the Indian presidency.

With Russia and China abstaining, a pattern emerged. Both were consistently voting together. India on occasion, say while discussing Africa, particularly Ethiopia, stood with Russia and China to avoid intrusive efforts by the UNSC. Ethiopia was very admiring of the balanced role of India.

During August, four presidential statements were issued on PKO - peace consolidation in West Africa, maintenance of international peace and security, Sudan and South Sudan. In no month this year were so many issues raised by any presidency. Four resolutions were adopted on Somalia, Middle East, Mali and PKO. Some of the themes were also covered during India's presidency of the UNSC in 2011-12 when Hardeep Puri was the Indian Permanent Representative to the UN. This shows that the UNSC is not successful in resolving issues. Its reform needs attention.

During the two years in the UNSC, the presidency gives an opportunity for focusing on critical issues beyond the regular work of the Security Council. Such special efforts draw attention to India's role and interests. India has grasped the opportunity well and brought public visibility to issues of importance.

The themes set by India for its term on the UNSC included the 5S approach with Samman (respect), Samvad (dialogue), Sahyog (cooperation), Shanti (peace) and Samridhhi (prosperity). For this, India would stand with multilateralism, rule of law and a fair and equitable international system. Most of these objectives were highlighted through the month of the Indian presidency of the UNSC.

India must commit to net zero emissions

THE COUNTRY WILL NEED TO TAKE A STAND ON CLIMATE CHANGE ACTION OR RISK BEING CAST GLOBALLY AS AN OUTLIER

"The transition of the global economy to net zero emissions is the biggest commercial opportunity in history. In just the energy sector alone, an estimated \$1.6 to \$3.8 trillion of investment is required every year until 2050. China gets this, which is why it is investing heavily in gaining an advantage in the technologies of the new economy, be it renewable energy and storage, electric and hydrogen transport, low emissions industry, green cities or sustainable agriculture. India needs to be riding this wave."

India is at the risk of being cast globally as an outlier on climate action, with a negative fallout. With over 50% of the global economy already committed to net zero emissions by 2050 - and China committing to be so before 2060 - this is not where you want to be.

The pace and scale of climate action is only set to increase, with the recent Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) report unequivocal on the need for urgent and stronger responses. Events around the world underline the point - towns washed away in Germany, subways turned into storm water drains in China, forests fried in the United States and so many more lives lost to flooding in India.

Massive opportunities

It is not only governments that are increasing climate action. The business world is too, not just to protect themselves against the risks of climate change but also to take advantage of the massive opportunities arising as the global economy shifts to net zero emissions. Last year, investors injected over \$500 billion into climate transition. In my country, Australia, the number of major companies that have put in place a target of reaching net zero emissions by 2050 has more than trebled in the past year.

The United Nations Climate Change Conference (COP26) in November in

Glasgow is shaping up to be the most important climate meeting since the Paris Agreement in 2015. It is squarely focused on supercharging global ambition and action on climate change, as all countries, including India, agreed to do in the historic Paris Agreement.

Over 100 countries have already committed to net zero emissions by 2050, with more expected at COP26. Two key holdouts are India and Australia. In the case of my country, under mounting pressure at home and internationally, the government is moving toward such an announcement and I am confident they will do so by or at COP26.

I am not so confident about India. From what I hear through networks from my time as the Australian High Commissioner to India and as Australia's Ambassador for the Environment, India is resolutely not committing to net zero by 2050, including on the basis that as a developing country, it needs to see significant support from developed countries for climate action as part of making any such commitment.

Perhaps this is negotiating tactics. Either way, I fear India may shoot itself in the foot by resisting net zero by 2050.

First, India itself has a national interest in ambitious global and national climate action. Like Australia, it is among the most vulnerable countries to climate change and, therefore, should be among the more active against the threats. India faces harmful impacts related to sea level rise, heat stress, drought, water stress and flooding, biodiversity and natural disasters. Climate change is not coming - it is here.

Second, as a rising power, India naturally seeks stronger influence globally. Being an outlier on the global challenge facing our generation does not support this aim. India is already the third largest emitter in the world and is set to be the largest as the United States, China, and the European Union are all now signed up to net zero.

This will become a significant drag on India's international diplomacy. This applies not just to key relationships like with the U.S., where President Joe Biden's administration is mainstreaming climate action into its economic, foreign and security policy, but also with much of the Group of 77 (G77) states, who are increasingly concerned to see climate action, and in

multilateral groupings such as the United Nations and ASEAN-APEC.

Finally, as the famous phrase goes, "it's the economy, stupid". There is no longer a trade-off between reducing emissions and economic growth. For example, the U.K. has reduced emissions over 40% and grown its economy over 70% since 1990. Solar energy costs have fallen 90% in recent years, providing the cheapest electricity in India ever seen. Also, given the negative impacts, addressing climate change in India's economic development is now central to success, not an added luxury to consider. For example, agricultural policy that does not consider adaptive approaches to maximize productivity in the face of increased flooding and drought due to climate change is derelict.

The report also said that if climate change is addressed and acted upon boldly and rapidly in the next decade, average global temperature rises can be limited to around 1.5° Celsius by 2050.

The transition of the global economy to net zero emissions is the biggest commercial opportunity in history. In just the energy sector alone, an estimated \$1.6 to \$3.8 trillion of investment is required every year until 2050. China gets this, which is why it is investing heavily in gaining an advantage in the technologies of the new economy, be it renewable energy and storage, electric and hydrogen transport, low emissions industry, green cities or sustainable agriculture. India needs to be riding this wave.

It is not as if India is at a standing start. It is set to significantly exceed its Paris Agreement commitment of reducing the emissions intensity of its GDP by 33-35% below 2005 levels by 2030, providing ready room for higher ambition. India is impressing the world with its leading roll-out of renewable energy and target for 450GW by 2030, linked to its leadership on the International Solar Alliance and recent national hydrogen strategy. Indian corporates are also stepping up, with the Tata Group winning awards on sustainability, Mahindra committing to net zero by 2040 and Reliance by 2035. There is plenty on which to build.

build alone. India's national interests on climate action are now engaged in ways that go significantly beyond waiting for donor support to drive ambition, notwithstanding reasonable arguments about historical responsibility, per capita emissions and equity. With growing wealth and stature, India is increasingly disinclined toward handouts. But that does not mean well-targeted donor investments and international partnerships should not be a factor in raising India's climate ambition. In fact, they should be, as it is more and more obvious that the world needs to work together for success.

This could come in many guises, from stronger political engagement and dialogue to policy support in areas of mutual challenge such as energy policy, carbon markets and post-COVID green economic recovery. Practical support and cooperation in areas like rolling out renewable energy and integrating it with the national grid, zero emissions transport, decarbonizing hard to abate sectors like steel, cement and chemicals and decarbonizing agriculture offer significant scope to raise ambition. As does working with India on innovative green financing for decarbonizing investments, including using donor support to mobilize private sector finance, green bonds and climate transition funds. Whichever it is, they need to be lasting partnerships that deliver results.

Yet, in the end, India's tryst with destiny rests in its own remarkable hands, as it always has been. In a land where the earth is called mother, and Mahatma Gandhi, major religions and the Constitution enshrine environmental care, commitment to net zero emissions by 2050 should almost be foretold. SUBVERSION OF TRUTH

CENTRAL AGENCIES AND POLICE BEING MISUSED TO REDRAW POLITICAL EQUATIONS

"The spectacle of leaders being arraigned for crimes when they are in the Opposition and getting let off when they cross over is making a mockery of the rule of law. Truth, which is, and should be, indivisible, simply does not matter. Police officers told to catch criminals now need a total revamp of what they are taught during their training. They have to simply know the political colorations of the accused to decide whether they are guilty or innocent. The truth is not relevant. The problem arises when the chameleon changes color once too often. Rewriting papers is not easy. It is a crime in itself. Only the culprits now will be the law-keepers."

Last week the police in Maharashtra was tasked with arresting a union minister, who was once the chief minister of the state. The Police Superintendent of Ratnagiri district was embarrassed to perform the task. A video released by the Opposition shows him arguing with Anil Parab, the state Transport Minister and a confidant of CM Uddhav Thackeray, pleading for a warrant for the arrest. The ongoing tussle between the BJP government at the Centre and the MVA government in Maharashtra is taking a predestined turn. The ED opened an inquiry against Parab soon after he was heard 'ordering' the Superintendent to arrest Narayan Rane. This tit-for-tat scenario will persist as long as the MVA government lasts.

The Central investigation agencies and the Maharashtra Police will be roped in to settle political scores and redraw political equations. Is this what they are paid and trained to do? People should ask pointed questions and insist on answers. Unleashing the CBI, the NIA and the ED on its political opponents at opportune times has become standard practice today. This trend has become particularly prominent since the past two years. Last week, Kripa Shankar Singh, a former minister in the Congress regime in Maharashtra, and the Congress face in Mumbai's northern suburbs where North Indians live, joined the BJP. Kripa Shankar had several Central agency inquiries pending against him. It is commonly known that he will be absolved of his sins now and the MVA, which includes the Congress, may ferret out commissions and omissions that it had failed to notice when he adorned its ranks.

The spectacle of leaders being arraigned for crimes when they are in the Opposition and getting let off when they cross over is making a mockery of the rule of law. Truth, which is, and should be, indivisible, simply does not matter. Police officers told to catch criminals now need a total revamp of what they are taught during their training. guilty or innocent. The truth is not relevant. The problem arises when the chameleon changes color once too often. Rewriting papers is not easy. It is a crime in itself. Only the culprits now will be the law-keepers.

Remember what the CBI did to the case against Suvendu Adhikari and the four other TMC ministers/legislators who were caught on camera accepting small-time bribes? Adhikari was accused of accepting Rs 5 lakh, his associates Rs 1 lakh each. But the CBI put up a charge sheet only against those who took Rs 1 lakh and left out Adhikari because he had joined the BJP. In West Bengal, the CBI and the state police have been searching for two different sets of culprits for the same offence. We will soon be saddled with policemen who know not the meaning of the word 'truth!' The Delhi Police have approached the investigation of the Delhi riots with that mindset.

Many years ago, when I was a DCP and the eastern suburbs of Mumbai City were in my charge, there was a street gang called the Harya-Narya gang in the limits of Chembur Police Station. The gang was named after its two leaders, Hanmantrao and Narayan. It was only after I had retired from service and returned to the city that a retired junior official who had worked at Chembur Police Station during my DCP days phoned to tell me that 'Narya' of the Harya-Narya gang had become the chief minister of Maharashtra!

Rane, who has survived in politics by changing parties every few years, is now in the BJP. After a patient wait, he finally got his opening. Modi made him a cabinet minister in charge of micro, small and medium enterprises. And it was only when he attained this exalted position that he was finally taken into custody by the police of his parent state. Till then, as it now appears, he did not merit such attention.

The present charge against him though is a trivial one from the public's viewpoint, and mine. From the current CM's viewpoint, it is very serious! And the CM's viewpoint is shared by his cronies in the Shiv Sena party, particularly the transport minister. For Narayan Rane had pointed out that Uddhav Thackeray had

committed a gaffe, an unpardonable one, in his August 15 speech to the people of the state, where he referred to the 75th anniversary of Independence (Amrut) as the 60th (Hirak). Quickly realizing his mistake, the CM turned to whisper to his aide standing behind him. Rane, during his ongoing Jan Ashirvad yatra that every newly inducted NDA Minister was tasked to perform in his own constituency, referred to the gaffe and said if he was the aide or if he was present at the spot he would have administered Uddhav a tight slap.

The CM, who was conducting his office very well till then, apparently felt the sting of the verbal slap. Why he blundered on this occasion is beyond comprehension. He had much to lose by losing his cool. Rane, on the other hand, was attempting to make a comeback after years in the wilderness.

The BJP's principal opponent in the state, the Shiv Sena, originally its partner and friend, has given it a break that it may not have anticipated. If the events are closely examined, the BJP's top brass will realize that Rane's street-fighting credentials have given them an unexpected, albeit significant, victory in what can only be called a street skirmish.

Rane has suddenly come into reckoning as a person of interest. His yatra would have passed off unnoticed. But with Rane accused of something as banal as a virtual slap, it was unwise of Uddhav and his cronies to order the police to arrest Rane, thereby anointing him with an importance that he had not savored for long.

