MAY 3, 2024

NEW YORK (TIP): Police arrested more than 300 pro-Palestinian demonstrators on college campuses on Wednesday, May 1 night into Thursday, May 2 morning, pushing the total past 2,000, according to an Associated Press tally.

More than 200 students were arrested at the University of California, Los Angeles, as police cleared a fortified encampment, and more than 90 students were arrested at Dartmouth College in New Hampshire.

Dozens more were arrested at the University of New Hampshire and at the University of Buffalo. In Oregon, police moved into the school's library on Thursday, which has been occupied by demonstrators since Monday.

May consider granting interim bail to Delhi CM Kejriwal in view of Lok Sabha election: Supreme Court

BENCH POSTS THE MATTER FOR FURTHER HEARING ON MAY 7

MAY 3, 2024

NEW DELHI (TIP): Noting the hearing on Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal's petition challenging his arrest in a money-laundering case linked to excise policy scam was likely to take time, the Supreme Court on Friday, May 3, said it may consider granting him interim bail in view of the ongoing Lok Sabha polls.

"It appears we can't complete it today. We will post it on Tuesday, May 7 morning itself. Mr Raju one more thing... If it's going to take time, and it does appear it may take time, we may then consider the question of interim bail because of the elections. We may hear on that part because of elections," a

Looking beyond empty promises and guarantees

India, a diverse and culturally rich nation, is currently in the midst of general elections spanning seven phases. With two phases already completed and five remaining, the eyes of the world are turned toward this major democratic event, watching closely the political circus that unfolds. Political parties are competing for power, making lofty promises and giving guarantees of a paradise they would deliver, often focusing on providing freebies and doles to attract voters.

Political parties have been known to make grand promises during elections. They offer guarantees for free housing, free education, free healthcare, and other social welfare measures, seeking to win the hearts and minds of voters. While these promises sound appealing on the surface, their feasibility and long-term impact on the economy and society remain questionable.

One of the significant concerns during these elections is the use of communal politics and divisive rhetoric by some parties, particularly the ruling Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP). affecting a large portion of the population.

The government provides 5 kg of food grains per month to 850 million people out of a total population of 1.3 billion to ensure basic survival. This indicates the depth of poverty and the need for more comprehensive economic reforms and social welfare programs.

While the BJP has been criticized for its communal approach, it is essential to note that other political parties are not entirely free from communalism either. Many parties have engaged in similar divisive tactics to appeal to specific vote banks, further exacerbating societal divisions.

The future of India hinges on its ability to address these challenges and move towards a more inclusive, equitable, and harmonious society. The country must focus on uniting its diverse population rather than promoting narrow, divisive agendas. Political parties should prioritize meaningful policies that genuinely uplift the lives of the people and foster national unity.

The general elections in India are a critical moment for the country's democracy. While political parties compete fiercely for power, they must remember their responsibility to uphold the principles of democracy, fairness, and unity. The electorate, too, should remain vigilant and discerning, looking beyond empty promises and guarantees to support leaders who will genuinely work towards a better future for all.

Pro-Palestine protests: US must not silence dissent by students

The crackdown on pro-Palestine protests at Columbia University and other campuses across the US is an assault on the fundamental principles of free speech and academic freedom. As hundreds of students face arrests, threats of expulsion and disciplinary action for voicing their solidarity with beleaguered Gazans, it is crucial to recognize that silencing dissent only deepens the wounds of injustice and undermines the values that the US claims to uphold. At the heart of these protests lies a demand for justice. Students are calling for their universities to divest from companies complicit in Israel's oppression of Palestinians - a moral stance in response to the ongoing

violence and human rights violations in Gaza.

Instead of addressing the students' grievances, the authorities have resorted to heavy-handed tactics, invoking charges of anti-Semitism to justify their actions. Condemning Israel's excesses is not tantamount to anti-Semitism. It is a legitimate form of protest against injustice, rooted in the principles of human rights and international law. By conflating criticism of the Israeli government with hatred towards Jewish people, detractors are seeking to delegitimize dissent and shield Israel from accountability.

The response from universities and law agencies is worrisome. The use of

force to suppress demonstrations runs counter to the democratic values that institutions of learning should safeguard. Instead of fostering an environment where diverse perspectives can be freely expressed, these actions create a chilling effect, stifling debate and dissent. The UN High Commissioner for Human Rights has rightly expressed concern over the disproportionate response to these protests, emphasizing the importance of protecting freedom of expression. As the self-proclaimed leader of the free world, the US must not silence divergent voices; it must be a beacon of hope and ensure freedom as well as justice for all.

WASHINGTON, D.C. (TIP): Indian American Bhavini Patel lost the Democratic primary Congressional race from Pennsylvania on Tuesday, April 23 night, but not before giving a tough fight to the incumbent.

Incumbent Congresswoman Summer Lee was projected to be the winner of the primary race for the 12th Congressional District of Pennsylvania. She received 59 per cent of the votes as against Patel's 41 per cent.

As expected, both President Joe Biden and his Republican challenger Donald Trump won their respective presidential primaries. Biden got 94 per cent of the votes from the Democrats.

Trump received 80 per cent and Indian American Nikki Haley, who dropped out of the race in March, surprisingly received nearly 20 per cent of the votes from the Republicans in the Pennsylvania presidential primary.

Patel (30) is a Biden supporter while Lee, the first-time lawmaker, has been an open critic of the president and has supported Palestine in its war against Israel.

"Her (Patel's) loss Tuesday shows that a progressive candidate like Ms Lee can still carry districts like Pittsburgh, despite Ms Patel and her supporters claiming that the incumbent's progressive views and alignment with the 'Squad' in Congress did not accurately reflect the politics of the area," Pittsburgh Post-Gazette said after the election results were out.

The Squad is an informal group of the most progressive members of Congress, most commonly associated with Congresswoman Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez, Ilhan Omar, Rashida Tlaib and Ayana Pressley.

Originally from Gujarat in India, Patel's mother came to the United States as an immigrant.

Five Indian Americans named to AI Safety and Security inaugural Board

APRIL 30, 2024

WASHINGTON, D.C. (TIP): Five Indian American CEOs are among 22 inaugural members of the AI Safety and Security Board formed to ensure safe and secure development and deployment of AI technology in the nation's critical infrastructure.

The board will advise the Secretary of Homeland Security, the critical infrastructure community, other private sector stakeholders, and the broader public on these issues, according to a DHS news release.

The Board's 22 inaugural members include representatives from a range of sectors, including software and hardware company executives, critical infrastructure operators, public officials, the civil rights community, and academia.

The Board will develop recommendations to help critical infrastructure stakeholders, such as transportation service providers, pipeline and power grid operators, and internet service providers, more responsibly leverage AI technologies.

It will also develop recommendations to prevent and prepare for AI-related disruptions to critical services that impact national or economic security, public health, or safety.

Indian American members of the Board are: Arvind Krishna, Chairman and CEO of IBM; Satya Nadella, Chairman and CEO of Microsoft; Shantanu Narayen, Chair and CEO of Adobe, Sundar Pichai, CEO of Alphabet; and Arati Prabhakar, Assistant to the President for Science and Technology; Director, the White House Office of Science and Technology Policy.

DHS is responsible for the overall security and resilience of the nation's critical infrastructure, which hundreds of millions of Americans rely on every day to light their homes, conduct business, exchange information, and put food on the



table, according to the release.

Critical infrastructure encompasses 16 sectors of American industry, including our defense, energy, agriculture, transportation, and internet technology sectors. The Board will advise DHS on ensuring the safe and responsible deployment of AI technology in these sectors in the years to come, and it will look to address threats posed by this technology to these vital services.

"Artificial Intelligence is a transformative technology that can advance our national interests in unprecedented ways. At the same time, it presents real risks—risks that we can mitigate by adopting best practices and taking other studied, concrete actions," said Secretary of Homeland Security Alejandro Mayorkas.

The Board will help DHS stay ahead of evolving threats posed by hostile nation-state actors and reinforce our national security by helping to deter and prevent those threats.

The DHS Homeland Threat Assessment of 2024 warns the public of the threat AI-assisted tools pose to our economic security and critical infrastructure, including how these technologies "have the potential to enable larger scale, faster, efficient, and more evasive cyber attacks against targets, including pipelines, railways, and other US critical infrastructure."

It also concludes that nation-states, including the People's Republic of China, are developing "other AI technologies that could undermine US cyber defenses, including generative AI programs that

support malicious activity such as malware attacks."

Shantanu Narayen, Chair & CEO, Adobe: "Adobe is honored to be a part of the Artificial Intelligence Safety and Security Board to share learnings and recommendations with Secretary Mayorkas and key stakeholders across the public and private sectors. This Board holds enormous potential to advance AI technology, establishing guidelines that will help AI enhance and secure our nation's critical infrastructure while mitigating any risks it could pose."

Arvind Krishna, Chairman and CEO, IBM: "Artificial intelligence is a game-changing technology that is making businesses smarter, stronger, and safer. Indian American man shot dead after assaulting an officer by hitting his car

SAN ANTONIO, TX (TIP): A 42-year-old man Indian American man was shot and killed by police in San Antonio, Texas, after he tried to hit an officer who was trying to execute an arrest warrant over the weekend.

At around 12:45 am Sunday, San Antonio police arrived at a home in the 8600 block of Cheviot Heights, on the northwest side, to find a man involved in an assault about six hours prior, according to media reports citing SAPD Chief William McManus.

That suspect, later identified as Sachin Kumar Sahoo, had allegedly hit a woman with his car Saturday afternoon, local news outlet reported.

Three Indian-origin women killed in South Carolina crash

NEW YORK (TIP): Three women from India were killed and another person was hospitalized Saturday, April 27, after a speeding sports utility vehicle went airborne and crashed into trees in South Carolina, according to local media reports.

The crash occurred at noon Friday on Staunton Bridge Road along Interstate 85 near Lakeside Road, in Greenville County, media reports said, citing Chief Deputy Coroner Mike Ellis. The coroner's office on Saturday identified the deceased women as Manisha Rajendra Patel, Sangita Bhavnesh Patel and Rekhaben Dilip Patel from India. The cause of their death was listed as blunt force trauma.

Indo-British author Sharbani Basu conferred honorary doctorate by University of London

MAY 1, 2024

LONDON (TIP): Kolkata-born historian-author Sharbani Basu has been conferred an honorary doctorate by the University of London for her contributions to the field of literature and study of the shared British Indian history.

The London-based author of bestselling biographical books 'Spy Princess: The Life of Noor Inayat Khan' and 'Victoria and Abdul: The True Story of the Queen's Closest Confidant', made into an Oscar-nominated film starring Dame Judi Dench, received her honorary Degree of Doctor of Literature at a graduation ceremony on Tuesday.

Princess Anne -- the Princess Royal, the sister of King Charles III -- conferred the degree on Basu in her capacity as Chancellor of the university.

"In 2009, it was the University of London that gave us permission to build a memorial for World War II heroine, Noor Inayat Khan, in Gordon Square," said Dr Basu, acknowledging the "humbling and proud moment".

"The university recognized the importance of commemorating Noor Inayat Khan, who was barely known at the time. It was a memorable day when the bust was unveiled in 2012 by Her Royal Highness, the Princess Royal.

Today, the memorial is visited by people from around the world, and Noor's story is well known," she said.

In her address at the ceremony, the history graduate from St. Stephen's College in Delhi University traced her journey from India to the UK in the late 1980s as a journalist when she encountered the many hidden gems that found their way into her books.

"For me, as an author, telling the stories of Indians in the First and Second World Wars has been a privilege. Many of

the South Asian diaspora in Britain have ancestors who served in the war. Most know nothing or very little about them. I have seen first-hand how it energizes them when I talk about it. It gives them a connection, a stake in the system, a sense of inclusion," said the author of 'For King and Another Country: Indian Soldiers on the Western Front, 1914-18'.

She also referenced the importance of the study of the Empire in UK schools as a binding and uniting force.

"Much has been debated about the teaching of the Empire in schools. I see this not as something divisive, but one that brings people together and promotes an understanding of each other's culture and histories. Our shared future is, after all, based on our shared past," said the writer, in her early 60s.