The BJP, with its control over agencies like the CBI, ED, NIA and NCB, routinely released them on the state in politically sensitive cases like the Sushant Singh Rajput suicide and the explosive-laden SUV outside the Ambani residence in an all-out bid to topple the MVA in Maharashtra. Success has evaded it till now. Rane's arrest may give it a much-needed break.

But in the race for power the competing politicians are destroying the very sanctity of truth on the basis of which alone justice has to be delivered.

US committed to safe passage for last 100-200 Americans left in Afghanistan: Biden

WASHINGTON (TIP): The White House on Tuesday, August 31, said 98% of Americans who wanted to leave Afghanistan were able to do so, and President Joe Biden affirmed that the United States remained committed to helping the remaining 100 to 200 US citizens who had some intention to leave. Speaking at the White House, Biden told reporters that most of those people were dual citizens and longtime residents, who had earlier decided to stay in the country given their family roots in Afghanistan.

"For those remaining Americans there is no deadline. We remain committed to get them out if they want to come out," Biden said.

In his remarks, he noted that 90% of Americans who were in Afghanistan and wanted to leave were able to leave. The White House later updated a transcript of his remarks to show that the correct figure was 98%.

He told US Secretary of State Antony Blinken was leading continued diplomatic efforts to ensure safe passage for any American, Afghan partner or foreign national who wanted to leave Afghanistan after the August 15 takeover by the Islamist Taliban.

"The Taliban has made public commitments, broadcast on television and radio across Afghanistan, on safe passage for anyone wanting to leave, including those who worked alongside Americans," he said. "We don't take them by their word alone, but by their actions, and we have leverage to make sure those commitments are met."

Biden said the US government had reached out 19 times to Americans in Afghanistan since March, offering to help them leave the country.

After the US military-led evacuations began 17 days ago, US officials reached out again and identified around 5,000 Americans who had decided earlier to stay, but now wanted to leave, he said.

In the end, the President said, more than 5,500 Americans evacuated, along with thousands of citizens & diplomats from allied countries, as well as 2,500 locally employed staff at the US embassy and their families, and thousands of Afghan translators and interpreters and others who supported the United States.

Labor Day: A day for workers

Labor Day, falling on first Monday of September, is a Federal Holiday in the US

Labor Day pays tribute to the contributions and achievements of American workers and is traditionally observed on the first Monday in September. It was created by the labor movement in the late 19th century and became a federal holiday in 1894. Labor Day weekend also symbolizes the end of summer for many Americans, and is celebrated with parties, street parades and athletic events.

Labor Day, an annual celebration of workers and their achievements, originated during one of American labor history's most dismal chapters.

In the late 1800s, at the height of the Industrial Revolution in the United States, the average American worked 12-hour days and seven-day weeks in order to eke out a basic living. Despite restrictions in some states, children as young as 5 or 6 toiled in mills, factories and mines across the country, earning a fraction of their adult counterparts' wages.

People of all ages, particularly the very poor and recent immigrants, often faced extremely unsafe working conditions, with insufficient access to fresh air, sanitary facilities and breaks.

As manufacturing increasingly supplanted agriculture as the wellspring of American employment, labor unions, which had first appeared in the late 18th century, grew more prominent and vocal. They began organizing strikes and rallies to protest poor conditions and compel employers to renegotiate hours and pay.

Many of these events turned violent during this period, including the infamous Haymarket Riot of 1886, in which several Chicago policemen and workers were killed. Others gave rise to longstanding traditions: On September 5, 1882, 10,000 workers took unpaid time off to march from City Hall to Union Square in New York City, holding the first Labor Day parade in U.S. history.

The idea of a "workingmen's holiday," celebrated on the first Monday in September, caught on in other industrial centers across the country, and many states passed legislation recognizing it. Congress would not legalize the holiday until 12 years later, when a watershed moment in American labor history brought workers' rights squarely into the public's view. On May 11, 1894, employees of the Pullman Palace Car Company in Chicago went on strike to protest wage cuts and the firing of union representatives.

On June 26, the American Railroad Union, led by Eugene V. Debs, called for a boycott of all Pullman railway cars, crippling railroad traffic nationwide. To break the Pullman strike, the federal government dispatched troops to Chicago, unleashing a wave of riots that resulted in the deaths of more than a dozen workers.

Who Created Labor Day?

In the wake of this massive unrest and in an attempt to repair ties with American workers, Congress passed an



act making Labor Day a legal holiday in the District of Columbia and the territories. On June 28, 1894, President Grover Cleveland signed it into law. More than a century later, the true founder of Labor Day has yet to be identified.

Many credit Peter J. McGuire, cofounder of the American Federation of Labor, while others have suggested that Matthew Maguire, a secretary of the Central Labor Union, first proposed the holiday.

Labor Day Celebrations

Labor Day is still celebrated in cities and towns across the United States with parades, picnics, barbecues, fireworks displays and other public gatherings. For many Americans, particularly children and young adults, it represents the end of the summer and the start of the back-to-school season.

A Nationwide Holiday

Many Americans celebrate Labor Day with parades, picnics and parties – festivities very similar to those outlined by the first proposal for a holiday, which suggested that the day should be observed with – a street parade to exhibit "the strength and esprit de corps of the trade and labor organizations" of the community, followed by a festival for the recreation and amusement of the workers and their families. This became the pattern for the celebrations of Labor Day.

Speeches by prominent men and women were introduced later, as more emphasis was placed upon the economic and civic significance of the



holiday. Still later, by a resolution of the American Federation of Labor convention of 1909, the Sunday preceding Labor Day was adopted as Labor Sunday and dedicated to the spiritual and educational aspects of the labor movement.

American labor has raised the nation's standard of living and contributed to the greatest production the world has ever known and the labor movement has brought us closer to the realization of our traditional ideals of economic and political democracy. It is appropriate, therefore, that the nation pays tribute on Labor Day to the creator of so much of the nation's strength, freedom, and leadership – the American worker.



Former Rajya Sabha MP and senior journalist Chandan Mitra passes away

Former Rajya Sabha MP and senior journalist Chandan Mitra passed away late last night in Delhi, confirmed his son Kushan Mitra. He was 65.

Mitra was a nominated member of the Rajya Sabha from August 2003 to 2009. In June 2010, BJP got him elected to the upper house from Madhya Pradesh. His term ended in 2016. He was a close aide of party veteran L K Advani, but was sidelined by the Narendra Modi-Amit Shah leadership.

In July 2018, Mitra, Editor and Managing Director of The Pioneer, resigned from the BJP and joined the Trinamool Congress (TMC).

Prime Minister Narendra Modi took to Twitter to condole Mitra's demise. "Shri Chandan Mitra Ji will be remembered for his intellect and insights. He distinguished himself in the world of media as well as politics. Anguished by his demise. Condolences to his family and admirers. Om Shanti," the prime minister tweeted.

Senior BJP leader Ram Madhav also expressed his condolences: "Very sorry to hear about the demise of former MP and senior journalist Sh Chandan Mitra. He was a good friend. Served on the India Foundation Board for many years until his health forced him to withdraw from public activism. Condolences to @kushanmitra and other near and dear. Om Shanti."

India to participate in military exercise in Russia; Pakistan, China observers

A 200-strong Indian Army contingent will participate in a multi-nation military exercise in Russia from September 3 to September 16. 'Exercise ZAPAD 2021' will see the participation of a dozen nations, including Pakistan and China, who are participating as observers.

In a statement, the Army said that ZAPAD 2021 is "one of the theatre level exercises of the Russian Armed Forces and will focus primarily on operations against terrorists". The statement mentioned that over a dozen countries from the Eurasian and south Asian regions will participate.

A group of the Naga Battalion will participate, the Army said, adding that it will feature an all-arms combined task force. "The exercise aims to enhance military and strategic ties amongst the participating nations..."

India's primary concern is use of Afghan soil for terrorism, says MEA

NEW DELHI (TIP): India's main concern in Afghanistan is the use of Afghan soil for terrorism or anti-India activities and it is too early to talk of issues such as any possible recognition of the Taliban regime, the external affairs ministry said on Thursday, Sept 2.

New Delhi's position was outlined by external affairs ministry spokesperson Arindam Bagchi two days after the first officially acknowledged meeting between the Indian side and the Taliban in Doha. India is also focused on the evacuation of its nationals who are still in Afghanistan, he said.

Tuesday's meeting between India's envoy to Qatar, Deepak Mittal, and Sher Mohammed Abbas Stanekzai, head of the Taliban's political office in Doha, has given rise to questions on whether New Delhi has softened its position on the Taliban and could be considering the recognition of any new set-up created by the group in Kabul.

At a regular news briefing, Bagchi ducked all questions on whether India still perceives the Taliban as a terror group and on recognising any government formed by the group, and said: "Our main concern, one of the primary, immediate concerns is that Afghan soil should not be used for anti-Indian activities or terrorism against India. That is one of our main issues."

India's focus is not on whether the Taliban is a terror organisation, and



"the focus, let me reiterate, is that Afghan soil should not be used for terrorist activities of any kind or [for] anti-India activities and we will try to focus on that element", Bagchi said.

The Indian side has seen reports about formation of a government by the Taliban, but has no details regarding the nature of this dispensation, Bagchi said. He said there was "no update" on any invitation being extended to India to participate in the inauguration of such a government.

Setting aside questions about recognising a Taliban government, he said, "Let's just treat the Doha meeting for what it is - it is just a meeting and I think these are still very early days."

India used the meeting in Doha as an opportunity to convey its concerns,

including evacuation of its nationals and terrorism, and "received a positive response" from the Taliban side, he added.

In response to a question on why the Taliban hadn't publicly acknowledged the Doha meeting, which was held at the group's request, and why there were no photographs of the interaction, Bagchi said: "I think it just didn't happen, it's just a meeting, it wasn't really that kind of an event where photos are taken. I don't think there's any thought behind it [that] we don't have a photo of it. I think neither side took a photo."

Bagchi side-stepped a query on whether India has a roadmap for further engagements with the Taliban by saying: "We wouldn't have done anything without giving it some thought. Let's see how things move."


Separatist patriarch, firm pro-Pak hawk on Kashmir, Syed Ali Shah Geelani dies

The patriarch of separatist politics in the Valley and hardline Hurriyat hawk, Syed Ali Shah Geelani, passed away at his residence in Srinagar late Wednesday, Sept 1, night.

A former elected legislator, the ailing 92-year-old had been under house detention for more than a decade. His death comes when both his and the moderate factions of the Hurriyat are in disarray in the wake of a crackdown by the National Investigation Agency (NIA), the abrogation of Article 370 and the downgrade of Jammu and Kashmir into two Union Territories.

Apprehensive that his funeral may attract large crowds, the security establishment has imposed restrictions across the Valley, including Internet suspension. Police sources say curfew would be imposed.

"With shock and grief, we inform



(you) that the father of revolution Syed Ali Geelani passed away tonight," tweeted Geelani's Pakistan-based representative Abdullah Geelani. "As per his will, he would be buried at the martyrs' cemetery in Srinagar. The timing of the funeral would be announced later."

However, it is unlikely that the government will allow Geelani to be buried at this cemetery.

Geelani's legacy will be that of the

hardliner who stood up to New Delhi, seeking resolution of the Kashmir dispute under the aegis of the United Nations. In fact, he was the only separatist leader to oppose Pakistan President Pervez Musharraf when the latter climbed down on Islamabad's traditional stand on Kashmir and proposed a four-point formula to resolve the Kashmir issue.

Born on September 29, 1929, at Zurmanz, a village on the banks of the Wular lake in Bandipore, Geelani rose to become the face of separatist politics.

A school teacher, he started his political career under the tutelage of Maulana Mohammad Sayeed Masoodi, a senior National Conference (NC) leader, but soon moved to Jamat-e-Islami. The socio-religious organisation stood up to the NC leadership and saw Kashmir as an "unfinished agenda" of Partition.



Bigg Boss 13 winner Sidharth Shukla dies of heart attack at 40

Bigg Boss 13 winner Sidharth Shukla died of a sudden heart attack on September 2 at Cooper Hospital, Mumbai has confirmed his death. He was 40. Hospital sources said he took some medicine before sleeping and didn't wake up. Later, the hospital confirmed that he passed away due to a heart attack. The postmortem is on at Cooper Hospital and the body will be discharged soon. He is survived by his mother and two sisters.

Sidharth Shukla died of a heart attack at the age of 40. He was brought dead to the hospital by his brother-in-law and his relatives were also there. Confirming the same a senior official from Cooper Hospital told PTI, "He was brought dead to the hospital some time ago."

No injuries were sustained on the body of actor Sidharth Shukla. The cause of the death is yet to be ascertained. A team of police is present at the Shukla's residence for investigation, Mumbai Police sources told India Today.

Rs1.5 Lakh Crore UPA-Era Oil Bonds Need To Be Repaid: Hardeep Puri

Amid fuel prices continuing to remain stubbornly high despite international rates falling, Petroleum Minister Hardeep Singh Puri on Thursday said over Rs 1.5 lakh crore of oil bonds issued by the previous UPA government remains to be paid, limiting fiscal space and restricting financial freedom of oil firms.

A day after Congress leader Rahul Gandhi launched a scathing attack on the government for raising cooking gas prices, Mr Puri took to Twitter to blame the "rampant impunity and policy paralysis" of the UPA government.

"In 'India's Lost Decade' known for rampant impunity & policy paralysis, UPA Govt saddled future govts with Oil Bonds. More than Rs 1.5 lakh cr of these remain to be repaid, thus tying up crucial resources, limiting fiscal space & restricting financial freedom of OMCs," he tweeted.

Only fully vaccinated people should gather, says govt as daily Covid cases at 2-month high

NEW DELHI (TIP): As daily new cases rose to a two-month high of 47,092 on Thursday, Sept 2, with Kerala alone accounting for 69 per cent of new cases last week, the government warned people against mass festive gatherings saying the second wave of the pandemic was not yet over.

Indian Council of Medical Research chief Balram Bhargava went to the extent of saying that while mass gatherings need to be absolutely avoided at the moment, only fully inoculated people must gather if meeting is critical.

"Mass gatherings must be discouraged. Full vaccination should be a must if holding a gathering of necessary," Bhargava said, with the Member Health NITI Aayog VK Paul asking people to celebrate upcoming festivals with families only.

Describing the threat of mutants (WHO classified a new variant of interest Mu on Wednesday) as real, Paul said mutations can devastate health systems leading to loss of current gains.

"There is no systematic strategy to deal with this expect protections of behaviour and through vaccination," the expert said.

The government, meanwhile, informed that it has expanded the basket of nations for stringent Covid controls on international travellers arriving here.

So far passengers travelling from the UK, EU and the Middle East were required to have an RTPCR negative report before taking a flight and then get a mandatory RTPCR test upon arrival in India.

"In the light of risk of mutations, we have added to the list of UK, EU and Middle East more countries including South Africa, Bangladesh, Botswana, China, Mauritius, New Zealand and Zimbabwe. International travellers from all these countries would now need RTPCR



negative reports to get on flights to India and RTPCR testing upon arrival here," Health Secretary Rajesh Bhushan said.

The government said 39 districts (in Kerala and Northeast) had over 10 per cent Covid positivity as of today and 38 had positivity rate of 5 to 10 per cent.

"Districts with over ten pc positivity need urgent containment measures. In districts with 5 to 10 per cent positivity, states must ensure surveillance," the Health Secretary said.

The government also hailed Himachal Pradesh, Sikkim and Dadra and Nagar Haveli for covering full adult population with the first dose.

Himachal has given the second dose to 32 pc adults, Sikkim to 36 per cent.

Overall, 54 per cent of India's 94 crore adults have received the first dose as of today and 16 per cent has received both doses. Government said vaccine pace was picking up with 80.27 lakh plus doses administered on the last seven days of August.

Overall in August India administered 18.38 crore doses with cumulative doses now reaching over 64 crore which is more than the population of many nations.

Section of media gives communal colour to news bringing bad name to nation, says Supreme Court

NEW DELHI (TIP): A section of media gives communal colour to news bringing bad name to the country, the Supreme Court ruled on Thursday, Sept 2, expressing serious concern over fake news on social media, including web portals and YouTube, which listen only to "the powerful voices" and not judges and institutions.

The strong observations of the bench headed by Chief Justice NV Ramana came while hearing a batch of petitions, including the one filed by Jamiat Ulema-i-Hind, seeking directions to the Centre to stop dissemination of "fake news" related to last year's religious gathering at Nizamuddin Markaz and take strict action against those responsible for it.

"The problem is, everything in this country is shown with a communal angle by a section of media. The country is going to get a bad name ultimately," said the bench, adding, "Did you (the Centre) ever attempt to regulate these private channels?"

The bench also agreed to hear after six weeks the Centre's plea seeking transfer of petitions to the apex court that are pending in high courts against the validity of new Information Technology Rules which aim to regulate online content.

Solicitor General Tushar Mehta, appearing for the Centre, said, "Not only communal but also planted news" is there and the IT Rules had been framed to regulate content online, including web portals.

Amid fear of new Covid strains, RT-PCR test compulsory for those arriving from 7 more nations

NEW DELHI (TIP): Amid fear of new Covid-19 strains, RT-PCR test is compulsory for passengers arriving from seven more countries, including South Africa, Bangladesh and China, the Centre said on Thursday, Sept 2.

In a letter to all states and Union territories (UTs), the government said considering reports of new mutations in SARS-CoV-2 and rising number of Variants of Concern (VOCs) and Variants of Interest (Vols) globally, seven countries have been added in the list of countries whose travellers will have to get another RT-PCR test done upon landing at Indian airports apart from the one they need to get before embarking on the flight.

These seven countries are South Africa, Bangladesh, Botswana, China, Mauritius, New Zealand and Zimbabwe.

In earlier guidelines issued in February, passengers from only the United Kingdom, Europe and the Middle East had to get the RT-PCR test done again upon landing at Indian airports.

The Centre also asked states/UTs to ensure strict compliance to these guidelines so that the import of Vols and VoCs to India from other countries may be prevented.


"The states/UTs must also strengthen their Whole Genome

of French scenic and lighting designer Willy Cessa.



If you aren't on your toes, someone else will grab your position: Emraan Hashmi

Bollywood star Emraan Hashmi says it is crucial for actors to constantly strive to do better as complacency can get them out of the race in the highly competitive film industry.

Hashmi, who has been in Bollywood since the early 2000s, said he has been able to do diverse work because he recognised early that only love for his craft could sustain him in the long run.

"Actors, generally, are insecure. Those who say they are not are lying. If you are not going to be on your toes, you won't be around. Someone else standing in that line, a newcomer or a peer, will grab it from you. It is that quest and struggle," Hashmi told PTI.

According to the actor, seeking fame is not the right thing to do as one should be passionate about their craft.

Seeking fame isn't the right thing to do, there has to be an inherent love for films and the filmmaking process. That's what I love, which is why I will never be complacent," Hashmi added.

The first half of Emraan Hashmi's career in the 2000s was dominated by commercial hits like Gangster, Jannat and Once Upon a Time In Mumbaai, while in the last decade he switched to dramas like Dibakar Banerjee's Shanghai, dark comedy Ghanchakkar and made his digital debut with Netflix



series Bard of Blood in 2019.

The 42-year-old actor said he aims to put himself in challenging situations, seeking roles that will "shake" him off of his comfort zone.

"The day I feel that this is giving me the feeling of been there, done that, I will kick myself, to get up and do something that scares me. I have been part of that rut where I have done films that felt like a "been there, done that" situation and it is not fun. You should constantly try to do films that scare you."

Hashmi, however, is aware that getting projects which will push him as

an actor are not easy as "luck" plays a huge role in finding the right story.

"When something is successful, people want to replicate that. Producers have a different way of looking at things, they factor in economics and I don't blame them. But as a creative person, you have to walk that fine line and maintain that balance," he added.

Emraan Hashmi is currently seen in the thriller Chehre, which released theatrically last week. Hashmi will also be seen in the remake of the hit Malayalam film Ezra, which the actor said is most likely to release in October.

Evans and Johansson are not only on-screen pals as Natasha and Steve, but they are good friends in real-life too, as apparent in interviews. They also discussed their respective projects — *Marriage Story* and *Knives Out*, respectively — and *Avengers: Endgame* on *Variety's Actors on Actors* video series. Apart from MCU, they have worked together in *The Perfect Score* (2004) and *The Nanny Diaries* (2007).

Scarlett, meanwhile, is engaged in a fierce legal battle with Disney, the owner of Marvel Studios. The bone of contention is the hybrid release (simultaneously in theatres and on Disney+) of her standalone MCU movie *Black Widow*, which, as per Scarlett, robbed her of \$50 million worth of bonuses.



Mission Impossible sues insurance company over 7 Covid shutdowns

Production on the new *Mission: Impossible* movie was shut down seven times due to the coronavirus pandemic, according to a lawsuit filed on Monday that accuses the film's insurance company of failing to pay out for all but one of the costly stoppages.

Filming on the action series starring Tom Cruise was delayed four times in Italy, and three times in the United Kingdom between February 2020 and June 2021, said the lawsuit filed by Paramount Pictures in US federal court in California.

The stoppages were caused by positive coronavirus tests among members of the cast or crew, or quarantine or lockdowns imposed in countries where the thriller was being filmed.

The lawsuit accuses Indiana-based Federal Insurance Company of breach of contract, saying it has agreed only to pay out 5 million USD for the first stoppage.

Federal Insurance did not immediately return a request for comment. Cruise, who is also a producer on the film, lost his temper on the set of *Mission: Impossible 7* in England in December over a breach in Covid protocols, threatening to fire cast and crew members who did not take them seriously.

British comedian Jack wrote: "Boom! Jungle Cruise 2: Jolly up the Thames. #Sequel #ManifestIt."

'Jungle Cruise' opened July 30 to more than \$35 million at the domestic box office and more than \$30 million in Disney+ Premier Access in its first three days, according to the studio.

JUSTIN TRUDEAU CRITICISED FOR CALLING CANADIAN ELECTION IN 4TH WAVE

MONTREAL (TIP): Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau defended his decision to call an election during the pandemic in first debate of the campaign for this month's election.

Trudeau is facing a tough re-election battle against his Conservative Party rival, Erin O'Toole. The vote is on September 20.

"Why did you trigger an election in the middle of a fourth wave?" O'Toole asked Trudeau at the French-language debate in Montreal.

Trudeau said he needs a mandate from voters. "We must give Canadians the choice," he said.

He criticised O'Toole for not requiring his candidates to be vaccinated.

O'Toole said he believes the country can find reasonable accommodations for those who are unvaccinated, like rapid testing and social distancing.

Four provinces including Quebec and Ontario, Canada's largest, are bringing in vaccine passports that require citizens to be vaccinated to enter places like restaurants and gyms.

Trudeau called the election last month seeking to win the majority of seats in Parliament but polls show that is unlikely and that he might even lose power to O'Toole and the Conservative party. AP

CHINA WELCOMES RUSSIA'S PLAN FOR 'EXTENDED TROIKA' MEETING IN KABUL

BEIJING (TIP): China on September 3 reacted positively to a Russian proposal to convene a meeting of the "Extended Troika" on Afghanistan in Kabul — the first such conference since the Taliban seized power last month.

Russia plans to convene a new meeting of the "Extended Troika" on Afghanistan in Kabul after the resumption of commercial flights, Russia's Deputy Foreign Minister Igor Morgulov was quoted as saying by the Russian news agency Sputnik.

"We believe we should contribute to urgent stabilisation jointly with other international partners," Morgulov said.

"To that end, we plan to convene a new meeting of the Extended Troika, which includes Russia, the United States, China and Pakistan, in Kabul as soon as there are conditions. I mainly refer to the resumption of the Kabul airport operation for commercial civil aviation flights," he said. — PTI

UK's Raab cites need to engage with Taliban

DOHA (TIP): British Foreign Secretary Dominic Raab said on September 2 there was a need to engage with the Taliban on Afghanistan, but Britain had no immediate plans to recognise their government.

Raab was speaking during a joint press conference with Qatari Foreign Minister Sheikh Mohammed bin Abdulrahman Al-Thani in Doha, where he visited housing for refugees evacuated from Afghanistan after the Taliban swept to power last month.

Sheikh Mohammed said Qatar was talking with the Taliban and working with Turkey for potential technical support to restart operations at Kabul airport.

"We are engaging with them (Taliban), engaging also with Turkey if they can provide any technical assistance on that front. Hopefully in the next few days there will be some good news," Sheikh Mohammed said. — Reuters



Japanese PM Suga denies reports of dissolving parliament in mid-September

TOKYO (TIP): Japanese Prime Minister Yoshihide Suga told reporters on September 1 that he had no plans to dissolve the country's lower house because of the severity of the coronavirus situation.