In the university's citation for their newest honorary doctorate, Pro Vice-Chancellor Professor Mary Stiasny described Basu as a "thought leader" on India and the British Empire.

"A journalist, 'Sunday Times' bestselling author and historian, Sharbani's work combines her twinned passions of journalism and history and often centers on British rule in India, exploring the past through the lens of hidden stories and marginalized voices," said Stiasny.

Indian American astronaut Sunita Williams set for first piloted launch of Boeing's Starliner

WASHINGTON, D.C. (TIP): Veteran Indian American astronaut Sunita Williams is all set to go on her third mission to the international space station on May 6 on the first piloted flight of Boeing's Starliner spacecraft. Williams and astronaut Barry "Butch" Wilmore, both former Navy test pilots, are set for the launch atop a United Launch Alliance Atlas 5 rocket at 10:34 pm EDT on Monday, May 6, according to a NASA statement. If all goes well, Williams and Wilmore will dock at the space station on May 8 and return to Earth May 15 or shortly thereafter. If the mission goes well, NASA plans to begin operational Starliner crew rotation flights in 2025, alternating crew launches with SpaceX.

Williams and Wilmore, flew to the Kennedy Space Center Thursday afternoon to prepare for the first piloted launch of Starliner, a long-awaited flight running years behind schedule after two uncrewed test flights and extensive work to resolve a variety of technical problems. Two of NASA's most seasoned astronauts with four previous spaceflights, 11 spacewalks and 500 days in orbit between them, landed at the spaceport's 3-mile-long runway in T-38 jet trainers after a flight from the Johnson Space Center in Houston.

Empire State Local News Coalition Celebrates Inclusion of \$90 Million Local Media Tax Credit in Final FY 2025 New York State Budget

FIRST-IN-THE-NATION BILL INCENTIVIZES THE RETENTION AND HIRING OF LOCAL JOURNALISTS

APRIL 22, 2024

NEW YORK (TIP): Governor Kathy Hochul and the New York State Legislature, on April 21, unveiled the final state budget, including a payroll tax credit for local news outlets, modeled on the Local Journalism Sustainability Act, in the sweeping package. With the passage of this bill, New York is now the first state in the nation to incentivize hiring and retaining local journalists. This game changer for the local news industry comes just months after the launch of the Empire State Local News Coalition, an unprecedented, grassroots campaign powered by more than 200 community newspapers across the state.

Senator Brad Hoylman-Sigal, the Senate bill sponsor, said: "I'm elated that our first-in-the-nation Local Journalism Sustainability Act is passing in the state budget. A thriving local news industry is vital to the health of our democracy and it's our responsibility to help ensure New Yorkers have access to independent and community-focused journalism. Thank you to Senate Majority Leader Stewart-Cousins, Governor Hochul, our Assembly Sponsor Woerner and the over 200 local publications of the Empire State Local News Coalition who helped pass our bill. Our efforts will help ensure that our democracy will not die in darkness."

The program-\$30 million per year for three years-allows each eligible newspaper and broadcast business to receive a 50% refundable tax credit against the first \$50,000 of an employee's salary, up to a total of \$300,000



per business. \$4 million will be allocated to incentivize print and broadcast businesses to hire new journalists. The remaining \$26 million will be split evenly between businesses with fewer than 100 employees and those with more than 100 employees, ensuring that hyperlocal, independent news organizations have a fair shot at access to these funds.

After stalling for years, the Local Journalism Sustainability Act catapulted into a top legislative priority this session following the early-2024 founding of the Empire State Local News Coalition and the coalition's mobilization of support from hundreds of New York hometown papers as well as a broad range stakeholders from around the country, including the Rebuild Local News Coalition, Microsoft, and El

Diario. Organized labor including NYS AFL-CIO, CWA District 1, and national and local news guilds also played a critical role in mobilizing support for this historic bill.

"The Empire State Local News Coalition is thrilled by the state budget's inclusion of a payroll tax credit for local news outlets modeled on the Local Journalism Sustainability Act. New York is now the first state in the nation to incentivize hiring and retaining local journalists-a critical investment given that hundreds of New York's newspapers have closed since 2004, leaving too many New York communities without access to vital local information. The objectivity of this credit shows that there is a fair way for public policy to support local news without jeopardizing journalistic integrity. This program is a model for other states across the U.S. to follow as communities across the country raise their voices to save local news" said Zachary Richner, founder of the Empire State Local News Coalition.

"We're incredibly proud of the 200 newspapers in our coalition, which built an unprecedented grassroots movement in support of saving New York's local news industry in a few short months. We're especially grateful to Senator Brad Hoylman-Sigal, whose tireless advocacy for this tax credit was instrumental in moving it through the legislative process.



SOUTH QUEENS, NY (TIP): Assemblywoman Jenifer Rajkumar, on May 2, announced she is introducing legislation granting retroactive pension eligibility to the late FDNY firefighter Derek Floyd. A former Marine who served in Iraq and Afghanistan, Floyd continued his life of service by joining the FDNY. Due to a disqualifying heart condition, Floyd was terminated last

year only a few months shy of eligibility under the Fire Department Pension Fund. In April, he suffered a fatal heart attack, leaving his wife and two children in a financial crisis. Were Floyd still in the FDNY, they would have been eligible for hundreds of thousands of dollars in survivor benefits.

Assemblywoman Rajkumar's bill will grant retroactive pension eligibility to Floyd, giving his family the support they need in their time of mourning.

Assemblywoman Rajkumar said, "My bill provides Derek Floyd's family with the financial lifeline they need in their time of grief, showing to them and the entire world our profound gratitude for his sacrifices. Floyd honorably served our Nation as a Marine and served our City as one of New York's Bravest. Now is the time for us to serve him and his family. I will not allow his family to be financially devastated. Our City's pension fund must provide them the support they deserve for Floyd's life of service."

Iran-Israel war keeps world in suspense

THE SITUATION IN WEST ASIA HAS BECOME MORE VOLATILE AND HOLDS DANGEROUS IMPLICATIONS

"BY ATTACKING THE IRANIAN CONSULATE IN DAMASCUS - A PROTECTED FACILITY UNDER THE INTERNATIONAL CONVENTIONS - ISRAEL SENT A CLEAR MESSAGE TO IRAN THAT ITS AGGRESSIVE ACTIONS WOULD NOT GO UNPUNISHED AND THAT TEL AVIV WOULD GO TO ANY EXTENT TO STRIKE DIRECTLY AT TEHRAN. THE LATTER HAD ALSO AVOIDED ATTACKING ISRAEL, FEARFUL OF AMERICA'S 'IRONCLAD' SUPPORT FOR TEL AVIV AND THE ADVERSE IMPACT OF A LARGE-SCALE CONFLICT ON ITS ECONOMY, WHICH IS REELING UNDER HIGH INFLATION, LOW ECONOMIC GROWTH, SHORTAGE OF VARIOUS COMMODITIES DUE TO SANCTIONS AND DOMESTIC DISCONTENT. IRAN WAS OBLIGED TO TAKE THIS SYMBOLIC ACTION TO RETAIN ITS CREDIBILITY AMONG ITS PEOPLE, FOREIGN PROXIES AND OTHER COUNTRIES SUPPORTING IT."



Tinderbox: The rivalry between Israel and Iran is turning more vicious as both sides are prepared to launch attacks at each other

Iran reportedly fired about 350 missiles and drones at Israel on April 13 in response to Israel's attack on its consulate in Damascus on April 1, which had resulted in the killing of seven senior military officials, including Gen Mohammad Reza Zahedi, who was handling Iran's relations with the Hezbollah in Lebanon. About 115-130 missiles targeting Israel were intercepted by the Israeli and allied air defenses; others failed in flight and did not reach their target. Iran had alerted the Americans through Swiss, Iraqi, Turkish and Jordanian sources 72 hours in advance about the attack, though without specifying the exact time. Thus, there was no damage, except serious injuries to a seven-year-old Israeli girl. The attack was largely symbolic; the Iranians wanted to tell Israel that they had the capability to hurt it.

It would be difficult for Israel to attack Iran without America's support. Any direct assault by Israel on Tehran's nuclear or military facilities can provoke it.

Tel Aviv's reaction was full of indignation, with the Israeli war cabinet favoring retaliation, though it was divided over the timing and scale of the response. US President Joe Biden told PM Benjamin Netanyahu that Israel had won by thwarting the missiles and that the US would not take part in any counter-offensive against Iran. Two senior Israeli ministers said Tel Aviv would not act alone and build a regional coalition against Iran. The Israeli attack indicated a change of strategy as it had in the past targeted the Iranian associates or proxies mostly in countries involved in supplying weapons or other support to the 'resistance' groups (except nuclear scientists in Iran). Tehran's support for the Hamas in its audacious

attack on Israel in October last year, continuous missile attacks by the Hezbollah in recent days and Houthi attacks on Israeli and American ships in the Red Sea indicated that Iran was feeling emboldened.

By attacking the Iranian consulate in Damascus - a protected facility under the international conventions - Israel sent a clear message to Iran that its aggressive actions would not go unpunished and that Tel Aviv would go to any extent to strike directly at Tehran. The latter had also avoided attacking Israel, fearful of America's 'ironclad' support for Tel Aviv and the adverse impact of a large-scale conflict on its economy, which is reeling under high inflation, low economic growth, shortage of various commodities due to sanctions and domestic discontent. Iran was obliged to take this symbolic action to retain its credibility among its people, foreign proxies and other countries supporting it.

The Arab states were divided in their reaction to the Iranian attack. Saudi Arabia and the UAE reportedly passed on intelligence to the US on Iran's plans to attack Israel, and it helped thwart the massive assault. Jordan actively participated in shooting drones heading to Israel. Several Arab countries allowed the use of their airspace to intercept the Iranian missiles and drones, and some even supplied their forces for assistance. Egypt called for restraint on both sides.

As the Iranian attack became imminent, the US ordered the deployment of aircraft and missile defense systems in the region and coordinated actions between Israel and Arab governments. As per reports, the US operations center in Qatar tracked the missiles and drones launched by Iran through its radars in the Gulf countries.

This information was sent to fighter jets, ships and missile defense systems operating in the region. As soon as the drones and missiles came within range, they were shot down mostly by American and Israeli fighters and some by British, French and Jordanian warplanes.

Besides President Biden, leaders from the UK, Germany, France and other countries have appealed to Israel not to retaliate following the attack. India has asked both countries to go for immediate de-escalation, exercise restraint, step back from violence and return to the path of diplomacy. China expressed 'deep concern' and called on "influential countries (read the US) to play a constructive role in maintaining regional peace and stability". Russia said, "all disagreements be resolved exclusively by political and diplomatic methods". The UN Security Council held an emergency meeting on April 14 to discuss this subject but ended it without any further action.

It would be extremely difficult for Israel to attack Iran directly without America's support. Any direct attack by Israel on Iran's nuclear or military facilities can provoke Tehran and its proxies to launch large-scale missile attacks against Tel Aviv, causing considerable devastation. Tehran has the ability to launch massive drone attacks against the US and allied ships in the Persian Gulf and disrupt the supply of oil and other maritime and air traffic between Europe and Asia. The Biden administration is not in favor of widening the conflict between Israel and Hamas. The Israeli offensive in Gaza has caused widespread devastation, which has angered several important groups in the US, whose support President Biden needs to secure his re-election in November.

The rivalry between Israel and Iran is turning more vicious as both sides are prepared to launch attacks at each other. Iran is looking more to China and Russia as its new allies and has lost interest in the revival of its cooperation with the West. It is not willing to accept the new political and economic framework of cooperation (Abraham Accords) being promoted by the US and wants to reshape the regional order as per its priorities (anti-Americanism, anti-Israelism and the triumph of the Islamic world over the West). The Netanyahu government has shown no inclination to accept the two-state solution to resolve the Palestinian issue. The conflict between Israel and Hamas continues, with no sign of a ceasefire as yet. The Iran-Israel clash is making the situation in West Asia more volatile and unpredictable, with dangerous implications for the world.