Domestic media reported this week that he intended to dissolve the lower house of parliament in mid-September after a cabinet and party executive reshuffle next week. Reports also said that the premier was considering holding the general election on Oct. 17.

Suga's denial of these reports comes after several days of tense negotiations and sudden twists involving Suga and the most powerful politicians in the ruling camp as the unpopular prime minister manoeuvres to stay in the top job.

"We can't dissolve the lower house in this current situation," said Suga, speaking of the severity of the coronavirus pandemic.

When asked whether that meant he would let members of the lower house of parliament serve their full terms, which end Oct. 21, Suga avoided a direct answer.

"THERE ARE NO PLANS TO PUSH BACK THE LIBERAL DEMOCRATIC PARTY LEADERSHIP ELECTION, AND WE WILL WORK AROUND THE DATES AVAILABLE FOR THE GENERAL ELECTION," HE SAID. THE LDP LEADERSHIP RACE IS SLATED TO BE HELD ON SEPT. 29.



Japanese Prime Minister Yoshihide Suga

On Tuesday, media said Suga planned to remove long-term party ally and current LDP Secretary General Toshihiro Nikai from his post. Nikai threw his backing behind Suga and helped him win the top post in the turmoil to succeed former premier Shinzo Abe last September.

But some parliamentarians have voiced their unease with the amount of power wielded by 82-year-old Nikai, who has held his post since August 2016 - the longest in the party's history.

Suga's support ratings are at record lows, as he failed to capitalise on delivering the Olympics amid a fresh wave of coronavirus infections. The government has since declared a fourth state of emergency in most of Japan.

The LDP and its allies are not expected to lose their coalition majority in the powerful lower house in the next general election, but forecasts suggest that the party could lose its outright majority, an outcome that would weaken the LDP leader. Reuters

Australia's economy slowed in Q2 ahead of lockdown downturn

SYDNEY (TIP): Australia's economy was already slowing in the June quarter before wide-spread coronavirus lockdowns slammed everything into reverse, leaving the country in a desperate race to vaccinate in the hope of opening up to recovery by Christmas.

Figures from the Australian Bureau of Statistics out on September 1 showed gross domestic product (GDP) rose 0.7% in the June quarter. That was a step down from 1.9% in the March quarter, but topped forecasts of 0.5% and avoided analysts' worst fears of a negative outcome.

Annual growth was the fastest in modern history at 9.6%, but only because the pandemic caused a severe contraction in the June quarter last year, which was dropping from the calculation.

That painful pattern was playing out again as strict stay-at-home rules in Sydney, Melbourne and Canberra are set to see the economy shrink 2-3% or more this quarter.

The conservative government of Prime Minister Scott Morrison is pinning its hopes on a vaccination roll out that is gathering steam after a ham-fisted start.

Current projections are the country could reach 70% of adults vaccinated some time in October, which would allow for a relaxation of rules. Mass lockdowns could be abandoned altogether at 80%, which is tipped for November.

"Assuming the vaccination rollout continues at its current pace it is likely the Eastern states will begin to re-open in the December quarter, and this will enable the economy to recover," said Sarah Hunter, Chief Australia Economist for BIS Oxford Economics.

"But the shift to a new COVID-normal,



where there are persistent cases within the community, will make some people cautious and the recovery this time around will be drawn out into 2022."

The Reserve Bank of Australia (RBA) has been counting on a rapid recovery once the restrictions ease, though the spread of the Delta variant has made its latest forecasts for growth look optimistic.

The central bank is now under pressure to delay a tapering of its bond buying programme planned for this month, and is not expected to raise interest rates from record lows of 0.1% until at least 2023.

The June quarter figures did show strength in consumer and government spending, housing and business investment, though much of that was offset by drags from net exports and inventories.

On the positive side, nominal GDP reached a record A\$2.07 trillion (\$1.51 trillion) for the year, making it the world's 11th largest economy. Output stood at A\$80,432 for every one of Australia's 25.6 million residents.

That outperformance owed much to super-high prices for many of the country's resource exports, which boosted its terms of trade by a massive 7.0% in the quarter and 24% for the year.

The flood of cash boosted company profits, tax receipts and employment, helping lift national incomes and so nominal GDP by a robust 3.2% in the quarter.

There was some moderation in the household savings ratio to 9.7%, but spending power has been underpinned by a boom in house prices which even seems impervious to the spread of Delta. Reuters

CAR CRASH: 90-YEAR-OLD JAPANESE GETS 5-YR JAIL

TOKYO (TIP): A Japanese court on September 2 sentenced a 90-year-old former senior government official to five years in prison for a 2019 car accident which killed a 3-year-old girl and her mother, in a high-profile case in a fast-aging country. AP

CHINA BANS 'SISSY MEN' FROM TV IN CRACKDOWN

BEIJING (TIP): China's government banned effeminate men on TV and told broadcasters on Thursday to promote "revolutionary culture", broadening a campaign to tighten control over business and society and enforce official morality. PTI

LAWYERS SEEK ICC PROBE INTO 'WAR CRIMES' IN YEMEN

THE HAGUE (TIP): Human rights lawyers representing hundreds of victims of Yemen's civil war are calling on the International Criminal Court (ICC) to open an investigation into war crimes and crimes against humanity allegedly committed by the Saudi Arabia-led coalition during the devastating conflict.

British lawyer Toby Cadman filed the request on September 1, highlighting three incidents — an August 2018 airstrike that destroyed a school bus and killed dozens; a missile attack in October 2016 that killed at least 110 people; and allegations of torture and murder of civilians being held in prisons in the south of Yemen.

The filing came a day after a missile and drone attack, blamed on the Houthi rebels, on a key military base in Yemen's south killed at least 30 troops.

The civil war in Yemen erupted in 2014, when the Iranian-backed Houthis swept across much of the north and seized the capital, Sanaa, forcing the internationally recognised government into exile. The Saudi-led coalition entered the war the following year on the side of the government. All sides are accused of atrocities in the years-long conflict.

Lawyer Almudena Bernabeu, representing victims of the school bus attack, said the coalition said it would investigate the deadly strike and bring those responsible to justice.

"Of course, they did no such thing," Bernabeu said in a statement. "As the court of last resort, victims and families have no choice, but to call on the International Criminal Court to ensure justice is done." A spokesman for the Saudi-led coalition did not respond to phone calls seeking comment. — AP

Fighting in Syria kills 4 soldiers

BEIRUT (TIP): The Syrian government forces shelled rebel-held parts of a volatile southern city September 1 killing at least one person, while insurgents killed four soldiers after Russia-brokered talks to end the presence of opposition fighters in the area collapsed.

Syria's state media reported that government forces retaliated against fire by opposition fighters inside the city of Daraa and that attacks on army checkpoints in the city left four soldiers dead and 15 wounded.

It said several civilians were wounded in insurgent shelling of government-held parts of Daraa.

The opposition blamed the government for the escalation, saying that troops were pressing an offensive to force insurgents to surrender.

The Britain-based Syrian Observatory for Human Rights, an



opposition war monitor, said the government's elite 4th Division and pro-government gunmen tried to storm the rebel-held old quarter of Daraa

known as Daraa al-Balad. At least one person was killed and another wounded in shelling on Daraa al-Balad. — AP

EFFORTS ON TO EVACUATE GIRLS' SOCCER TEAM FROM AFGHANISTAN

KABUL (TIP): They move from place to place at a moment's notice in a desperate bid to evade the Taliban — girls whose lives are in danger simply because they chose to play a sport they loved.

An international effort to evacuate members of the Afghanistan national girls' soccer team, along with their family members and soccer federation staff, suffered a crushing setback last week after a suicide bombing at the Kabul airport killed 169 Afghans and 13 US service members during a harrowing airlift. Frightened and desperate, the girls now worry whether a far-flung coalition of former US military and Intelligence officials, Congressmen, US allies, humanitarian groups and the captain of the Afghanistan women's national team can get them and their loved ones to safety. TNS

2 TEENAGE GIRLS GANG-RAPED BY 7 MEN IN LAHORE

LAHORE (TIP): Two teenage girls were allegedly gang-raped by seven men in Lahore, sparking outrage over increase in sexual assault cases in Pakistan's Punjab province.

The Opposition has demanded resignation of Punjab Chief Minister Usman Buzdar for his failure to control sexual assault on women in the province of 110-million.

According to the FIR, two female cousins — aged 18 and 16 — had gone from their residence in Shahdara to Fazal Park in the city on a rickshaw on September 1 evening to pick clothes from the house of a customer for sewing. "On their way, some men abducted the girls at gunpoint and took them to a nearby area of a factory and drugged them. The culprits raped the girls throughout the night and fled in the morning," the FIR says.

The girls called on police emergency number and narrated their ordeal.

On the statements of the victims, Lahore police claim to have arrested all seven suspected rapists including the factory owner. They have been booked under various sections of the Pakistan Penal Code.


Meanwhile, police are conducting the medico-legal of the victims.

Punjab has witnessed an increase in the number of women assault incidents in recent weeks.

The sexual assault of a YouTuber girl on August 14 at the historic Minar-i-Pakistan sparked nationwide outrage and drew international condemnation.

Police had registered a case on Tuesday against 400 unidentified men for assaulting the girl and her companions. Police have arrested 160 suspects so far in this case after identifying them through video footages. PTI

Pakistani flag to fly at half mast to mourn Geelani's death



ISLAMABAD (TIP): Pakistan will mourn the passing away of the separatist leader Syed Ali Shah Geelani by flying the flag at half mast and will also observe a day of official mourning.

"Deeply saddened to learn of the passing of Kashmiri freedom fighter Syed Ali Geelani who struggled all his life for his people & their right to self determination. He suffered incarceration & torture by the occupying Indian state but remained resolute," Prime Minister Imran Khan said in a tweet.

"We in Pakistan salute his courageous struggle & remember his words: 'Hum Pakistani hain aur Pakistan Humara hai'. The Pakistan flag will fly at half mast and we will observe a day of official mourning," Khan said in another tweet.

Sri Lanka's Supreme Court sets up 3-member bench for 2019 Easter attack trial

COLOMBO (TIP): Sri Lanka's Supreme Court on September 1 appointed a three-member Bench to hear the cases filed against the suspects in connection with the 2019 Easter suicide attack in which over 270 people, including 11 Indians, were killed.

Lankan police had filed 23,270 charges against 35 people last month in the case. The charges filed under the Prevention of Terrorism Act include conspiring to murder, aiding and abetting, collecting arms and ammunition, and attempted murder.

Colombo High Court Judge Damith Thotawatte will chair the three-judge Bench, while Judges Amal Ranaraja and Navaratne Marasinghe have been appointed as members of the judiciary panel.

The setting up of the special Trial-at-Bar at the Colombo High Court came following a request from Attorney General Sanjay Rajaratnam to Chief Justice Jayantha Jayasuriya last month.

Nine suicide bombers, belonging to local Islamist extremist group National Thawheed Jamaat (NTJ) linked to ISIS, carried out a series of blasts that tore through three churches and as many luxury hotels in Sri Lanka, killing over 270 people and injuring more than 500 people on April 21, 2019.

The Buddhist-majority nation was about to mark a decade since ending a 37-year-long Tamil separatist war in May 2009 when the bombings in 2019 rocked the country.

The attacks caused a political storm as the then government headed by President Maithripala Sirisena and Prime Minister Ranil Wickremesinghe was blamed for its inability to prevent the deadly attacks despite the prior intelligence made available on the



impending terror strikes.

The Catholic Church has also expressed its dissatisfaction over the ongoing investigations, which they alleged was an attempt for a cover up.

The church has been demanding justice for the victims, asserting that no action has been taken against Sirisena and Wickremesinghe, despite a commission of inquiry finding both of them culpable for their failures to prevent the attack.

The government maintains that investigations are proceeding. Lankan police have arrested hundreds of suspects in connection with the suicide bombings.

During his election campaign in November 2019, President Gotabaya Rajapaksa had pledged to conduct a

thorough investigation into the attacks and bring the culprits to book.

During his tenure, Sirisena had formed a presidential panel to probe the attacks.

In its report, the panel said former President Sirisena and a host of other top defence officials, including former defence secretaries, former IGPs and intelligence chiefs, were guilty of ignoring prior intelligence. The panel report recommended criminal action against them.

Both the then-police chief and the top defence bureaucrat were sacked and arrested for their inaction to prevent the attacks.

Then Prime Minister Wickremesinghe was also blamed for turning a blind eye to the rising Islamic militancy. It was cited as an encouragement to the extremists. Both have denied responsibility. PTI

SEPTEMBER 3, 1783 - The Treaty of Paris was signed by John Adams, Ben Franklin and John Jay, formally ending the American Revolutionary War between Britain and the United States.

SEPTEMBER 3, 1833 - The New York Sun newspaper first appeared, marking the beginning of the 'penny press,' inexpensive newspapers sold on sidewalks by newspaper boys. The paper focused on human interest stories and sensationalism and by 1836 was the largest seller in America with a circulation of 30,000.



Frederick Douglass

SEPTEMBER 3, 1838 - Anti-slavery leader Frederick Douglass began his escape from slavery by boarding a train in Baltimore dressed as a sailor. He rode to Wilmington, Delaware, where he caught a steamboat to the free city of Philadelphia, then took a train to New York City where he came under the protection of the Underground Railway network.

SEPTEMBER 3, 1939 - Great Britain and France declared war on Nazi Germany after its invasion of Poland two days earlier.

SEPTEMBER 3, 1943 - Italy signed an armistice with the Allies during World War II in Europe as the British Eighth Army, commanded by General Bernard Montgomery, invaded the Italian mainland from Sicily.

SEPTEMBER 4, 1609 - The island of Manhattan was discovered by navigator Henry Hudson.

SEPTEMBER 4, 1781 - Los Angeles was founded by the Spanish Governor of California, Felipe de Neve, near the site of the Native American village of Yang-na. The original name was El Pueblo de la Reina de Los Angeles (The Town of the Queen of the Angels).

BIRTHDAY - Austrian composer Anton Bruckner (1824-1896) was born in Ansfelden, Austria. Best known for his monumental ten symphonies.

SEPTEMBER 5, 1774 - The First Continental Congress assembled in Philadelphia with 56 delegates, representing every colony, except Georgia. Attendants included Patrick Henry, George Washington, Sam Adams and John Hancock.

SEPTEMBER 5-6, 1972 - Eleven members of the Israeli Olympic Team were killed during an attack on the Olympic Village in Munich by members of the Black September faction of the Palestinian Liberation Army. Israeli jets then bombed Palestinian positions in Lebanon and Syria in retaliation on September 8, 1972.

SEPTEMBER 5, 1975 - The first of two September assassination attempts on President Gerald Ford occurred as a woman pointed a gun at the President in Sacramento, California. Two weeks later, a second attempt occurred as another woman fired a shot at Ford in San Francisco. Ford was not harmed in either incident.

SEPTEMBER 5, 1997 - Mother Teresa died in Calcutta at age 87, after a life of good works spent aiding the sick and poor in India through her Missionaries of Charity order.

BIRTHDAY - Wild West legend Jesse James (1847-1882) was born in Centerville, Missouri. Following the American Civil War, Jesse and his brother Frank formed a group of outlaws, robbing banks, trains, stagecoaches and stores. In 1882, after the governor of Missouri offered a \$10,000 reward for their capture dead or alive, a member of the gang shot 34-year-old Jesse in the back of the head and claimed the reward.

September 6

SEPTEMBER 6, 1991 - Leningrad was renamed Saint Petersburg by Russian legislators following the collapse of the Soviet Union. Russia's second largest city had been known as Leningrad for 67 years in honor of Vladimir Lenin, founder of the Soviet Union.



Marquis Lafayette

BIRTHDAY - Marquis de Lafayette (1757-1834) was born in Chavaniac, France (as Marie-Joseph-Paul-Yves-Roch-Gilbert du Motier). He came to America in 1777 to volunteer in the American Revolution, beginning a long friendship with George Washington. He later persuaded Louis XVI of France to send a 6,000-man force to assist the Americans. Lafayette was given command of an army in Virginia and was instrumental in forcing Cornwallis to surrender at Yorktown, leading to the American victory.

BIRTHDAY - Pioneering American social worker Jane Addams (1860-1935) was born in Cedarville, Illinois. In 1883, she toured the great European cities to study famous historic sites but was deeply moved by the hunger and misery she found among the common people. She then founded Hull House in Chicago to serve the sick and poor and managed the settlement for the next 46 years.

September 7

SEPTEMBER 7, 1822 - Brazil declared its independence from Portugal

after 322 years as a colony.

SEPTEMBER 7, 1994 - The U.S. Army closed its headquarters in Berlin, ending the American military presence in the once-divided city after nearly half a century.

SEPTEMBER 7, 1999 - For the first time since World War II, Germany's parliament, the Bundestag, returned to Berlin, former capital of Imperial Germany as well as Hitler's Reich. The Bundestag held its first session in the fully restored Reichstag building, attended by parliamentarians from around the world. The session also marked the 50th anniversary of the Bundestag's first post-war session, held in Bonn, the former capital of West Germany.



Queen Elizabeth

BIRTHDAY - Queen Elizabeth I (1533-1603) was born in Greenwich Palace. She was the daughter of King Henry VIII and Anne Boleyn. She ascended the throne in 1558 at age 25. During her reign, Britain became a world power by defeating the Spanish Armada. The Anglican Church was also fully established.

Tomato Rice



INGREDIENTS

1 cup soaked basmati rice, 2 medium chopped onion, 2 teaspoon sambhar powder, 1 handful chopped, coriander leaves, 2 tablespoon refined oil, 1/2 teaspoon garlic paste, 4 large chopped tomato, 3 medium green chilli, 1/4 teaspoon powdered turmeric, 3 pinches salt, 1/2 teaspoon ginger paste, 2 pinches red chilli powder

Method

- Wash and dry the basmati rice and soak for about 20 minutes. Take a deep pan, put it on medium flame and pour water in it. Bring it to a boil, and then add the soaked rice. Cover the pan with a lid and cook on medium flame till the rice becomes soft, but not mushy. Now remove from fire and keep it aside. Now put the chopped tomatoes in a blender and blend it properly. Transfer the puree in a bowl and keep it aside. Now heat 2 tbsp of oil in a pan and add the ingredients for seasoning (mustard, asafoetida, curry leaves, dried red chillis). Add onions and saute. Then add green chillies and ginger-garlic paste. Saute these ingredients for a minute.
- Now add the tomato puree, turmeric powder, red chilli powder, sambar powder and salt. Cook until the oil separates. Add the cooked rice to the tomato gravy and mix well. Once done, transfer the tomato rice in a serving bowl and garnish with coriander leaves. Serve hot with papads, potato chips or raita.

Higher risk of Covid complications if pregnant woman gets infected in 3rd trimester

NEW DELHI (TIP): "Pregnant women with certain high-risk conditions such as hypertension, diabetes, chronic respiratory conditions, asthma, cystic fibrosis, homozygous sickle cell disease, or those on immune suppression therapies, dialysis or advanced chronic kidney disease, congenital or acquired heart disease and organ transplant recipients have greater risk of severe illness from Covid-19," says Sumitra Bachani, Associate Professor, Gynaecologist and Obstetrician Department, Safdarjung Hospital and Vardhaman Mahavir Medical College.

She said that pregnant women with symptomatic Covid are at an increased risk of adverse pregnancy outcomes, including admission to the ICU, iatrogenic pre-term birth, pregnancy associated hypertension-like symptoms, operative intervention and even death.

Also, there is a higher risk of developing Covid complications if a pregnant woman contracts the infection in the third trimester, which is the last three months of pregnancy. That is because the large uterus presses on the diaphragm and hampers the lung capacity, thus making it more difficult for the woman to maintain oxygen saturation, she said.

On the question of infection transmission from mother to the foetus, she said that such transmission to the foetus during pregnancy is yet a matter under research. To date, we have observed that mild to moderate Covid-19 infection in mothers does not affect the fetus or the newborn much. However, in severe cases, the foetus is at risk of perinatal morbidity due to hypoxia or low oxygen saturation, pre-term birth, and mortality.

However, mother and infant can stay together in the same room if the mother does not have severe Covid-19 which requires hospitalisation. Make sure that the room is well-ventilated and there is someone else also in the family who is Covid negative to take care of the infant. A mother should wear a mask and maintain 6 feet distance from the child. However, she can breastfeed the child, adds Bachani.

Asked about Covid vaccine for pregnant women and young mothers, Bachani added that they should definitely take the vaccine.

Experts say the benefits of vaccination outweigh the risk of morbidity and mortality associated with Covid-



19, especially if contracted during pregnancy. Besides, there is an additional benefit—a vaccinated mother also passes the antibodies she develops post vaccination to the unborn foetus through blood as well as through breast milk.

However, she added that like the general population, pregnant women too should avoid taking vaccine if she has an anaphylactic or allergic reaction to the previous dose of Covid-19 vaccine or to other vaccines or injectable therapies, pharmaceutical products, food items, etc.

"If she has recently been diagnosed with Covid-19 infection, she should wait for 12 weeks from the onset of infection or 4 to 8 weeks from recovery from active Covid-19 infection for taking the vaccine" added Bachani.

Common pesticide may contribute to global obesity epidemic

TORONTO (TIP): A commonly-used pesticide could be partially responsible for the global obesity epidemic, finds a study.

Researchers from McMaster University in Canada discovered that chlorpyrifos—widely sprayed on fruits and vegetables in many parts of the world—slows down the burning of calories in the brown adipose tissue of mice.

Reducing the burning of calories, a process known as diet-induced thermogenesis, causes the body to store these extra calories and promotes obesity.

Scientists made the discovery after studying 34 commonly used pesticides and herbicides in brown fat cells and testing the effects of chlorpyrifos in mice fed high calorie diets.

The findings, published in the journal, 'Nature Communications', can have important implications for public health.

"Brown fat is the metabolic furnace in our body, burning calories, unlike normal fat that is used to store them. This generates heat and prevents calories from being deposited on our bodies as normal white fat. We know brown fat is activated during cold and when we eat," said Gregory Steinberg, Professor of medicine at McMaster.

"Lifestyle changes around diet and exercise rarely lead to sustained weight loss. We think part of the problem may be this intrinsic dialling back of the metabolic furnace by chlorpyrifos," he added.

Steinberg said chlorpyrifos would only need to inhibit energy use in brown fat by 40 calories every day to trigger obesity in adults, which would translate to an extra five lbs (pounds) of weight gain per year.

He further said that while several environmental toxins including chlorpyrifos have been linked to rising obesity rates in both humans and animals, most of these studies have attributed weight gain to increases in food intake and not the burning of calories.


Food combinations to burn fat, beat bloating and boost metabolism

Astronaut gets special ice cream delivery for 50th birthday

A space station astronaut is celebrating her 50th birthday with the coolest present ever — a supply ship bearing ice cream and other treats.

SpaceX's latest cargo delivery showed up Monday at the International Space Station after a day in transit. Overseeing the automated docking was NASA astronaut Megan McArthur.

"No one's ever sent me a spaceship for my birthday before. I appreciate it," she radioed after the capsule arrived.

Launched on Aug 29 from NASA's Kennedy Space Centre, the capsule contains lemons, cherry tomatoes, avocados and ice cream for McArthur and her six crewmates, along with a couple tons of research and other gear.

The shipment arrived just a few days ahead of the first of three spacewalks.

Starting Sept 3, the two Russians on board will perform back-to-back spacewalks to outfit a new laboratory that arrived in July.

Then a Japanese-French spacewalking duo will venture out on September 12 to install a bracket for new solar panels due to arrive next year. That NASA-directed spacewalk should have occurred last week, but was postponed after US spacewalker, Mark Vande Hei, suffered a pinched nerve in his neck. Station managers opted to replace him with French astronaut Thomas Pesquet.

SpaceX launches ants, avocados, robot to space station

A SpaceX shipment of ants, avocados and a human-sized robotic arm rocketed toward the International Space Station on Sunday. The delivery, due to arrive Monday, is the company's 23rd for NASA in just under a decade.

A recycled Falcon rocket blasted into the predawn sky from NASA's Kennedy Space Center. After hoisting the Dragon capsule, the first-stage booster landed upright on SpaceX's newest ocean platform, named "A Shortfall of Gravitas".

SpaceX founder Elon Musk continued his tradition of naming the booster-recovery vessels in tribute to the late science fiction writer Iain Banks and his Culture series.