Poll rhetoric threatens India's plurality

"ELECTION RHETORIC MUST REMAIN WITHIN THE LIMITS OF CIVILIZED DISCOURSE. THE PURSUIT OF POLITICAL POWER CANNOT BE WITHOUT ETHICAL MARKERS, FOR THAT WILL TAKE US ON A DANGEROUS ROAD OF NATIONAL AND SOCIAL FRAGMENTATION. I WRITE THIS WITH A SENSE OF DEEP CONCERN ABOUT OUR COUNTRY, WHOSE ABILITY TO ACCOMMODATE INCREDIBLE DIVERSITY AND SUSTAIN A VIBRANT DEMOCRACY HAS BEEN OUR PRIDE AND THE ENVY OF THE WORLD. IT IS THIS MOST PRECIOUS OF ASSETS, HONED OVER THE CENTURIES, WHICH IS IN DANGER OF BEING LOST FOREVER. THIS IS A TREASURE WHICH A FUTURE VISHVAGURU MAY BE UNABLE TO RESURRECT."

India's compelling reality is its immense diversity. No political dispensation, no matter how powerful and ideologically driven it may be, can succeed in putting a monochromatic frame over this. Ours is a shared culture, but the emphasis lies on the aspect of sharing, not of adhering. It's a crossroads culture, created through the assimilation of influences India was exposed to through the millennia. It lay at the intersecting point of the caravan routes from Central Asia, stretching into the West Asia and to

the Mediterranean, and the maritime sea routes connecting it to both the eastern and western flanks of the Indian Ocean. Just as Indian religious and political thought, languages and art and architecture flowed out to these geographies outwards from the subcontinent, so, too, did corresponding influences from the latter spread across India. This has bequeathed to Indian culture and to the temperament of its people an innate cosmopolitanism, which makes Indians one of the most adaptable people in the world. We have been the original global citizens of the world.

It is a matter of pride that the country has been able to conduct elections on an unprecedented scale every five years and that there has been a smooth & uneventful transfer of power.

When India hosted the G20 summit in September 2023, it was most appropriate to have Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam (the whole world is one family) as its defining motto. But to embrace the whole world, one must begin with embracing the people of one's own country. This is also the reason why the Preamble to the Constitution lays as much stress on fraternity as it does on liberty and equality. Fraternity is particularly important for a diverse country like India. It creates a sense of affinity that transcends differences in caste, creed or religion and in the ways of living. It is fraternity which is the true basis of nationhood. Of belonging to a common cause and engaged in the pursuit of a shared national mission.

The framers of the Constitution recognized that Indian nationalism would have to be built on acknowledging rather than suppressing the multiple identities of its people. And yet, in the final analysis, they did not quite trust

the people of India to successfully balance their separate identities with an overarching concept of equal citizenship. In its final shape, its subsequent amendments and in laws passed by the legislature, the Constitution enabled the coercive power of the state to be progressively strengthened at the expense of the citizen. The state became selective in allowing some assertions of separate identities but in seeking to suppress others, the touchstone being what best served political interests of the moment. Suppression of some identities would be justified on the grounds of a threat to national unity. Others may be promoted and even legitimized to ostensibly advance national unity. The state is able to use its control and influence over the media and information channels to demonize some communities but ennoble others. Political rhetoric, then, aligns with the strategy of the moment. Such rhetoric often takes on a hysterical pitch, which drowns out all reasoned arguments.

In a democracy, the holding of free and fair elections is indispensable but not sufficient. An independent media and a vibrant civil society provide the means to safeguard the ordinary citizen against transgressions by the state. They hold the state accountable on behalf of the citizens and constitute an alternative channel of information for the people. This is also the role played by a powerful and independent judiciary. In history, it has often been the case that the national security and national unity arguments have been used as powerful labels to de-legitimize independent institutions and dissenting voices and, eventually, political competition.

India is midway through its 18th General Election. It is a matter of pride

that the country has been able to successfully conduct these elections on an unprecedented scale every five years and that there has been a smooth and uneventful transfer of political power without violence or challenge. An independent Election Commission makes certain that all political parties and politicians play by the rules when seeking votes during their election campaigns. It is expected to make sure that candidates do not use religion, caste or creed to mobilize votes, but it is not always successful, and sometimes it is allegedly selective in imposing penalties. But during the ongoing elections, the rhetoric indulged in by certain political parties and leaders has crossed all limits. There has been a most vulgar and scurrilous attack against our Muslim citizens and charges of 'anti-national' activities have been repeatedly flung at political rivals. There is a thick fog of deliberate misinformation and outright lies designed to mislead and confuse voters. We profess Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam and yet indulge in openly creating dangerous fissures in our fragile social fabric. I have said this before and will repeat it: an overarching national unity cannot be constructed on a Hindu-Muslim binary.

It is easy to dismiss the offensive and threatening statements made against India's Muslims as election rhetoric, which will dissipate once the polls are over, but this is not true. The hurt and pervasive fear they have inflicted will simmer long after the elections conclude. Words once spoken cannot be retracted. The damage is done. As Rahim has said in one of his most celebrated couplets:

*Rahiman jihwa bawari; Kah gai sarag paatal
Aapu toh kahi bhitar rahi; Jooti khaat kapaal.*

(My wayward tongue has said all that lies between heaven and hell. It has said what it wanted and retreated, but it is my head which is receiving painful blows as a consequence).

Election rhetoric must remain within the limits of civilized discourse. The pursuit of political power cannot be without ethical markers, for that will take us on a dangerous road of national and social fragmentation. I write this with a sense of deep concern about our country, whose ability to accommodate incredible diversity and sustain a vibrant democracy has been our pride and the envy of the world. It is this most precious of assets, honed over the centuries, which is in danger of being lost forever. This is a treasure which a future Vishvaguru may be unable to resurrect.

Autocratization poses a threat to democracy

THE THEORY OF AUTOCRATISATION ALERTS US TO THE FACT THAT POLITICAL PRACTICES AND POLICIES CANNOT BE DIVIDED INTO NEAT COMPARTMENTS

And thousands of Indians wrote to the Election Commission to call out the objectionable language used by the PM to describe our fellow citizens amid the Lok Sabha elections. India has been and will continue to be a home for a million mutinies. We have experienced the process of autocratization. Whether the powers that be will or will not achieve their objective of establishing a closed autocracy depends on our vote."

Around 35 years after the fall of the Berlin Wall and the collapse of socialist societies - when Francis Fukuyama triumphantly declared that the future belonged to liberal democracy and the West proceeded to mandate global norms of democracy - we are witnessing waves of autocratization in the Netherlands, Hungary, Italy, Burundi, Israel, Russia and India.

The V-Dem (Varieties of Democracy) Institute, based at the University of Gothenburg, Sweden, stated in its 2024 democracy report that India was one of the worst autocratizers. The country had been downgraded by V-Dem to the status of an 'electoral autocracy' in 2018. Democracy in the country, stated the report, has declined even further on multiple metrics. V-Dem reports categorize countries into four regime types based on their score on the liberal democratic index: liberal democracy, electoral democracy, electoral autocracy and closed autocracy. The report states that 71 per cent of the world's population (5.7 billion people) lives in autocracies. This represents a sharp increase from 48 per cent 10 years ago. A major decline in democracy has taken place in eastern Europe and South and Central Asia. The level of liberal democracy enjoyed by the average Indian is now reportedly down to the levels of 1975, i.e., the Emergency.

According to the report, a country falls into the category of liberal democracy when it institutionalizes free and fair elections, ensures judicial independence, establishes robust constraints on executive overreach, rigorously safeguards civil liberties and upholds equality before the law. The government in India has occasionally used laws on sedition, defamation and counterterrorism to silence critics. A third electoral term

for the BJP government "could lead to further autocratization, given the already substantial democratic decline under Modi's leadership and the enduring crackdown on minority rights and civil society," the V-Dem report says.

Autocratization is diametrically opposite to democratization or the process of deepening democracy. It signifies that today, democracy does not die in military coups, as in Chile in 1973, or through election malpractices. Autocrats now consider sudden takeovers of power politically imprudent. The use of violence to take over the government and the consequent loss of lives provoke outbreaks of outrage and resistance, or, at the least, simmering discontent. Democracy dies when governments slowly but surely subvert institutions that realize and protect democracy to a point where only elections remain. Multi-party elections are held, but under conditions that are palpably unfair. Above all, autocratization implies a massive concentration of power in the chief executive. Elected executives weaken checks and balances and implement measures to prevent the Opposition from challenging power.

Crucially, the substantial decline of core institutions and practices of democracy takes place under the guise of legal proprieties. The process is prolonged, measured and opaque. Contemporary autocrats have perfected the art of eroding democratic institutions while maintaining democratic façades. Piecemeal changes are cloaked in appeals to hyper-nationalism and majoritarianism and through anti-minority and anti-immigrant rhetoric.

Autocratization is a process, not a predestined end to full-blown

authoritarianism. The outcome of the process cannot be predicted. We cannot assume whether there will be a complete democratic breakdown or a return to democracy. Politics is chancy, contingent and unpredictable. Miracles can happen, perhaps. Elections, even if held under unfair conditions, can either kindle the democratic spirit, or spur the stabilization of authoritarian regimes.

What is crucial is the ability of citizens to comprehend the gradual withering away of democracy to the point where the vote is the only weapon available to them. Nevertheless, the power of the vote gives us hope. Perhaps competition between different agendas might enable us, once again, to become what we are meant to be - Aristotle's Zoon Politikon (political animal). Perhaps the autocrat will be deterred by the fact that the idea and ideals of democracy have become the standard for judging existing regimes. After all, after the end of the Cold War, democracy, as a global norm, has been increasingly shaping expectations.

Finally, the theory of autocratization alerts us to the fact that political practices and policies cannot be divided into neat compartments: democracy vs authoritarianism or dictatorship or fascism. There are elements of authoritarian rule in a democratic government. And autocrats or aspiring autocrats hesitate to adopt policies that draw international condemnation or lead to an uprising within the country.

Feroze Gandhi to Rahul Gandhi: Rae Bareli's tryst with Congress

The strong foundations that Feroze Gandhi laid in the constituency were later nurtured and strengthened by his wife and former prime minister Indira Gandhi, who won from the seat in 1967, 1971 and 1980, followed by friends and family members of the Gandhi family.

The surprise nomination of Rahul Gandhi from Uttar Pradesh's Rae Bareli brings the focus back on the VVIP segment which was first represented in the Lok Sabha by the former Congress president's grandfather Feroze Gandhi, who held the seat in the first two elections after Independence.

The strong foundations that Feroze Gandhi laid in the constituency were later nurtured and strengthened by his wife and former prime minister Indira Gandhi, who won from the seat in 1967, 1971 and 1980, followed by friends and family members of the Gandhi family.

Indira Gandhi contested from two seats in 1980 -- Rae Bareli and Medak in Telangana -- and chose to retain the Medak seat. Arun Nehru won the 1980 bypoll and subsequently in 1984.

From Arun Nehru, who was late prime minister Rajiv Gandhi's right-hand man, to Sheila Kaul, another Gandhi kin, Rae Bareli returned several of the Gandhi family members and aides to the Lok Sabha.

The seat was held by Congress' R P Singh in the 1960 bypoll after the demise of Feroze Gandhi, and by another Congress leader Baij Nath Kureel in 1962.

Sheila Kaul, an aunt of Indira Gandhi, represented the seat in 1989 and 1991.

In 1999, another friend of the Gandhis, Satish Sharma represented the Rae Bareli constituency, till Sonia Gandhi shifted there.

The only time the Congress did not represent the seat was in the wake of the Emergency in 1977 when Janata Party's Raj Narain defeated Indira Gandhi, who was then the prime minister, and BJP's Ashoke Singh in 1996 and 1998.

Although Sonia Gandhi upon entering electoral politics chose to make her electoral foray from neighbouring Amethi Lok Sabha seat in 1999, a seat her husband Rajiv Gandhi had held earlier, she soon vacated it for her son Rahul's debut in politics in 2004.