The Dragon is carrying more than 4,800 pounds (2,170 kilogrammes) of supplies and experiments, and fresh food including avocados, lemons and even ice cream for the space station's seven astronauts.

The Girl Scouts are sending up ants, brine shrimp and plants as test subjects, while University of Wisconsin-Madison scientists are flying up seeds from mouse-ear cress, a small flowering weed used in genetic research. Samples of concrete, solar cells and other materials also will be subjected to weightlessness.

A Japanese start-up company's experimental robotic arm, meanwhile, will attempt to screw items together in its orbital debut and perform other mundane chores normally done by astronauts. The first tests will be done inside the space station. Future models of



Gitai Inc.'s robot will venture out into the vacuum of space to practice satellite and other repair jobs, said chief technology officer Toyotaka Kozuki.

As early as 2025, a squad of these arms could help build lunar bases and mine the moon for precious resources, he added.

SpaceX had to leave some experiments

behind because of delays resulting from Covid-19.

It was the second launch attempt; Saturday's try was foiled by stormy weather.

NASA turned to SpaceX and other US companies to deliver cargo and crews to the space station, once the space shuttle program ended in 2011. Source: AP

Apple buys classical-music service Primephonic, will launch app

Apple Inc. has acquired classical-music streaming service Primephonic and plans to launch an app dedicated to the genre next year. Primephonic's playlists and audio content will be integrated into Apple Music in the coming months, the company has said.

Primephonic's existing service will be shut down on September 7, but its subscribers will get six months of Apple Music for free.

Since launching Apple Music in 2015, Apple has made a few acquisitions to bolster the service. It bought music-recognition app Shazam in 2018, letting customers identify songs and add them to their playlists.

But Apple has faced fierce competition from Spotify Technology SA in streaming music around the world. The Cupertino, California-based company didn't disclose the Primephonic purchase price.

Besides, back at WWDC 2020, Apple announced its plans to completely transition to its own processors. The company said it would take around two years to fully transition to their own silicon. A recent report from Bloomberg detailed the company's roadmap in the year to come. Bloomberg journalist Mark Gurman, in his edition of the Power On newsletter, explained that he believes the company will "barely hit its two-year timeline" for transitioning the Mac lineup fully to Apple Silicon. We have so far seen the Cupertino-based company brings its M1 chips to the MacBook Pro series, MacBook Air series, Mac Mini and the 24-inch iMac.

Hide last seen and blue ticks on WhatsApp

Step 1: If you want to hide your last seen, then just open the WhatsApp app and head to the Settings section.


Step 2: Now head to the Account section and tap on Privacy. It should be noted that whatever settings you save will apply to both the mobile and web version of the messaging app.

Step 3: Now, tap on the Last Seen option and change the Setting to "Nobody."

Note: You get three options, including "Everyone", "My Contacts" and "Nobody". The first one basically means that people who have your WhatsApp number will be able to see your last seen. The second option means that only your contacts will be able to check your last seen on WhatsApp. If you enable the "Nobody" option, then no one will be able to see your WhatsApp last seen. You can select any last seen option any time you want.

How to hide blue tick on WhatsApp

The process to hide blue ticks is similar. You will find this feature in the Privacy section, but you will not find it in the same name. WhatsApp offers a Read Receipts



option, which will disable the blue ticks. Read on to know more.

Step 1: First head to the WhatsApp app and open the Settings section.

Step 2: Now, go to "Account" and tap on the Privacy option.

Step 3: Scroll down to "Read Receipts" option and disable it to hide blue ticks on chats.

Users can enable this option anytime they want by following the same process. It should be noted that if you disable the mentioned option, then you won't be able to see blue ticks when others read messages you sent. Source: The Indian Express

Tesla moves a step closer to making India debut

Electric cars from Tesla Inc. may soon be on Indian roads, with the Union transport ministry approving four of its models for introduction in the country. The ministry's Vahan portal, however, did not identify the models that received the nod.

All automobile manufacturers, both Indian and foreign, need to get their vehicles locally certified before a formal launch. Tesla last year set up its Indian unit, Tesla India Motors and Energy Pvt. Ltd, marking its intention for an entry into its potential growth market for electric cars. The California-based company has also started hiring senior executives to prepare the ground before a possible launch. "Tesla has completed homologation and received approval for 4 of its vehicle variants in India. While we don't have any conformation on names as yet, these are probably Model 3 and Model 4 variants," Tesla Fan Club India tweeted. A Tesla spokesperson did not respond to emailed queries. The approval does not necessarily imply an immediate launch. The Elon Musk-led company has been asking India for a cut in import duty on electric vehicles and related parts as it is expected to initially import its vehicles as fully built units.

GDP growth 20.1% in Q1 after Covid slump

NEW DELHI (TIP): India's GDP grew at 20.1% in the quarter ending June — in line with expectations — although the high number is the result, not of a V-shaped recovery in the economy, but a favourable base effect. Compared to the last quarter of 2020-21, the country's GDP actually contracted by 16.9%, although this can be attributed to the bruising second wave of the pandemic in April and May. And compared to the first quarter of 2019-20, it contracted 9.2%.

The growth was largely the result of a 68-day long nationwide lockdown imposed on March 25, 2020, that led to an unprecedented contraction of 24.4% in GDP. Indeed, economic activity did not regain pre-pandemic levels (in the June 2019 quarter) in the first quarter of the current fiscal year.

RBI's Monetary Policy Committee (MPC) projected a growth rate of 21.3% and a Bloomberg poll of 45 economists, 21% for the quarter. Gross Value Added (GVA), which captures the actual production (GDP numbers also include taxes) grew at 18.8%, again lower than a Bloomberg forecast of 19.6%.

"The fact is that the latest GDP numbers show a large sequential contraction and,



when compared to June 2019 levels, show the enormity of the economic challenge. Even these numbers could see significant downward revisions as there might have been an overestimation of informal sector activity in these estimates," said Himanshu, associate professor of economics at Jawaharlal Nehru University.

However, chief economic advisor Krishnamurthy V Subramanian chose to focus only on the growth (and not the base effect) and said strong fiscal measures announced in the past year-and-half, and the pace of India's vaccination drive have helped faster economic recovery. The growth number "reaffirms the government's prediction of an imminent V-

shaped recovery made last year in August," he said.

Central government spending numbers from the Controller General of Accounts (CGA), which works under the ministry of finance, show that capital expenditure of the government was Rs 1.11 lakh crore in the quarter ending June compared to Rs 88,273 crores in the same period last year. The capex momentum seems to have slowed down in the month of July (the latest available numbers), with the government spending Rs 16,932 crore in July compared to Rs 23,576 crore in July 2020.

The latest GDP numbers support the argument that the pandemic, especially its second wave has damaged household balance sheets and therefore their purchasing power.

Private final consumption expenditure (PFCE) contracted by 17.4%, more than the overall GDP number on a quarter-on-quarter basis in the June quarter. Even the year-on-year numbers show that private consumption has a bigger deficit with pre-pandemic levels. PFCE grew only 19.3% in the quarter against a 26.2% contraction in the quarter ending June 2020. *Source: HT*

Covid-19 delta variant hits Chinese economy as services industry contract

China's economy took a knock from the delta virus outbreak in August, adding to signs of a slowdown in growth in the second half of the year and fueling speculation of more central bank support.

The official purchasing managers surveys showed the services industry contracted for the first time since February 2020 as consumers cut back on spending and travel amid new virus curbs. The manufacturing purchasing managers' index fell slightly to 50.1 from 50.4 in July, partly due to supply-chain disruptions.

Beyond the virus outbreaks, China's recovery is also showing signs of faltering in the wake of recent regulatory crackdowns and weak demand at home. The central bank has signaled it may provide more targeted support -- such as cutting the reserve requirement ratio for some lenders -- while the government has pledged to accelerate fiscal spending in the second half of the year, helping to cushion growth.

"The service sector was shocked by the delta variant, extending the ongoing theme of uneven recovery," said Raymond Yeung, chief economist for Greater China at Australia & New Zealand Banking Group Ltd in Hong Kong. "It is pretty clear that the authorities would still support growth. We still pencil in another RRR cut before the end of 2021, October the earliest."



High-frequency data tracked by Bloomberg's early indicators also show the recovery is leveling off. Several economists have already downgraded their growth forecasts for this year, although the expansion is still expected to exceed the government's modest target of above 6%.

China's equity benchmark, the CSI 300 Index, dropped as much as 1.5% to its lowest since Aug. 20.

The government imposed stringent measures, including travel curbs, mass testing and quarantines, for about a month to bring a new wave of Covid cases under control, the most widespread outbreak since the initial flareup in

2020. Confidence among smaller businesses in the month weakened and consumers cut back on spending. The partial closure of China's second-biggest container port also disrupted trade.

"Today's data again reflected the outsized and asymmetric shock on the service sector from Covid-related restrictions," said Liu Peiqian, China economist at Natwest Markets in Singapore. While there's room for a rebound in services PMI in coming months as the outbreak is now under control, any future Covid outbreak domestically will continue to weigh on the sector, she said.

Google delays mandatory office return to 2022 on Covid surge

Google pushed back the date when its employees must return to the office until after Jan. 10, citing uncertainty related to the pandemic amid a resurgence of Covid-19 cases in various countries around the world.

It will be optional for Google's staffers to work on campus until at least Jan. 10, Alphabet Inc. Chief Executive Officer Sundar Pichai wrote Tuesday in a memo to employees. The company will give workers 30 days notice before they're expected to go back to offices, but Pichai didn't specify a date when employees, based in the U.S. or elsewhere, must return.

"Beyond January 10, we will enable countries and locations to make determinations on when to end voluntary work-from-home based on local conditions, which vary greatly across our offices," Pichai wrote.

Google previously delayed a compulsory office return to Oct. 18. The internet giant has said it will ask employees to work in a "hybrid" model, with about 60% going back to the same offices as before the pandemic. In August, Google approved 85% of employee requests to work remotely or relocate once the company's offices fully reopen.

Google's decision to delay its return-to-office plan again is similar to the actions taken by other major technology companies. Facebook Inc. recently told U.S. employees they don't need to go back to offices until January, and Apple Inc. has also pushed back its plans.

Shankaranarayana: The combined form of Shiva and Vishnu

Lord Shankaranarayana is a combined deity form of Shiva (Shankara) on the right with Nandi, and Vishnu (Narayana) on the left with Garuda. Shankaranarayana is also called Harihara – Hari (Vishnu) and Hara (Shiva). Lord Shankaranarayana is thus worshipped by both Vaishnavites and Shaivites as a form of the Supreme God, as well as being a figure of worship for other Hindu traditions in general. Harihara is also sometimes used as a philosophical term to denote the unity of Vishnu and Shiva as different aspects of the same Supreme God.

Due to the diverse nature of Hinduism there are a wide variety of beliefs and traditions associated to both Vishnu and Shiva. In Vaishnavism Vishnu (including his associated incarnations) is the Supreme God, and in Shaivism Shiva (including his different incarnations) is the Supreme God. There was a period when the followers of Shiva and Vishnu were competing to establish their God as the sole Supreme God. The worship of Shankaranarayana evolved as a compromise between these two groups. Today these two Supreme Gods occupy equally important positions in the Hindu Trinity, with Brahma. Lord Shiva's incarnation as Ardhanarishvara – half Shiva and half Parvathy depicts that the male and female are manifestations of the same Supreme God. Similarly Lord Shankaranarayana shows that Vishnu and Shiva are manifestations of the same Supreme God. The Advaita Siddhantha regard the Supreme God as being ultimately formless and thus see both Vishnu and Shiva as different facets of the one formless Brahman.

According to Swami Sivananda, Shiva and Vishnu are one and the same entity. They are essentially one and the same. They are the names given to the different aspects of the all-pervading Supreme Soul or the Absolute.

“Shankaranarayana” is considered as one of the seven holy places created by Bhagwan Parshuram. This is one of the rare temples where we can see the sangam (confluence) of Shankara (Lord Shiva) and Narayana (Lord Vishnu).

Shankaranarayana village, named after the temple, is located in the valley of mountain ranges close to the Sahyadris. It is located in Udipi District, Karnataka, and 25KM from the Arabian Sea.

The 7 holy places namely Subrahmanya, Udipi, Kumbhakaashi, Koteswara, Shankaranarayana, Kolluru and Gokarna together constitute Parashurama Kshetra. These holy places are compared with seven holy places in Rama Kshetra, namely, Ayodhya, Mathura, Maya, Kashi, Kanchi, Avanthika and Puri.