Sonia Gandhi subsequently held Rae Bareli four times between 2004 and 2019, although of late, her winning margins began dwindling. The party's calculation behind fielding Rahul from Rae Bareli instead of Amethi, also rests on the conclusion that Rae Bareli is a better, safer seat for the former Congress president, who lost Amethi to BJP's Smriti Irani in 2019 by nearly 50,000 votes.

Amid criticism that the Congress had given a walkout to Irani in Amethi, sources said, the party in its wisdom believed that Rae Bareli's historical, emotional and electoral importance for the Gandhi family was higher than that of

The Congress's 11th-hour, early-morning decision on Amethi and Rae Bareli contained a big twist. Rahul Gandhi, who was expected to make an all-out bid to win back Amethi, has been announced as the party candidate from Rae Bareli, the seat vacated recently by his mother Sonia Gandhi when she moved to Rajya Sabha. In Amethi, the family bastion which defected to the BJP five years ago, the Congress will be represented by Kishori Lal Sharma, a longtime loyalist of the Gandhi family. Priyanka Gandhi Vadra could not be convinced to contest from Rae Bareli -- which she had nursed for over a decade on her mother's behalf.

The Congress decision was announced on May 3 after weeks of suspense.

Both candidates will file their papers today -- the last day for filing nominations for the fifth phase of election on May 20.

Rahul Gandhi will be filing his nomination later in the day from Rae Bareli. Sources say Rahul Gandhi will also hold a roadshow before filing his nomination papers. Soon after the candidates were announced for both prestigious seats, Ms Vadra congratulated KL Sharma and said his "loyalty and dedication" will help him win the election.

"Our family has had a long association with Kishori Lal Sharma ji. His passion for public service is an example in itself. Today, it is a matter of joy that the Congress Party has made Shri Kishori Lal Ji a candidate from Amethi. Kishori Lal Ji's loyalty and dedication towards duty will definitely bring him success in this election," she said.

Amethi.

In her farewell message to the people of Rae Bareli, Sonia Gandhi had expressed confidence that the seat which always stood by her and the Gandhis will continue to support her family in future also.

In the message on February 15, former party chief Sonia Gandhi informed voters of her Rae Bareli constituency that she will not contest the upcoming Lok Sabha polls due to health and age issues.

In an emotional message to the constituents of the segment she has represented since 2004, the 77-year-old also threw subtle hints of a possible entry of a member of her family from Rae Bareli.

"I am proud to say that whatever I am today, I am because of you and I have always done my best to honour your trust. Now on account of health and age issues, I will not contest the next Lok Sabha election," she said in the message.

"After this decision, I will not have the opportunity to serve you directly but my heart and soul will always remain with you. I know that you will stand by me and my family in future, just as you have in the past," she said in the message.

The message to the voters came a day after she filed her nomination for the Rajya Sabha seat from Rajasthan.

She entered the Rajya Sabha for the first time and was the second member of the Gandhi family to do so, after Indira Gandhi who was a member of the upper house from 1964 to 1967.

In the message to voters, Sonia Gandhi further said, "My family in Delhi is incomplete without you. It completes when I come to Rae Bareli and meet all of you. My ties with you are very old. I have inherited these ties as a good fortune from my in-laws."

Noting that ties of her family with Rae Bareli are "very deep rooted", she said Rae Bareli sent her father-in-law Feroze Gandhi to Lok Sabha in the first general election held after Independence.

After that, you accepted my mother-in-law Indira Gandhi, she noted, adding that ever since, our relationship grew stronger on the difficult road to affection despite the highs and lows of life and our faith in this bond grew stronger.

"You allowed me space to walk along on this shining path. I came to you after losing my mother-in-law and husband and you accepted me with open arms," the former Congress chief said.

Sending her respect to elders and love to youngsters, she had said in her message, "I will see you soon".

Why phase 3 polls in Gujarat, Karnataka, Goa are crucial for BJP

Ten states and two Union territories, with 94 constituencies, are voting in the phase three of the Lok Sabha elections 2024 on May 7. The states in the fray are Goa, Gujarat, Assam, Bihar, Madhya Pradesh, Karnataka, Chhattisgarh, Maharashtra, and Uttar Pradesh.

Gujarat, Karnataka and Goa will be under the spotlight as all Lok Sabha seats here go to polls on May 7.

Two Goa seats

Goa's two Lok Sabha seats—North Goa and South Goa—will see a two-way contest between the Congress and the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP). Congress candidate Ramakant Khalap will fight against BJP's Shripad Yesso Naik from North Goa, while INC's Viriato Fernandes has been fielded against NDA-led BJP's Pallavi Dempo in South Goa. Dempo, is the richest candidate in the fray in the third phase of polling on May 7. In 2019, the BJP had won the North Goa seat while the Congress bagged the South Goa seat.

Gujarat, PM Modi's home turf

Voting will also take place on 25 out of 26 seats in Gujarat. The only exception is Surat, where BJP candidate Mukesh Dalal secured an uncontested victory



after the nomination of Congress' Nilesh Kumbhani was rejected, and several other contenders stepped back from the race last week.

The Election Commission of India (ECI) earlier informed that Gujarat and Maharashtra had the most nominations out of the 12 states and Union Territories voting in this phase. "In phase 3, Gujarat had a maximum of 658 nominations from 26 Parliamentary constituencies, followed by Maharashtra with 519 nominations from 11," the EC said.

In this phase, 2,963 nominations were filed for 95 Parliamentary constituencies across 12 states and UTs going to the

polls for the Lok Sabha Elections 2024.

For the BJP, Gujarat remains crucial for being the home state of Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Union Home Minister Amit Shah. The saffron party has been in power in the Gujarat Legislative Assembly with an absolute majority for about three decades since 1995.

Gujarat is also key because the BJP is facing protests from the crucial Kshatriya community against Union Minister and BJP's Rajkot Lok Sabha candidate Parshottam Rupala, over remarks made by him against the community. The Prime Minister is

campaigning in Gujarat since May 1.

The voting in the third phase will begin at 7 am on May 7 and conclude at 6 pm, providing ample opportunity for citizens to exercise their franchise. Voting for the seven-phase polls to elect the 18th Lok Sabha started on April 19 and will conclude on June 1. The counting of votes will take place on June 4.

Prajwal Revanna jolt in Karnataka

Fourteen parliamentary seats of Karnataka will also vote in the third phase on May 7. Karnataka sends 28 members to the Lok Sabha. Fourteen seats of the state voted in the second phase on April 26.

Karnataka matters for the BJP for it is the only state in the South where it has gained a dominant presence after winning 25 of the 28 seats in 2019 Lok Sabha elections. It is also key for the BJP's 'Mission South', as the party has failed to make inroads in southern states other than Karnataka and Telangana.

Days ahead of phase 3 polling, the BJP and the JD(S), the alliance partners, have found themselves in a spot after the sexual abuse episode involving Prajwal Revanna, who is also the grandson of former Prime Minister HD Deve Gowda.

This includes signing two MoUs with the Ministry of Public Works, Transport, Housing, and Urban Development of the Government of El Salvador, with investments totaling US\$2 billion for a metro line project and US\$475 million for the procurement of 5000 buses. Similarly, Lakshmi Capital has made significant strides by signing Letters of Intent (LoIs) for five impactful projects with the Municipality of Xela in Guatemala, totaling an investment of US\$1.2 billion. These projects encompass a hydroelectric system, cable car system, supply of 700 buses, a waste management plant, and a 75MW solar energy plant in the region. Additionally, an LoI has been signed for the ambitious Guatemalan Interocceanic Corridor (GIC) project, a Dry Corridor Project requiring a US\$10 billion investment between Lakshmi Capital and Grupo Odepal, S.A. This project aims to establish a cutting-edge Multimodal Transport System spanning a 372-kilometer-long and 140-meter-wide strip of land, linking the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans. RAW official was involved in assassination plot of Sikh separatist leader Pannun: media report

WASHINGTON, D.C. (TIP): A RAW official identified as Vikram Yadav was involved in the assassination plot of Sikh separatist leader Gurpatwant Singh Pannun in the US and the move was approved by the then Indian spy agency

chief Samant Goel, according to an investigative media report published on Monday, April 29.

Pannun is one of the main leaders of the Khalistan movement and the legal advisor and spokesperson for Sikhs for Justice (SFJ), which aims to promote the idea of a separate Sikh state. The Indian government has declared Pannun a terrorist.

In an investigative report, The Washington Post newspaper said, "That India would pursue lethal operations in North America has stunned Western security officials."

"Yadav's identity and affiliation, which have not previously been reported,

provide the most explicit evidence to date that the assassination plan - ultimately thwarted by US authorities - was directed from within the Indian spy service," the daily reported.

"Higher-ranking (Research and Analysis Wing) RAW officials have also been implicated, according to current and former Western security officials, as part of a sprawling investigation by the CIA, FBI and other agencies that has mapped potential links to (Prime Minister Narendra Modi) Modi's inner circle," it said.

The top American daily -- which is now owned by American billionaire Jeff Bezos, founder and head of Amazon --

said it is investigating a global surge in such campaigns of cross-border repression, as well as the global forces leading India and other nations to employ tactics normally associated with the world's most repressive governments.

For this story, Post reporters conducted dozens of interviews with officials, experts and targeted individuals in New Delhi, Washington, Ottawa, London, Prague and Berlin, it said.

Excise policy 'scam': Delhi High Court asks CBI, ED to respond to Manish Sisodia's pleas for bail

The Delhi High Court on Friday, May 3, sought response of the CBI and ED on former deputy chief minister Manish Sisodia's pleas seeking bail in the corruption and money-laundering cases lodged in relation to the alleged excise policy scam.

Justice Swarana Kanta Sharma issued notices to the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) and the Enforcement Directorate (ED) on Sisodia's pleas challenging a trial court's April 30 order by which his bail petitions were dismissed.

The high court listed the matter for May 8. Sisodia, in an interim application, urged the court to continue the trial court's order allowing him to meet his ailing wife once a week in custody, during pendency of his pleas.

As the counsel for the ED submitted that the probe agency has no objection if the trial court order is continued, Justice Sharma allowed the request.

Political space given to separatism in Canada: India on Trudeau's Nijjar remarks

India on May 2 rejected fresh comments by Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau on the killing of Khalistani terrorist Hardeep Singh Nijjar and said the remarks once again illustrated the political space given in Canada to separatism, extremism and violence.

Trudeau addressed a Khalsa Day event in Toronto on April 28 that was attended by some pro-Khalistan people.

On the sidelines of the event, he told the media that the killing of Nijjar in British Columbia in June last year created a "problem" and that he cannot ignore it, in an apparent reference to his earlier allegations of involvement of Indian agents in the assassination.

"PM Trudeau has made such remarks earlier as well. His remarks illustrate once again the political space that has been given in Canada to separatism, extremism, and violence," external affairs ministry spokesperson Randhir Jaiswal said at his weekly media briefing.

Modi takes swipe at Rahul Gandhi over Rae Bareli move: 'Don't run...'

KOLKATA (TIP)

Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Friday, May 3, took a swipe at Congress leader Rahul Gandhi over the latter's nomination from Uttar Pradesh's Rae Bareli Lok Sabha constituency, attributing his decision to the fear of losing Kerala's Wayanad seat.

Addressing a rally in West Bengal, PM Modi dared the Wayanad MP to face the BJP in Amethi and not "run or be scared".

PM Modi referred to his old remark that Rahul Gandhi had been searching for a safe seat after voting in Wayanad.

"I had already said that the Shehzada was going to lose in Wayanad. I had said that as soon as the polling was completed in Wayanad, he would start looking for another seat... He is so scared of Amethi that he is running towards Rae Bareli. They ask everyone 'daro mat'. Today, I also ask them, 'daro mat, bhago mat'... (don't be scared, don't run)," he said.

PM Narendra Modi also took a swipe at Rahul Gandhi's mother Sonia Gandhi for vacating the Rae Bareli seat and moving to the Rajya Sabha.

"I had already said in the parliament that their (Congress) biggest leader will not dare to fight elections and she will run away. She ran away to Rajasthan and came to the Rajya Sabha," he added.