Udbhaav Murthy – Shankaranarayana Temple

The main deity of Shankaranarayana Temple is in the form of Udbhaav Linga. The naturally formed lingam of Lord Shankara and Lord Narayana is one feet below the ground, inside the Garbhagudi. The devotees can only see the mirror image of the lingam. The Shankara Linga is on the right (left as seen by the devotees) and Narayana Linga on the left. While Shankara Linga is in round shape, whereas Narayana Linga is a flat one with foot prints of holy cow in it. Devotees believe that these were foot prints of Kamadhenu (holy cow) which had stood here for dripping milk on the Shankara Linga. There is water around Udbhaav Linga at any time of the year. This holy water is called Suddhamrita Theertha

Koti Theertha

Koti theertha is located in front of the temple. Devotees coming to this temple first make prokshana of



this theertha and then make darshan of Lord Shankaranarayana. The stone enclosure and the surrounding coconut and arecanut groves enhance the beauty of the pond. The pond has rich spiritual bearing. Rituals such as Pitratarpana and Theerthasana are held at this pond. Koti theertha stands out as most beautiful and vast of all the twenty one ponds found around this place.

Krodagiri Devaru

Shankaranarayana is also known as Kroda after Kroda Maharshi. In the 24th Chapter of Pushkara Kaanda in Padma Purana, one can find a beautiful description of Kroda Shankaranarayana. According to this, the demons Kharasura and Rattasura were ill-treating common people. Kroda Maharshi meditated Lord Shiva and Lord Vishnu together and prayed them come in the form of Lord Shankaranarayana. Lord Shiva and Lord Vishnu, pleased with the meditation of Kroda Maharshi, came to this place as Shankaranarayana and killed Kharasura and Rattasura. The hill beside the Shankaranarayana Temple, atop which Kroda Maharshi meditated Lord Shankaranarayana, is named as Kroda Giri.

The idol of Lord Shankaranarayana along with goddess Gowri and goddess Lakshmi are at the top of Kroda Giri.

Kroda Guhe

The Guhe (Cave) in which Kroda used meditate atop the Kroda Giri Parvatha (Hill). This is 6 foot wide cave with a 2-feet wide entrance.

“Shiva is a form of Vishnu and Vishnu a form of Shiva. Shiva dwells in the heart of Vishnu while Vishnu in the heart of Shiva.”

Krishna tells Arjuna that even those who are the devotees (bhaktas) of other devatas (Any devata) and who worship them with great devotion they too are

worshipping Him – even if it is considered to be avidhipoorvakam (i.e. following a different “Vidhi”, or Pooja rituals). Krishna is saying, “Pray to me directly. But, if the devotee finds attachment to other deities, that is OK. They too worship me.”

Vishnu Maya

Narada, coming under Vishnu Maya, gives shaapam to Vishnu, Narada says “Svami! Please forgive me. I, coming under influence of Your Maya, got Ahankaara and did your ninda. Please tell me what can save me from this ghora-paapam”.

Vishnu says: “O Priya Narada! You go and do paraayana of Shankara Shatanaamams. Then you will get Shanti. Shiva is whom I respect the most. Even by mistake don't forget this. One who doesn't have Shiva-Anugraha cannot be My Bhakta. Believe this. Then My Maya won't affect you.”

One day, when Goddess Lakshmi and Vishnu were together in vihaaram, Lakshmi sees Uchhaishravas, her brother, the horse of Revanta who is the son of Surya. Engrossed in seeing her brother, she does not reply to the repeated calls of Vishnu. Seeing her attraction, Vishnu gives her shaapam to go to Bhulokam in the form of a horse and come back to Vaikuntam only after getting a son equal to Himself! She comes to Bhuloka to experience the shaapam and realizing that none other than her brother, Shiva can help her calm Vishnu, she immediately does a tapas for Him and Shiva appears to save her soodari. Lakshmi says “You and Vishnu are both same, the Paramaatmaa. Please help me!” Shiva says “Soodari! How do you know that we both are same? All learned people know that. Who told you?” Lakshmi says, “Once MahaVishnu Himself told me this. Seeing Him in deep Daiva-dhyaanam, I asked

Him “During Samudra Manthanam, I thought you were the greatest of all and hence chose you. Devaadideva! Who is better than you that you are in dhyana of Him?” MahaVishnu replied “I am doing Shankara-dhyana. He is Eshwara. He is the same as me. All learned people know that. If someone is my devotee but still hates Shiva, he will fall into naraka”. Saying this, she asks Shiva to persuade Vishnu to bless her with a child. Shiva sends Chitrarupa as a duta to convince Vishnu. Vishnu immediately accepts and comes to Bhuloka and blesses Lakshmi with Ekaveera, who is equal to Vishnu Himself.

The place has garnered a high rating on the international rafting rating system. With ratings going to levels 4-5, it is indeed considered to be a tough one. Sonamarg

Indian shuttlers Suhas Yathiraj and Tarun Dhillon made impressive starts to their campaign in men's singles SL4 class on the second day of the badminton competition at the Tokyo Paralympics here on Thursday, Sept 2.

The 38-year-old Suhas took just 19 minutes to see off Germany's Jan Niklas Pott 21-9 21-3 in a lopsided group A clash.

Tarun, 27, too didn't break a sweat, beating Thailand's Siripong Teamarrom 21-7 21-13 in a group B match that lasted 23 minutes.

While Suhas will face Indonesia's Hary Susanto next, Tarun will be up against Korea's Shin Kyung Hwan on Friday.

Suhas, who has an impairment in one of his ankles, has been at the forefront in the fight against COVID-19 menace as the district magistrate of Gautam Buddh Nagar in Uttar Pradesh.

Tarun, on the other hand, had sustained a severe knee injury while playing football at the age of eight, which resulted in restricted movement in the knee. He is the current world no.2 and a former two-time world champion.

The SL class allows persons with standing/lower limb impairment/severe are allowed to compete.

However, there was disappointment in store yet again for 19-year-old Palak Kohli and her partner Parul Parmar, 48, as the duo went down 7-21 5-21 to second seeded Chinese pair of Cheng Hefang and Ma Huihui in a group B women's doubles SL3-SU5 class match.

Bumrah strikes to remove England openers early after India's 191

LONDON, SEPTEMBER 2: Rory Burns and Haseeb Hammed couldn't stick around for long, with Jasprit Bumrah dismissing both England openers in the same over. India were all out for 191 with Chris Woakes taking four wickets and Ollie Robinson grabbing three.

Shardul Thakur produced a blazing half-century off just 31 balls and added a 50-plus partnership with Umesh Yadav for India's eighth wicket. Woakes picked up his third wicket as Pant became the seventh Indian wicket to fall. Ajinkya Rahane endured another low score, getting dismissed for 47 as India were

placed precariously at 122/6 at tea. England picked up the big wicket of Virat Kohli after the India captain scored a half-century off 85 balls - his 27th of Test career - and a second consecutive fifty of the series. India were 54/3 at the lunch interval, before England struck early in the second session, with Woakes picking up his second wicket and sending back Ravindra Jadeja.

India's openers did well to score 28 runs in the first seven over, but England pacers Woakes, Ollie Robinson and James Anderson combined to pick up three quick wickets.

The returning Woakes struck the first blow getting Rohit out caught behind. It was followed by Robinson trapping Rahul out LBW. Anderson then got Cheteshwar Pujara with a brilliant away swinger, which the batsman nicked to the keeper. England won the toss and opted to bowl first in the fourth Test match at The Oval. India made two changes to their side.

Yadav and Thakur come into the side in place of Ishant Sharma and Mohammed Shami, both of whom have a niggle. England have brought in Ollie Pope and Chris Woakes in place of Jos Buttler and Sam Curran.

Ronaldo breaks world record for scoring most goals in men's international football



PORTUGAL (TIP): Cristiano Ronaldo missed a penalty but still broke the men's international scoring record before adding a second goal as Portugal beat visiting Ireland 2-1 in World Cup qualifying.

Ronaldo grabbed his 110th goal in the 89th minute on Wednesday to move ahead of former Iran striker Ali Daei.

Six minutes into stoppage time, Ronaldo made it 111 in 180 games to break Irish hearts after defender John Egan gave his nation the lead in the 45th.

"I'm very happy, not only

because I beat the record but for the special moments that we had," Ronaldo said.

"Two goals at the end of the game is so tough, but I have to appreciate what the team did. We believed until the end." But Ronaldo, who has returned to join Manchester United, is still 76 goals behind the game's most prolific international scorer. Christine Sinclair, who is 38 years old, scored her 187th goal for Canada last month at the Tokyo Olympics.

Ronaldo's night had been frustrating up until the late

heroics.

His 15th-minute spot kick was well saved by goalkeeper Gavin Bazunu, who was just 2 years old when Ronaldo scored his first for Portugal as a skinny winger at the 2004 European Championship.

Ronaldo's only title with Portugal came at Euro 2016.

Although he was the top scorer at this year's European Championship with five goals in four games, his team's title defense ended in the round of 16.

So did France's bid.

Coach Didier Deschamps vowed his side would hit back strongly.

But Les Bleus had to settle for a comeback 1-1 draw at home against Bosnia and Herzegovina thanks to Antoine Griezmann's 39th international goal.

France had defender Jules Kounde sent off in the 50th for protesting to the referee after he was cautioned for fouling Sead Kolasinac.


Another prolific striker was on target elsewhere, as Erling Haaland put Norway ahead in a 1-1 home draw with the Netherlands.

PRABHJOT'S COLUMN

Nostalgia - My early hockey days

When I played hockey for the first time, it was with a Khunda - a nicely chiseled out curved tree branch that resembled a plough. And the ball used in the game was made of a worn out piece of cloth held in shape by a large number of rubber bands cut from a discarded bicycle rubber tube.

For the first several months, it was my favorite stick as boys of my age group from my immediate neighborhood would assemble every evening for a game that would at times continue for more than an hour. Two broken pieces of bricks or even chappals (Slippers) would serve as goalposts at either end of the uneven playfield. The game was played barefoot. Gradually we all started mastering the skill of keeping the ball close to the stick while attempting to dribble past an opponent.

Hard hitting was normally avoided as the ball would peel off with broken rubber bands scattered all over. The makeshift indigenous playing equipment, however, served the purpose well with teams of three to four players each.

Since our "khundas" looked a little crude, we could not carry them to our school - Government Model Middle School (Jhullian Wala School) - for a game during the recess break.

Our most memorable day came when we were in sixth standard. A couple of boys in my neighborhood, who also went to the same school, were all smiles when our PT teacher asked us who all play hockey. And all the hands of boys in my Section went up in affirmation. To our great surprise we were asked to go to another room where there was a huge steel box. The school peon, Bhajan Singh, was already there.

After PT Madam arrived in the room, he opened the box and started taking out hockey sticks. Each one of us got a brand new stick. Thrilled and excited as we were, we immediately rushed to the school playfield for our first game with new hockey sticks and a leather ball. Since we were not used to holding the stick and playing with a regular ball, the first game turned out to be a mere hitting match. It was almost after a week of practice with the regular sticks and the leather ball, we all started playing well. Broken or damaged sticks were replaced on approval by the PT Madam.

Those who played football were issued

a couple of balls for regular practice. Interestingly, the football team also had most of the hockey players in it.

An Inter-Middle Schools tournament was our first tryst with competitive hockey. We won the first two matches but lost the third to a better organized and professionally trained team.

However, we had consolation as four members of our team were chosen for the Zonal team that was to play in Inter-Zonal for selecting a district team. Incidentally I was one of them. Other three included Gurdishpal Singh, who ultimately went on to represent India in international hockey, Sukhjit Singh and Manjit Singh.

Hockey continued with most of us to our next institution - High School.

The intervening break between the Middle and High School saw most of us joining an evening game of hockey at the neighboring Gujar Khan Khalsa High School. The school was later converted into an educational hub with a separate school for girls, a women's arts college, a business school, and an English medium school besides a few other specialized institutions.

The Gujar Khan Educational Centre is run by a Board of eminent people.

On the sprawling Gujar Khan playfields, most of the promising sportsmen and women of the area would come for training. In addition to school and college teams, outsiders including cricket, hockey, football, basketball players and athletes used the playfields for their training.