After a long suspense, the Congress today announced that Rahul Gandhi



will contest the Lok Sabha elections from Rae Bareli.

Rahul Gandhi's loyalist, Kishori Lal Sharma will contest from Amethi.

Rahul Gandhi entered electoral politics in 2004 from Amethi, a family stronghold. He won the seat in 2004, 2009 and 2014. However, in 2019, Smriti Irani breached the once-impregnable fortress as she defeated Gandhi from the UP seat.

Rahul Gandhi's father, late prime minister Rajiv Gandhi had been Amethi's MP from 1981 until his death in 1991. Sonia Gandhi also represented the constituency in the Lok Sabha, in 1999. Earlier, it was speculated that Priyanka Gandhi Vadra might contest the Lok Sabha polls from her mother's seat. Amethi and Rae Bareli will go to polls on May 20.

Amethi candidate Kishori Lal Sharma thanks Sonia Gandhi, Rahul Gandhi for fielding 'small worker'

Kishori Lal Sharma, the Congress

candidate from Uttar Pradesh's Amethi, expressed gratitude to party's national president Mallikarjun Kharge, former party chiefs Rahul Gandhi, Sonia Gandhi and Priyanka Gandhi Vadra for fielding him from the Gandhi family's stronghold.

"I would like to thank Khargeji, Sonia ji, Rahul ji, and Priyanka ji for giving a 'chotte' karyakarta (small worker) like me an opportunity to contest from a seat that is their family bastion. I will work hard. I have been working in this constituency for the last 40 years. I came here in 1987 as a Youth Congress member and from then I have been here. I started my career with Rajiv ji. In 1987, Rajiv ji brought me here. Then the circumstances were such that I stayed here. We made Sonia ji win from here, Rajiv ji win from here," Kishori Lal Sharma said.

Speaking on Bharatiya Janata Party's (BJP) allegations that Congress leader Rahul Gandhi "ran away" from the seat, Sharma said that Gandhi was fighting for the whole nation.

"Rahul Gandhi is not someone who runs away from the ground. He is fighting for the whole country. As far as votes are concerned, no one can predict anything. It all lies in the hands of the public. Also, I will be meeting with Priyanka Gandhi today," he said.

India slams Pakistan at UN, says it harbours most dubious track record on all aspects

UNITED NATIONS (TIP)

In a sharp retort, India has said Pakistan harbours a "most dubious track record" on all aspects, as it slammed "destructive and pernicious" remarks made by Islamabad's envoy in the UN General Assembly here.

India's Permanent Representative to the UN Ambassador Ruchira Kamboj's stern response came after Pakistan's UN envoy Munir Akram made lengthy remarks against India, including references to Kashmir, the Citizenship (Amendment) Act and the Ram Temple in Ayodhya, during his address to the UN General Assembly meeting on 'Culture of Peace'.

"One final point...in this Assembly, as we endeavour to cultivate a culture of peace amid these challenging times, our focus remains steadfast on constructive dialogue. We thus choose to set aside the remarks from a certain delegation, which not only lacks decorum but also detracts from our collective efforts due to their destructive and pernicious nature," Kamboj said on May 2.

"We would strongly encourage that delegation to align with the central principles of respect and diplomacy that must always guide our discussions. Or is that too much to ask of a country that harbours a most dubious track record on all aspects in itself?" she said.

Kamboj asserted that terrorism stands in direct opposition to the culture of peace and the core teachings of all religions, which advocate compassion, understanding and coexistence.

"It sows discord, breeds hostility and undermines the universal values of respect and harmony that underpin cultural and religious traditions worldwide. It is essential for Member States to work together actively to nurture a genuine culture of peace and to view the world as a united family, as my country strongly believes," she said.

MEA slams US body: Biased report reeks of political agenda

India on Thursday, May 2, hit out at the US Commission on International Religious Freedom's (USCIRF) annual report for recommending to the federal government that India be named as a "country of particular concern" (CPC) for its severe violations of human rights and religious freedoms.

The USCIRF report has made this recommendation for the fifth consecutive year and it has been rejected four times by the US State Department.

"The USCIRF is known as a biased organisation with a political agenda, they continue to publish their propaganda on India masquerading as a report and try to interfere in the world's largest electoral exercise, which they will never succeed," hit back MEA spokesperson Randhir Jaiswal.

It was not just Indians but people from all over the world who have accused the USCIRF report of pussyfooting around Israel's ongoing brutal depredation in Gaza. In 34 references to Israel in its report, a big majority relate to harassment of Jews in countries such as Iran and Russia after Tel Aviv's undiscriminating military assault on Gaza, which entered its 210th day on Thursday. The CPC label is a designation reserved for the world's worst violators of religious freedom. While the USCIRF has named India, it has failed to pull up Israel, which stands indicted by several global bodies ranging from the UN General Assembly (UNGA) to the International Court of Justice (ICJ).

Tharoor warns of 'an India where people are scared to speak on phone'

Congress leader Shashi Tharoor on Thursday, May 2, said in Goa that the BJP government at the Centre posed a fundamental danger to the "idea of India" enshrined in the Constitution.

At a corner meeting in South Goa's Verna, Tharoor said, "Our democracy is definitely under threat. When you vote on May 7, one of the great questions you have to ask yourself is...What kind of India do you want to live in? What kind of India do you want your children to grow up in? Do you want an India that is fearful? Where people are scared to say things on the phone because they don't know who in the government is listening, where people are afraid to express their views openly because of consequences?"

"...Or do you want, instead, an India where people are free to express their views, free to eat what they want, to dress as they wish, to love whom they like, or are you prepared to accept a government that feels it has a place in your bedroom, in your kitchen, in your safe, in your dining room? Because that's the kind of government we have in India today," he said.

Hassan sex abuse row: Prajwal Revanna accused of rape after fresh complaint

BENGALURU (TIP)

Rape and kidnapping cases have been filed against JD(S) MP Prajwal Revanna and his father and former Karnataka minister HD Revanna in the sex tapes scandal. These are the two fresh cases against the father-son duo in the matter.

The rape case was filed by the Special Investigation Team (SIT) of the Karnataka Police. It has been filed under Section 376 of the IPC. It lists charges under Section 376(2) (N) (committing rape repeatedly), 506 (criminal intimidation), 354A(1)(ii) (demand for sexual favour), 354(B) (assault or criminal force on a woman with the intention to disrobe her), and 354(C) (uploading of nude or semi-nude pictures), and the IT Act.

Prajwal Revanna, who is the grandson of former Prime Minister and JD(S) patriarch HD Deve Gowda, has been named as the sole accused in the FIR. The SIT officers submitted the FIR to the magistrate's court on Thursday.

Besides, a kidnapping case has been lodged against the Karnataka MP by one Raju HD under Section 364A (kidnapping for ransom) and 365 (kidnapping with the intent to secretly or wrongfully confine a person) of the IPC. The complainant claimed that his mother was forcibly taken away on April 29 and later videos of her being sexually harassed went viral on social media.

In the complaint, Raju alleged that he and his mother worked at the Revanna house and farmhouse for six years, and it had been three years since they quit. Shortly before the Lok Sabha elections

began, a person identified as Satish went to their house and took his mother to a different region.

On the day of the election, Satish brought his mother back home and said to Raju and his mother to elope if the police came to their house. "If they come to you, let me know, I'll take you away," the complainant was allegedly told.

On April 29, around 9 pm, Satish went to Raju's house again and forcibly took the latter's mother, saying HD Revanna ordered her to be brought to him, citing a case will be filed against the complainant, and he might also go to jail if the police find him. On May 1, Raju learnt from his friends and his mother's sexual assault video had gone viral. Later, his relatives told him that in the video, his mother's legs could be seen tied.

On May 1 night, Raju claimed to have called Satish to know about the whereabouts of his mother, pleading to send her back home. However, the complainant was allegedly intimidated, saying an FIR was filed against her mother over an earlier fight that

involved HD Revanna and where she was seen holding a stick in a photo.

"I don't know where my mother was taken. I fear for her life. I request you to take action under the law and find my mother," Raju wrote in the complaint.

Earlier, a case was registered against Prajwal Revanna and HD Revanna for sexual harassment, intimidation, stalking and outraging the dignity of a woman based on a complaint by a woman who worked at their house.

Prajwal Revanna, who is seeking re-election from Hassan constituency in the ongoing Lok Sabha elections, has been embroiled in a massive controversy after multiple explicit videos purportedly of him were shared widely on social media. The JD(S) MP, however, has alleged the videos were morphed and also lodged a complaint in the matter via his polling agent.

The SIT formed by the Karnataka government issued a global lookout notice against him on Thursday at all immigration centres around the world. Prajwal Revanna fled the country soon after the sexual abuse allegations surfaced, and later was reported to have gone to Frankfurt in Germany on April 26.

Prajwal Revanna was supposed to appear before the SIT on Thursday. He, however, filed a plea with a sessions court in Bengaluru seeking anticipatory bail.

However, the Ministry of External Affairs said that the JD(S) MP did not seek political clearance for his Germany trip.

India lodges protest as Beijing builds infra in PoK's Shaksgam

NEW DELHI (TIP)

India has lodged a strong protest with China for carrying out construction activities in Shaksgam Valley, which the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) said was an illegal attempt to alter the situation on the ground.

Shaksgam Valley is a strategically key region that is part of Pakistan-occupied Kashmir. "We consider Shaksgam Valley our territory and we have never accepted the so-called China-Pakistan agreement of 1963 through which Pakistan unlawfully attempted to cede the area to China. We have always rejected this and have protested to China not to alter the facts on the ground," said MEA spokesperson Randhir Jaiswal. Terming Shaksgam Valley imbroglio as a vexed



issue, he said India had the right to take required steps. "We further reserve the right to take necessary measures and will take all possible steps to safeguard our interests. It is our territory. We have been protesting as and when required. We have taken a very strong stand on it," he underlined. Asked what the prospect of resolution of the standoff on the border in Ladakh was, Jaiswal said these were serious issues and, therefore, were bound to take time. "The next round of

engagements will take place soon to take things forward," he said.

Over the past several years, China has kept up military pressure on India through its incursions across the Line of Actual Control (LAC). While this fact has been recognised by the international community, a study by Northwestern University shows that China's incursions were strategically planned to make a permanent Chinese presence in these areas.

Border transgressions and incursions are well documented in all three sectors of the 3,488-km-long border that India officially shares with China, which has developed military infrastructure and roads in the disputed region, presenting a threat to India.







World Press Freedom Day

Observed on May 3 every year, The United Nations created this day to highlight the basic principles of press freedom worldwide. By celebrating World Press Freedom Day, journalists and supporters of democracy help protect freedom of speech, access to information, and media independence, which are constantly under attack globally.

World Press Freedom Day is observed annually on May 3rd. Established by the United Nations General Assembly in 1993, this day serves to celebrate the fundamental principles of press freedom, assess the state of press freedom throughout the world, defend the media from attacks on their independence, and pay tribute to journalists who have lost their lives in the line of duty.

The day also acts as a reminder to governments of the need to respect and uphold the right to freedom of expression as enshrined in Article 19 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. It highlights the importance of a free, independent, and pluralistic media in fostering transparency, accountability, and democracy.

World Press Freedom Day provides an opportunity to raise awareness about the importance of press freedom and the challenges faced by journalists worldwide, including censorship, harassment, imprisonment, and violence. It also encourages dialogue and collaboration among media professionals, policymakers, civil society organizations, and the public to promote and protect press freedom around the globe.

World Press Freedom Day History

On the recommendation of the twenty-sixth session of UNESCO's General Conference, World Press Freedom Day was proclaimed by the UN General Assembly in December 1993.

May 3 acts as a reminder for the Governments to respect their commitments to press freedom. This day is a reflection for media professionals on issues of press freedom and professionals.

World Press Freedom Day is a support day for media persons who are involved in press freedom, Journalists, media, etc.

World Press Freedom Day 2024 Theme

World Press Freedom Day is observed every year on May 3. It is significant for the press which deals with the information of the public on the Global Scale.

The Theme of World Press Freedom Day 2024 is "A Press for the Planet: Journalism in the Face of the environmental crisis".

Significance

The Significance of World Press Freedom Day was to celebrate the principles of press freedom, to prevent the media from attacks, and to assess the state of press freedom.

The main aim of World Press Freedom Day was to raise awareness of the freedom of the press and freedom of expression. This day also represents a



day of reflection for media professionals about issues of press freedom.

The Global Conference provides an opportunity for journalists, civil society representatives, national authorities, and to work together for identifying solutions.

The United Nations has celebrated World Press Freedom Day before 1993. In 1948, Article 19 said that everyone has the Right to Freedom of opinion, everyone has the right to say their opinion without fear, and everyone has the right to receive and impart their ideas through the Press and Media to the people.

Prizes

UNESCO marks World Press Freedom Day by conferring the UNESCO/Guillermo Cano World Press Freedom Prize on a deserving individual, organisation or institution that has made an outstanding contribution to the defence and/or promotion of press freedom anywhere in the world, especially when this has been achieved in the face of danger. Created in 1997, the prize is awarded on the recommendation of an independent jury of 14 news professionals. Names are submitted by regional and international non-governmental organisations working for press freedom, and by UNESCO member states.

The Prize is named in honour of Guillermo Cano Isaza, a Colombian journalist who was assassinated in front of the offices of his newspaper, El Espectador, in Bogotá, on 17 December 1986. Cano's writings had offended Colombia's powerful drug barons.

UNESCO also marks World Press Freedom Day each year by bringing together media professionals, press freedom organisations and UN agencies to assess the state of press freedom worldwide and discuss solutions for addressing challenges. Each conference is centred on a theme related to press freedom, including good governance, media coverage of terrorism, impunity

and the role of media in post-conflict countries.

UNESCO to host 2024 World Press Freedom Day in Chile

The United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) will host 2024 World Press Freedom Day ceremonies in Santiago, Chile, from May 2 to 4, 2024. Celebrated every May 3, the theme for this year is "A Press for the Planet: Journalism in the face of the Environmental Crisis" and focuses on the importance of journalism and freedom of expression in the context of the current global environmental crisis. The 31st edition of World Press Freedom Day aims to highlight the significant role played by the press, journalism, access, and dissemination of information to ensure and secure a sustainable future that respects the rights of individuals and their diversity of voices, as well as gender equality.

World Press Freedom Day 2024 is an important opportunity for the international community to collectively reflect on these multidimensional challenges, the fundamental role of journalism, and the transformative power that reliable information has to protect our planet, achieve sustainable development, and consolidate democracies.

Partners from the media, academia, and civil society will also organize events in Santiago and around the world centered on this year's theme.

The Day will serve as a platform to bring together key actors and to reflect on the fundamental role of journalism and reliable information in protecting our planet, and discuss topics, including the importance of reliable and accurate information, especially that which denounces and investigates the environmental crisis and its effects.

The conference will touch on the following

The importance of reliable and accurate information, especially that which denounces and investigates the

environmental crisis and its effects.

Violence faced by journalists and communication workers when promoting sustainable development and environmental protection, encouraging a gender-responsive perspective that promotes non-sexist journalistic discourse.

Support for the media to strengthen their institutional capacities to report on climate change and environmental crises, paying special attention to the viability of the media.

Dis- and misinformation about environmental issues and its impact on public and political support for climate action, effective policies, and the protection of vulnerable communities affected by climate change.

Use the occasion to recall the Santiago Declaration, which stresses the importance of respecting media pluralism and cultural, linguistic, and gender diversity as a fundamental factor of our democratic societies and which should be reflected in all media.

The role of other critical voices, such as scientists and artists, will also be discussed. The urgency of tackling the massive waves of dis- and misinformation about the current global environmental crisis will occupy a prominent space in next year's agenda.

World Press Freedom Day 2024 promises to be a pivotal moment for reflection, dialogue, and concerted action towards ensuring a press that is truly dedicated to safeguarding our planet and promoting a sustainable future for all.

Persecution of Journalists

Latin America and the Caribbean continues to be the region with the highest number of murders of journalists, according to the 2022 UNESCO Director-General's Report on the Safety of Journalists and the Danger of Impunity.

Since 1993, more than 1,600 journalists have been killed for reporting the news and bringing information to the public. In nine out of ten cases the killers go unpunished, according to the UNESCO observatory of killed journalists. Impunity leads to more killings and is often a symptom of worsening conflict and the breakdown of law and judicial systems.

While killings are the most extreme form of media censorship, journalists are also subjected to countless threats - ranging from kidnapping, torture and other physical attacks to harassment, particularly in the digital sphere. Threats of violence and attacks against journalists, in particular, create a climate of fear for media professionals, impeding the free circulation of information, opinions and ideas for all

citizens. Women journalists are particularly impacted by threats and attacks, notably by those made online. According to UNESCO's discussion paper, The Chilling: Global trends in online violence against women journalists, 73 percent of the women journalists surveyed said they had been threatened, intimidated and insulted online in connection with their work.

In many cases, threats of violence and attacks against journalists are not properly investigated. This impunity emboldens the perpetrators of the crimes and at the same time has a chilling effect on society, including journalists themselves. UNESCO is concerned that impunity damages whole societies by covering up serious human rights abuses, corruption, and crime.

Journalists who were murdered

From high-profile deaths like Jamal Khashoggi's killing inside Istanbul's Saudi consulate, to a shooting outside a journalist's home in Yemen, to an attack on a convoy in South Sudan that killed five, such targeted acts to silence the press reflect government corruption and suppression of people's rights and weaken public trust in a country's judiciary.

Jamal Khashoggi (Saudi Arabia)

Jamal Khashoggi, former editor-in-chief of the Saudi newspaper Al-Watan and columnist for The Washington Post, was killed by a team of Saudi military and intelligence officials on October 2, 2018, shortly after entering the Saudi consulate in Istanbul. Turkish and Saudi courts have tried and sentenced several suspects in the case. It was revealed in September 2020 that, after Khashoggi's murder, U.S. President Donald Trump admitted to helping shield Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman, who ordered the journalist's murder according to a report released by the CIA. A current lawsuit against the U.S. intelligence community seeks the release of documents that may provide information on its awareness of threats to Khashoggi's life.

Ahmed Hussein-Suale Divela (Ghana)

In 2018, a member of parliament during a TV appearance threatened and encouraged violence against Ahmed Hussein-Suale Divela, and Divela had said he feared for his life. A member of the investigative journalism outlet Tiger Eye Private Investigations, 33-year-old Divela was shot and killed by two men on a motorbike in January 2019. He was driving in the Madina neighborhood of Ghana's capital, Accra, and had been assisting government prosecutors with an investigation into corruption within the country's soccer leagues. A Tiger Eye lawyer has called for charges to be brought upon the member of parliament, in addition to the two suspects.

Dalia Marko (South Sudan)



Dalia Marko, a reporter for the local radio station Raja FM, was among five journalists killed when unidentified gunmen ambushed an official convoy in South Sudan in 2015. There were 11 victims in total. According to reports, the convoy was returning from Sepo to Raja, having visited families of individuals killed in another attack by unidentified gunmen, when it was attacked with gunfire and machetes and set on fire. The motive for the attack remains unclear, and government spokesmen pointed blame at the time at different rebel groups. This is the deadliest attack on journalists in South Sudan since CPJ began collecting data in 1992.

Natalia Estemirova (Russia)

Since 2000, at least five journalists from independent Moscow newspaper Novaya Gazeta have been killed, including Natalia Estemirova. She also contributed to Caucasus news website Kavkazsky Uzel, served as a consultant for Human Rights Watch and was one of few people reporting on human rights abuses in Chechnya. In 2009, four men forced the 50-year-old into a car in Grozny, the capital of Chechnya, as she was leaving her apartment for work. According to press reports, the journalist shouted that she was being kidnapped as the car sped away, and later that day her body was found in the neighboring region of Ingushetia with gunshot wounds in her head and chest. A colleague believes Chechen authorities were behind the murder, condemned by former Russian President Dmitry Medvedev.

Larry Que (Philippines)



Publisher of weekly community newspaper Catanduanes News Now and owner of a local insurance company, Larry Que was entering an office building in December 2016 when a gunman fatally shot him in the head at close range and escaped on a motorcycle driven by an accomplice. The newspaper had recently published a column by Que alleging "official negligence" over an illegal methamphetamine laboratory and naming Catanduanes Governor Joseph Cua as responsible. Que's wife believes Cua hired a hitman to "silence" Que. She filed a murder complaint, which police said is still under investigation as of August 2020. She also pursued charges of graft and misconduct against Cua; they were dismissed for lack of evidence.

Nabil Hasan al-Quaety (Yemen)

Secessionist conflict threatens justice in journalist's murder.

Journalist Nabil Hasan al-Quaety, 34, whose wife was expecting their fourth child, was killed in the southern port city of Aden on June 2, 2020. A group of men in military uniforms attempted to hit al-Quaety with their car as he exited his home and opened fire when he ran, shooting him in the head, chest and hand. The assailants then fled. A freelance reporter, videographer and photographer, al-Quaety had worked with the news outlet Agence France-Presse since 2015. The Yemeni government claims sole authority in Aden, but the city is effectively run by the Southern Transitional Council fighting for separation from the country. Both have condemned the killing, but an official investigation could prove difficult due to this makeup. A spokesman for the secessionist group said it recently embedded al-Quaety as a photographer and speculated that forces within the government may be responsible for his death.

Danilo López (Guatemala)



Two gunmen shot Danilo López in March 2015, while the reporter for Guatemala City daily Prensa Libre was walking in a park with a fellow journalist. In more than a decade with the newspaper, López had often written about corruption and misuse of public funds and had received threats in connection to his reporting. The case awaits a murder trial against Julio Juárez Ramírez, a former lawmaker who has been charged with orchestrating the attack and sanctioned by the U.S. Treasury Department under the Global Magnitsky Act. Courts sentenced the getaway driver to 30 years in prison, charged but have not arrested the alleged gunman and acquitted two other suspects. Authorities believe the case may be linked to an organized crime network working with a drug cartel and transferred the case in 2015 to a special court in the capital after local prosecutors investigating the crime received threats.

Shujaat Bukhari (India)


Four suspects are yet to be charged in the June 2018 killing of Shujaat Bukhari, founding editor of Rising Kashmir newspaper. Several unidentified gunmen fired at him as he was leaving his office for an iftar party. He suffered injuries to the head and abdomen and died, as did two police officers who had been assigned to protect him after an attack in 2000. In the days preceding the incident, Bukhari had requested additional security amid the conflict-ridden situation in Kashmir. Police claimed that Lashkar-e-Taiba, a Pakistan-based militant group was responsible, but the group has denied involvement. In November 2018, police and the army killed one of the prime suspects in a shootout. There have been no updates in the case since.

Norma Sarabia Garduza (Mexico)



In June last year, unknown attackers shot and killed reporter Norma Sarabia, 46, at the front door of her residence in Huimanguillo, in the southern state of Tabasco. She had received frequent death threats as a correspondent for newspapers Diario Presente and Tabasco HOY and had recently reported on a series of violent crimes, including murders and a kidnapping. Soon after her death, the Tabasco state attorney general's office said in a statement released on Twitter that it had opened an investigation. To date, however, there has still been little movement in the investigation. Sarabia is one of 56 journalists killed in Mexico since 1992.

Daphne Caruana Galizia (Malta)



Daphne Caruana Galizia, a prominent journalist who reported on corruption and helped cover the Panama Papers, was killed in Malta in October 2017 by a car bomb near her house. Her widely read blog, Running Commentary, included investigative reports and commentary on politicians. Former Maltese Prime Minister Joseph Muscat considered Galizia a harsh critic of his but condemned the "barbaric" attack and stepped down in January 2020 over the political crisis sparked after the case. Four men have been in detention—some since December 2017—but no trial date has been set. CPJ and 18 other organizations have called on authorities to prevent political interference in the investigation.