At times, the management would not take it lightly with outsiders using the playfields. The police would be called to chase away outsiders or players practicing there. It was an unending conflict as outsiders supported by their parents would maintain that the ground belonged to the society of which they all were members. Many students of the institutions run on the premises were also treated as outsiders in case they were not members of the regular teams of the Gujar Khan institutions.

This unsavory aspect apart, it was Gujar Khan playfields that gave a major exposure to young and budding players of the area.

Several senior hockey players, including alumni of the Gujar Khan institutions, would make it a point to attend the evening game. Among regular

ones were Jagtar Singh and his brother, Raminder Singh (both sons of Mr. Mehar Singh, a leading criminal lawyer of his time. Both Jagtar Singh and Raminder Singh had the distinction of playing for India. Col Raminder Singh, son-in-law of Punjab CM Beant Singh had also led one of two Indian teams in an invitation tournament played at Ahmedabad. He also played for Signals and Services. Besides, he served Punjab as Director of Sports), Gurainye (Devinder Singh Benepal, he was also in India's camp for the 1975 World Cup but an alleged medical aberration saw him leave the camp), Golu (Ajit Singh, one of toughest hockey players of his time), Jawahari (Col Jawahar Lal), Jagdeep Singh Phoolka (He was a goalkeeper of the 1966 Asian Games gold medalist Indian hockey team), Bau Ji, Dhiri (Randhir Singh), Dhobi (Durlabh Singh), Teja (Tejinder Singh Sandhu), Billa and Kala (brothers who played for Gujar Khan School team), Bubby (Col Jatinderpal Singh Ahluwalia, who later captained SCD Government College hockey team), Sheela (Sushil Kumar Gupta), Hari (Harjit Singh Dua of Deson group), Chhindi (Charanjit Singh), Sarabha and Bhutewalia (both from Guru Nanak Engineering College hockey team), Kallu (Ajinderpal Singh, a promising center half with superb stickwork), Pinky (Gurdarshan Singh Mand now settled in Surrey) besides a few others. They all used to be regular for the evening game which was played over "shakanjavi".

Among other known faces to play there were Shiv Jagday (who later became national coach of both Canada and US hockey teams), Rajwinder Singh (played for India in World Cup), Dr Rajinder Pal Singh Bawa (now Vice Chancellor of Chandigarh University), and Jasjit Singh.

After the game, most of them would head for the Bengali Sweets Shop in the Model Town Market and laze around there.

Other than the regular evening game, this group, which was known outside as Model Town Lions Hockey Club, also used to invite teams from outside for

friendly games.

Corps of Signals (because of Col Raminder Singh) that had young MP Ganesh (who later captained India and also was the national chief coach), SN Pawar (member of the 1975 World Cup champion team), Maghar Singh and Gurdial Singh (deep defenders of Corps of Signals), was a regular. We as youngsters were lucky to watch MP Ganesh play barefoot on the dusty playfields of Gujar Khan and grow into an international star.

BSF Jammu was another team that came for friendly games...

We also used to wait for Sports School and Sports College teams from Jalandhar. Players like Hardyal Singh and his brother Hardev Singh besides Surjit Singh Rehal (they all later represented Kenya), Shiv Dutt aka Pandit Ji, Murthy and Kulwant Singh Mangu have all played at Gujar Khan school playfields.

It was on this ground that the Lions Club started organizing Major Bhupinder Singh Memorial All-India Hockey Tournament that featured almost all top teams of north India. Donations of two annas, four annas, and one or two rupees, were collected from willing hockey fans to run the tournament. There were also a few regular sponsors and friends of the Club who extended financial and moral support to the organizing committee. Prominent among them were Mr. DS Bhogal, Mr. Inder Mohan Singh Grewal of Upper India Steel, Mr. Apinder Grewal (who later became Mayor of Ludhiana), and Mr. Surjit Singh of Punjab Agricultural University (He used to do the commentary and compering).

After a few years, the venue of the tournament was shifted to Punjab Agricultural University grounds where well maintained lustful green playfields fascinated all players, officials and spectators.

Dozens killed overnight in NYC, NJ...

was found dead in the backseat of their car on the Grand Central Parkway in Queens.

"I don't have an exact answer regarding how many people are actually missing, but we are going to continue to work hard throughout the day and the evening to identify everyone's location," the chief said.

Cops were out in the hardest-hit areas Thursday evening knocking on doors to make sure the residents are safe, Harrison said.

Suburban Westchester County reported three fatalities, including Fran and Ken Bailie, longtime computer science professors at Iona College who never made it home after teaching there Wednesday, school officials said. A Mount Kisco man found dead in floodwaters in Elmsford was identified as Rabbi Shmuel David Weissmandl, the son of a famed Jewish religious leader.

At least 23 people died in the Garden State, including a family of three found in the same apartment complex, the state's Gov. Phil Murphy said late Thursday.

The rising death toll came as a state of emergency was in effect after the historic downpour knocked out power, closed roads and destroyed homes and businesses across the five boroughs.

As recovery efforts continued throughout the day, rescuers were still searching for more stranded and missing people, bracing for a potentially higher death toll.

"Our hearts go out to the victims," NYPD Commissioner Dermot Shea said at a press briefing in Queens Thursday with Mayor Bill de Blasio and Gov. Kathy Hochul.

"We pray that the number does not go up."

Among the dead was a family - 50-year-old Ang Gelu Lama, 48-year-old Mingma Sherpa and their son, two-year-old Lobsang Lama - who drowned inside their basement apartment in Flushing, Queens.

The other deaths in Queens included Yue Lian Chen, 86; Phamatee Ramskriet, 43, and her 22-year-old son Khrishah Ramskriet; 48-year-old Darlene Hsu; and three others - two males and a female - who haven't been identified, according to law enforcement sources and police. The body of 66-year-old Roberto Bravo was discovered in his flooded apartment in Cypress Hills, Brooklyn, cops said.

The 23 who died in New Jersey included a 70-year-old man swept away in his car in Passaic and 31-year-old Dhanush Reddy, who died when he was sucked into a 36-inch storm sewer pipe, officials said.

A Connecticut State Police trooper also died when his cruiser was swept away. Sgt. Brian Mohl had 26 years of service with the state police.

Elsewhere along the East Coast, a 19-year-old man was found dead in a flooded apartment complex in Rockville, Maryland, and at least five people were killed in Pennsylvania, including one killed by a fallen tree and another who drowned in his car after helping his wife to escape.

The storm also wreaked havoc on the region's utility and transit systems.

More than 200,000 electricity customers were still without power early Thursday across the northeast - mostly in Pennsylvania, New Jersey and New York, according to PowerOutage.US.

New York's FDR Drive and the Bronx River Parkway were flooded from the overnight torrential downpour, submerging cars up to their windows and forcing drivers to leave their vehicles behind.

Subway tracks and stations were also submerged, prompting the Metropolitan Transportation Authority to suspend all service, which largely resumed with lingering delays by late afternoon.

In New Jersey, the NJ Transit suspended rail services, except the Atlantic City Rail Line, and the Newark Light Rail was also halted. Newark International Airport shutdown overnight but restarted limited flights Thursday morning.

New York Gov. Kathy Hochul, New Jersey Gov. Phil

Murphy and Connecticut Gov. Ned Lamont all issued emergency declarations for their states as they reeled from the destruction and President Biden said he'd spoken to the governors, telling them Federal Emergency Management Agency personnel were on the ground to provide assistance.

At a press conference in Queens, Hochul, New York's newly sworn in chief executive, pledged to ensure the havoc and loss of life caused by flooding doesn't occur in the future.

"What happened yesterday -- trains were shut down, people were stranded. The fear that they must have experienced I cannot imagine," she said. "I don't want this to happen again."

The National Weather Service recorded 3.15 inches of rain fell in Central Park in an hour, from 8:51 to 9:51 pm - believed to be the most ever. At least 7.19 inches of rain fell there in total, the NWS said. Tropical Storm Henri dumped 1.94 inches in Central Park last month.

community," White House Press Secretary Jen Psaki told reporters at her daily news conference on Wednesday.

At a separate news conference, the State Department echoed the same view. "We will continue to have conversations that serve our interests, as well as our allies and partners," Under Secretary of State for Political Affairs Victoria J Nuland told reporters.

"But the first thing we want is to see them live up to the obligations that they have under the UN Charter, as well as the public statements that they themselves have made about their expectation for an Afghanistan that respects human rights, respects international law, allows international citizens and Afghans who wish to leave," she said in response to a question.

The US obviously had contacts with the Taliban during the withdrawal, she said.

"We had it during the effort that we were trying to midwife a negotiation. Those conversations have continued intensively to enable the evacuation of - that we undertook, and to try to get the kinds of guarantees of safe passage, etc., and tolerance, and to talk about the standard set in the UN Security Council resolution to talk about the terrorist threat as well because the expectation is that they claim to be able to control the security of Afghanistan," Nuland said.

The United States, she said, stands by the latest UN Security Council resolution. "Those are the international community's expectations and the UNSC's expectations for a Taliban-led government, and the way it will govern, and the way it will interact with the international system," she said. Mr. Shringla also met with U.S. Secretary of State Antony Blinken, with whom he discussed bilateral ties and Afghanistan, Mr. Bagchi wrote.

Mr. Shringla's delegation included Joint Secretary (Americas) of the Ministry of External Affairs Wani Rao and Joint Secretary (International Cooperation) from the Ministry of Defense Somnath Ghosh, both of whom led the Indian side at the India-U.S. 2+2 inter-session on Wednesday. The U.S. side was led by

Assistant Secretary of Defense for Indo Pacific Affairs Ely Ratner and Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for South and Central Asian Affairs Ervin Massinga.

Bilateral agenda

"Both sides took stock of the progress and developments in the bilateral agenda under the India-US strategic partnership, including defense, global public health, economic and commercial cooperation, science and technology, clean energy and climate finance, and people to people ties," an MEA statement said.

The inter-session included a discussion on strengthening multilateral cooperation among the U.S., India and "other like-minded partners", according to a statement from the Pentagon.

"The U.S. and Indian officials exchanged views on a range of regional issues of shared interest, including in South Asia, East and Southeast Asia, and the Western Indian Ocean and identified opportunities for enhanced cooperation on maritime security, regional connectivity, counterterrorism and humanitarian assistance and disaster relief," the statement said.

The two sides had committed to "driving greater interoperability" between their militaries and operationalizing bilateral initiatives on "information-sharing, logistics, defense industrial cooperation and joint doctrine engagement through liaison exchanges," the Pentagon said. Prior to his Thursday engagements at the State Department, Mr. Shringla had dinner with U.S. officials including Ms. Sherman at India House, the official residence of India's Ambassador to the U.S., Taranjit Singh Sandhu, as per a tweet from Mr. Sandhu.

Others present at the dinner included Laura Rosenberger, Senior Director for China on the Biden National Security Council; Chief of Staff to Presidential Climate Envoy John Kerry; Uzra Zeya who is Under Secretary for Civilian Security, Democracy and Human Rights; Under Secretary for Arms Control and International Security Bonnie Jenkins and Under Secretary for Economic Growth, Energy and Environment Jose Fernandes.

Possibility of Modi's visit

Wednesday's inter-session precedes the annual 2+2 ministerial dialogue, slated to be held in Washington later this year. Also on the cards is the possibility of Mr. Modi visiting Washington for bilateral discussions with U.S. President Joe Biden and a summit level meeting of the Quad, following his address to the United Nations General Assembly on September 25.

The in-person visit of Mr. Modi depends heavily on the ability of Japanese Premier Yoshihide Suga to do so. His attendance is not a given, with Japan's ruling Liberal Democratic Party (LDP) scheduled to hold its leadership election on September 29. (Agencies)

aired communal content linking the spread of the coronavirus to a Tablighi Jamaat meet held at Nizamuddin in Delhi.

"The problem is, everything in this country is shown with a communal angle by a section of media. ... The country is going to get a bad name ultimately," Chief Justice Ramana, heading a three-judge Bench, observed orally. The hearing witnessed Chief Justice Ramana upbraid the lack of accountability on the part of social media platforms.

The CJI said social media platforms only responded to "powerful people," while complaints made by ordinary people, institutions and judges over content were ignored. "These web channels, Twitter, Facebook, YouTube... They never respond. There is no accountability. About the institution they write badly and then they do not respond... This is the condition of institutions, forget individuals... They consider only people who are powerful. Institutions, common man, judges, they do not... This is the reality," Chief Justice Ramana noted.