Gauri Lankesh (India)



She was an Indian activist and journalist from Bangalore, Karnataka. She worked as an editor in Lankesh Patrike, a Kannada weekly started by her father P. Lankesh, and ran her own weekly called Gauri Lankesh Patrike. She was murdered outside her home in Rajarajeshwari Nagar on 5 September 2017. At the time of her death, Gauri was known for being a critic of right-wing Hindu extremism. She was honoured with Anna Politkovskaya Award for speaking against right-wing Hindu extremism, campaigning for women's rights and opposing caste based discrimination.

INTERVIEW WITH RAJIIKA PURI

Rajika Puri, festival curator and acclaimed dance storyteller, spoke to Mabel Pais.

TIP: YOU HAVE AN INSPIRING RESUME IN THEATRE, DANCE, AND FILM. ARE YOU STILL ACTIVE IN EACH OF THESE AREAS?

RAJIIKA PURI (RP): Mira (Nair) got me into 'Mississippi Masala' (1991) and 'Longtime Companion' (1989 - directed by Norman René) and things like that. But film is not really my thing...I did however fly there and then get up really early to go to the set at 6 o'clock the next morning and do something small. Roshan Seth is a friend of mine. I had gone because Roshan Seth was in the film ('Mississippi Masala') and actually I was supposed to be on holiday in New Mexico. I had a scene with Sir Ben Kingsley in 'Learning to Drive' (as Darwan's sister Rasbir) and things like that. But it was fun (2014 - director Isabel Coixet).

Nowadays, I'm doing even less theatre because the auditions and all stopped during the pandemic and then my agent left or retired and I decided not to get another one. Then I decided to get a place in Portugal to spend a lot of time there and winters in India.

TIP: WHERE WERE YOU BORN? HOW DID YOU GET STARTED IN DANCE?

RP: I was born in East Africa.

Oh! I think as a little child I would always listen to music. My father was in Burma during the war (Second World War) and my mother went home for my birth, and I have photographs of me standing by a His Master's Voice (HMV) turntable records that had that

big megaphone, and there's a picture of me just standing next to it listening to music and trying to move myself to it. Apparently, my mother always said "you know, that from the moment you could walk, you responded to dance.". To me, dance is really a response to music. It's not like jumping around like an idiot. It really is a response that comes in my body when I hear music that makes me want to move.

TIP: AT WHAT AGE DID YOU START PERFORMING?

RP: I think my first dance class was at the age of eight. My mother knew that a person's brain is not really beginning to be formed and set until the age of eight. So she didn't want to have me do anything before that age except to jump around to music, or go to dance sessions in kindergarten. But at the age of eight, she found me a guru, and I started. (Of course, in those days it was only Bharatanatyam you could learn). A few Bharatanatyam gurus had come to Delhi, and I remember having classes in the central hall of my aunt's big house (because my Bengali father who was in the army had been posted to a non-family station and we were in Dehradun and we had moved to a very small place that they gave to army wives whose husbands were at the frontier, at non-family stations. So in this big hall of Motilal Nehru Marg, I used to get Bharatanatyam lessons.

Then, my mother got fed up of being an army widow (a grass widow is what I mean) of never seeing her husband who was up in the Front (battle front), so she decided to go to London, and she took my younger 2-year-old brother and myself, and we went off to England. There, she put me into ballet for a little while. But my feet were not ballet feet. I have flat feet as a Bharatanatyam dancer, but there were no Bharatanatyam teachers in London in 1958!

Soon, she even got me into a couple of talent shows and I danced on television and was called back three times, you know. The newspaper used Malini (from Manimalini Parivrajika which is my real name, Rajika is the end of it. There's no such a name as Rajika in India, though it is a Sri Lankan name, I later discovered.

The name Rajika was given to me by Madame Sokhey, Menaka Sokhey. She was one of the first dancers who went abroad at the same time as Uday Shankar. She told my mother when my parents got married in her house, "If you have a daughter, give her the name Rajika," which was one of her favorite roles in her ballet 'Malavika Agnihotram'. A Parivrajika is a wandering Buddhist nun. I remember my masi (mother's sister) said, "No, no, that name means she'll never get married." So I later thought that part of my name has come too since I have traveled a lot during my life, from New Zealand to Peru. So, she said, "Call her also 'Monimalini' to ensure she is not poor! So they added Monimalini to the beginning of my name. But my father used to just call me 'Rajika'. And then I found out that it is a Sri Lankan name.

TIP: WHY THE TITLE 'DANCING THE GODS'?

RP: Well. Have you thought about it? We don't dance for the Gods, we don't dance to the gods, we become the gods on stage. When I dance Shiva, I become Shiva. I'm representing Shiva. We dance for the people; we dance the gods. We dance as Shiva to spread, to give the non-literate people and others in the villages and so on to bring the scriptures to life. And to bring the scriptures to life, we danced and the characters were gods.







In Heeramandi, Richa Chadha shines brightest as the doomed Lajjo

Richa Chadha's performance as the anguished Lajjo burns the brightest in Sanjay Leela Bhansali's Heeramandi: The Diamond Bazaar. Her arc is inarguably the shortest, yet leaves the impact of a sudden storm that wreaks havoc within the harmonious framework of the narrative. Lajjo is alcoholic, hopelessly romantic, and wildly unpredictable. Her tragedy lashes down on the syntax of the show quite early, and even though the story picks up soon after, her spirit leaves a gaping wound that refuses to heal.

Bhansali also provides Lajjo with two beautiful musical creations- Sakal Ban and Masum Dil Hai Mera. Perhaps Lajjo is akin to the brief incandescence of a song, one whose presence lifts the mundane towards a frantic high. Sakal Ban is where Lajjo is first introduced- we see her arrive with a twinkle in her step, instantly at ease with the other dancers. It is when Mallikajaan (Manisha Koirala) has announced the 'nath utrai' ceremony of her daughter, and the entire Shahi Mahal is awash in yellow, the spirit of spring. The viewer will see Lajjo with all the other women of the community for the first time. The second time that happens- the same space takes on a devastating contrast.

Lajjo is in love with Zorawar (Adhyayan Suman), the resident Nawab of Lahore. Laughing at the thought that Mallikajaan's daughter Alamzeb (Sharmin Segal) wants to be a poetess, she



says how these dreams are the reason for the downfall of women. Yet, who will tell Lajjo that her dream of marrying Zorawar will be her biggest mistake? She refuses to acknowledge the truth and hopes on, daydreaming of freedom from her life as a courtesan. With an unsteady gait, she stumbles on her way to meet her lover. When she falls just outside her room, she brushes it off with a smile. The smile is so used to enveloping the pain that it has now become a static reaction.

When Zorawar informs her that he is getting married to another woman, Lajjo is again left with nothing but her shattered dreams. She hangs on to the thought that she will be married too and will go on a honeymoon out of the country. Her mention of Paris is quite telling; she's a woman who knows the

world that exists outside the walls of the Shahi Mahal. Yet, the more she tries to step into that dream, the more she is shown the door. When she is finally granted independence to step outside, it is of the ultimate form.

Richa has always been a compelling presence on screen, carving out fierce and unapologetic female characters in the course of her decade-long career. In Heeramandi, the actor is cast against type, and it is a thrill to witness her infuse Lajjo with such intensity and grace. It is her finest hour on screen. Bhansali gives Lajjo the doomed arc of a Nargis in Pakeezah and the imprint of Meena Kumari's spirited elegance. That influence fuses into the stunning kathak performance for Lajjo in what is the standout sequence of the series.

THE FALL GUY

Ryan Gosling, Emily Blunt fun it up in goofy stuntman romance

You might need to get your indulgent smile firmly in place for this colossal action comedy – not unlike the adorable smirks on the faces of its male and female leads, Ryan Gosling and Emily Blunt, who play the daredevil movie stuntman and the stern director with whom he is in love. It's a goofy summer crowd-pleaser (and you can never have too many of those) that is very far from the edgier and more satirical mien of Richard Rush's 1980 movie The Stunt Man, in which a Vietnam draft evader hides out on a movie location, doing dangerous stunts in return for anonymity. Actually, this one is loosely inspired by a 1980s TV show, also called The Fall Guy, about a stuntman with a parallel career as a bounty hunter – starring Lee Majors, a legend who puts in a tongue-in-cheek cameo here along with his co-star, Heather Thomas.

Gosling plays seasoned stunt maestro Colt Seavers, utterly unafraid of any physical challenges, self-effacingly doubling for insufferably conceited star



Tom Ryder (Aaron Taylor-Johnson), who outrageously claims to do all his own stunts. Colt is having a passionate affair with beautiful, talented camera operator Jody Moreno (Blunt), but when he is involved in a catastrophic and career-ending failed stunt, he is overwhelmed

with macho shame, thinking the accident was his fault because his infatuation with Jody made him take his eye off the ball.

Colt self-pityingly disappears from view during physical rehab and cuts off all contact with Jody, who is deeply hurt.

But then hard-faced producer Gail (Hannah Waddingham) persuades him to come back to work on Jody's first film as a director, a sci-fi epic starring Ryder as a space cowboy doing an awful sub-Matthew-McConaughey Texas accent. Gail claims that Jody herself wanted him – but she and the unspeakable Ryder have their own wicked plans in mind.

Once the premise is established in the first quarter of an hour, the rest of the film is devoted to a long and essentially plotless extravaganza of crashes, bangs, jumps, punches and PAEs (Pointless Action Explosions). It's a movie whose own stunts – and the fact that stunt doubles are needed – lend a kind of metatextual frisson to this story, although the script does allude to the brave new AI world in which deepfakes can also be used to make it look as though the star is doing the dangerous stuff for real. Location footage over the final credit roll makes it glancingly clear that a number of actual stuntmen were needed, but falls short of giving these unsung heroes actual named-star status.

HAMAS TO SEND DELEGATION TO EGYPT FOR GAZA CEASEFIRE TALKS

BEIRUT (TIP): Hamas said on May 2 that it was sending a delegation to Egypt for further cease-fire talks, in a new sign of progress in attempts by international mediators to hammer out an agreement between Israel and the militant group to end the war in Gaza. After months of stop-and-start negotiations, the cease-fire efforts appear to have reached a critical stage, with Egyptian and American mediators reporting signs of compromise in recent days. But chances for the deal remain entangled with the key question of whether Israel will accept an end to the war without reaching its stated goal of destroying Hamas. The stakes in the cease-fire negotiations were made clear in a new UN report that said if the Israel-Hamas war stops today, it will still take until 2040 to rebuild all the homes that have been destroyed by nearly seven months of Israeli bombardment and ground offensives in Gaza. It warned that the impact of the damage to the economy will set back development for generations and will only get worse with every month fighting continues.

Hamas is seeking guarantees for a full Israeli withdrawal and complete end to the war. — Reuters

SEE NO POINT IN PEACE CONFERENCE IN SWITZERLAND

ZURICH (TIP): Russia said on May 2 it saw no point in a conference being planned by Switzerland in mid-June to discuss how to end the Ukraine conflict and to which Moscow is not currently invited. The Swiss government said on Thursday that "at this stage" Russia is not among the dozens of countries invited, adding that while it was open to including Russia, Moscow had repeatedly underlined it had no interest. Switzerland in January said it would host the summit at the request of Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskiy. Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov said Moscow did not see it as a credible initiative. "What kind of conference can we talk about, with serious expectations of some kind of results, without the participation of Russia?" he said. — Reuters

HIGHWAY CAVES IN, 24 DEAD, 30 HURT IN CHINA'S GUANGDONG

BEIJING, (TIP): At least 24 people were killed and 30 others were injured when a section of a highway collapsed early May 1, the start of a five-day long Labour Day holiday in China's rain hit Guangdong province. The cave-in occurred at around 2am in Dabu County of Guangdong's northern Meizhou City. (PTI)

China's advanced 3rd aircraft carrier begins sea trials amid South China Sea tensions

BEIJING (TIP): China's third aircraft carrier, the Fujian, the most advanced homemade warship, began its maiden sea trials on May 1 as Beijing ramped up its naval power amid increasing tensions with the US in the disputed South China Sea and Taiwan Strait.

The ship left Shanghai Jiangnan Shipyard on Wednesday morning for the sea trials, primarily to test the reliability and stability of the aircraft carrier's propulsion and electrical systems, the state-run Xinhua news agency reported.

Since its launch in June 2022, the Fujian has completed its mooring trials, outfitting work and equipment adjustments. It has met the technical requirements for sea trials.

Ahead of the trials, China has imposed maritime traffic controls around the mouth of the Yangtze River where the Jiangnan shipyard ship is located for "military activities".

The traffic controls would last till May 9, the report said.

According to the previous official media reports, China plans to have five to six aircraft carriers by 2035 for strategic deployment in the disputed South China Sea, where Beijing seeks to assert its claims over most of the vast area, the Taiwan Strait which separates the Chinese mainland and Taiwan and the Indian Ocean where Beijing is increasing its power projection.

Elaborating on China's strategy in acquiring aircraft carriers, Senior Col. (rtd) Zhou Bo, who spent four decades with the People's Liberation Army (PLA), said China sees their importance for possible war far from home.

"I cannot speculate on how many carriers China will need. But I can tell you that aircraft carriers are primarily not for coastal fights. They are for a



possible war far from home," Bo, who is a senior fellow with the Centre for International Security and Strategy at Tsinghua University, told the Hong Kong-based South China Morning Post in a recent interview.

"People may say that one day, when China has to retreat from peaceful means to resolve the Taiwan issue, we could use aircraft carriers," he said.

"Of course they are useful, but they are more useful in our power projection in the Pacific Ocean, Indian Ocean, or Atlantic Ocean – anywhere far from our waters – because they are platforms for the ships and aircraft that make us powerful," he said.

Currently, the Chinese navy is involved in a standoff with the US-backed Philippines naval ships in the South China Sea.

The Philippines is trying to assert its claim over the Second Thomas Shoal in the South China Sea which is strongly resisted by China.

China claims most of the South China Sea. The Philippines, Malaysia, Brunei and Taiwan have counterclaims.

China names its aircraft carriers after its provinces. Fujian borders the Taiwan Strait. The other two carriers were named after Liaoning and the Shandong provinces.

China's first aircraft carrier, the Liaoning, was a refit of the Soviet-era ship commissioned in 2012 followed by the indigenously built 2nd aircraft carrier Shandong in 2019.

Chinese official media said Fujian is the "first fully domestically developed and constructed" aircraft carrier with an electromagnetic aircraft launch system (EMALS) similar to that of the American aircraft carrier USS Gerald R. Ford.

Fujian has a full displacement of more than 80,000 tonnes, about 20,000 tonnes more than the other two aircraft carriers.

China's other two aircraft carriers are equipped with ski-jump take-off ramps while the Fujian features a flat-top flight deck.

China operates its indigenously built J-15 aircraft for its carriers.

In a major rejig of its military doctrine, China in 2013 stepped up the development of the navy with a massive budget while cutting down the number of army troops as part of its power projection far from its shores.

The modernisation included building several aircraft carriers besides submarines, frigates and assault ships as part of its efforts to expand its global influence.

According to an estimate, China is building almost a naval ship a month. It is helping Pakistan to modernise its navy by providing its latest naval frigates and submarines. (PTI)

Man with sword goes on stabbing spree in London, kills teen, injures 4

LONDON (TIP): A sword-wielding man on May 1 smashed a vehicle into a home and then went on a stabbing spree in a "serious incident" near an east London Tube station, killing a 13-year-old boy and wounding four people, before being arrested, the Metropolitan Police said.

The police said the incident did not appear to be linked with "any act of terrorism" and that of the five people injured, a boy has died from his injuries and the others, including two police officers, remain in hospital after the attack in Hainault area of the city.

"A 13-year-old boy was taken to hospital after being stabbed and sadly



died a short while after. The child's family are being supported by local officers and are now with some specialist

officers," said Met Police Chief Superintendent Stuart Bell in a statement. He confirmed the 36-year-old suspect was tasered within 22 minutes of the first call and remains in custody.

British Prime Minister Rishi Sunak described it as a "shocking incident", saying that such violence has no place on the country's streets.

"This is a shocking incident. My thoughts are with those affected and their families. I'd like to thank the emergency services for their response, and pay tribute to the extraordinary bravery shown by police on the scene," said Sunak. "Such violence has no place on our streets," he said. (PTI)

Missile attack by Yemen's Houthi rebels damages ship in Red Sea

JERUSALEM (TIP): A missile attack by Yemen's Houthi rebels damaged a ship in the Red Sea on April 29, authorities said, the latest assault in their campaign against shipping in the crucial maritime route.

The attack happened off the coast of Mokha, Yemen, the British military's United Kingdom Maritime Trade Operations centre said. The ship was damaged in the attack, the UKMTO said, though its crew was safe and heading to its next port of call. The agency urged vessels to exercise caution in the area.

There was "an explosion in close proximity to a merchant vessel," the UKMTO said. "Vessel and crew are reported safe."

The US military's Central Command identified the ship damaged as the Cyclades, a Malta-flagged, Greece-owned bulk carrier. The military separately shot down a drone on a flight path toward the USS Philippine Sea and USS Laboon, the military said Tuesday.

Houthi military spokesman Brig. Gen. Yahya Saree claimed the attack on the Cyclades and targeting the US warships in a statement early Tuesday.

Meanwhile Monday, the Italian Defence Ministry said its frigate Virgino Fasan shot down a Houthi drone that morning near the Bab el-Mandeb Strait between the Red Sea and the Gulf of Aden.



"A missile exploded in the water in the vicinity of the escorted vessel, causing only minor superficial damage," the Italian Defence Ministry said, not identifying the commercial vessel being escorted.

"The frigate Fasan and the protected merchant vessel are continuing their southward route as planned to exit the Red Sea," Saree did not acknowledge that attack, though he claimed the Houthis also targeted a ship in the Indian Ocean. There was no immediate report or

evidence to support that claim.

The Houthis say their attacks on shipping in the Red Sea and Gulf of Aden are aimed at pressuring Israel to end its war against Hamas in Gaza, which has killed more than 34,000 Palestinians there. The war began after Hamas-led militants attacked Israel on October 7, killing 1,200 people and taking some 250 others hostage.

The Houthis have launched more than 50 attacks on shipping, seized one vessel and sunk another since November,

according to the US Maritime Administration.

Houthi attacks have dropped in recent weeks as the rebels have been targeted by a US-led airstrike campaign in Yemen. Shipping through the Red Sea and Gulf of Aden has declined because of the threat.

American officials have speculated the rebels may be running out of weapons as a result of the US-led campaign against them and after firing drones and missiles steadily for months. However, the rebels have renewed their attacks in the past week. Early Sunday morning, the US military shot down five drones in the air over the Red Sea, its Central Command said.

The drones "presented an imminent threat to US, coalition, and merchant vessels in the region," Central Command said in a statement.

The Houthis on Saturday claimed they shot down another of the US military's MQ-9 Reaper drones, airing footage of parts that corresponded to known pieces of the unmanned aircraft.

US Air Force Lt. Col. Bryon J. McGarry, a Defence Department spokesperson, acknowledged to The Associated Press on Saturday that "a US Air Force MQ-9 drone crashed in Yemen." He said an investigation was underway, without elaborating. (AP)

Fighting worst floods in history, Kazakhstan successfully coexists with ethnic groups



ASTANA (KAZAKHSTAN) (TIP): At a time when Kazakhstan is undergoing a difficult moment due to the worst-ever floods in 80 years just when it had embarked on political and social reforms, its President Kassym-Jomart Tokayev has stressed that the consequences of the floods will be eliminated, and the path of reforms will continue.

One of the paths is to promote inter-ethnic unity because contrary to superficial impression, Kazakhstan is a mosaic of ethnicities which includes

Germans, Koreans, Russians, Uzbeks and Kyrgyz nationalities besides 70 per cent Kazakhs.

Speaking to a group of visiting journalists, Chair of the capital's Uzbek ethno cultural centre Sherzod Pulatov said it is this emphasis on ethnic unity that the Kazakh people in a difficult situation have demonstrated cohesion, solidarity and sympathy for those in need.

"All ethnic groups are an integral part of the people of the Republic of Kazakhstan. Our country is multinational, according to some sources, representatives of at least 130 ethnic groups live in it. There are 42 ethno-cultural associations in all cities and districts of the country," he explained.

There are more than 1,000 different ethno-cultural associations in Kazakhstan, all united by a coordinating body – the Assembly – which held its session party virtually due to the floods and the need to save money. (TNS)

South Korea's parliament approves independent investigation of the devastating 2022 Halloween crush

SEOUL (TIP): South Korea's parliament on May 2 approved legislation mandating a new, independent investigation into the 2022 Halloween crush in Seoul that killed 159 people.

The single-chamber National Assembly passed the bill by a 256-0 vote. It will become law after it is signed by President Yoon Suk Yeol and promulgated by his government agency — steps that are considered formalities because the president and his ruling party already agreed on the legislation.

The bill is meant to delve into the root cause of the crush, details about how authorities handled the disaster and who should be blamed for it. It also envisages the creation of a fact-finding committee with nine members that would independently examine the disaster for up to 15 months. Once the committee determines who is responsible and who should face charges, it would report them to the government's investigation agencies. The agencies would then conclude investigations of the suspects within three months, according to the bill.

The crush, one of the biggest peacetime disasters in South Korea, caused a nationwide outpouring of grief. The victims, who were mostly in their 20s and 30s, had gathered in Seoul's popular

nightlife district of Itaewon for Halloween celebrations. In the aftermath of the tragedy, there was also anger that the government had again ignored safety and regulatory issues despite the lessons learned since the 2014 sinking of the ferry Sewol, which killed 304 people — mostly teenagers on a school trip.

In early 2023, a police special investigation concluded that police and municipal officials failed to formulate effective crowd control steps, despite correctly anticipating a huge number of people in Itaewon. At the time, investigators said police had also ignored hotline calls by pedestrians who warned of swelling crowds before the surge turned deadly.

More than 20 police and other officials have been on trial over the disaster but few top-level officials have been charged or held accountable, prompting bereaved families and opposition lawmakers to call for an independent probe.

President Yoon had previously opposed a new investigation of the disaster. However, during a meeting with liberal opposition leader Lee Jae-myung on Monday, Yoon said he would not oppose it, should some existing disputes be resolved, such as whether the fact-finding committee can request arrest warrants. (AP)

20 KILLED IN BUS ACCIDENT IN NORTHWEST PAKISTAN

PESHAWAR (TIP): Twenty people were killed when a passenger bus skidded off a mountainous terrain and plunged into a ravine in northwest Pakistan on May 3, authorities said.

The incident occurred on the Karakoram Highway in Diamer district of Gilgit-Baltistan region when the bus was on its way from Rawalpindi to Hunza and the driver lost control of the vehicle, a police official said.

It was not clear as to how many passengers were aboard the bus, the official said.

At least 15 people, who were injured in the incident, have been moved to a hospital in Chilas, the official said.

Rescue efforts are in progress and the dead bodies are being shifted to the hospital, the official said.

A hospital source said three women were among the dead.

The source said the death toll was expected to rise further as many of the injured were in a critical condition.

Gilgit-Baltistan Chief Minister Haji Gulbar Khan expressed condolences over the incident and directed the administration to provide immediate medical aid to the injured.

Giltgit-Baltistan government spokesperson Faizullah Faraq said an emergency was declared at the Chilas Hospital after the accident. (PTI)

BANGLADESH FACES LONGEST-EVER HEATWAVE

DHAKA (TIP): The authorities in Bangladesh have issued another heatwave alert for three more days from April 28 as the South Asian country is facing its longest heatwave in 75 years. Bangladesh reported the season's highest temperature at 42.7°C on Friday in the south-western district of Chuadanga. Dhaka's maximum temperature was 38.2 degrees that day. IANS

ISHAQ DAR APPOINTED PAKISTAN'S DEPUTY PM

ISLAMABAD (TIP): In a surprise move, Pakistan's Foreign Minister Ishaq Dar was on April 29 appointed the country's Deputy Prime Minister.

Dar, 73, a chartered accountant and a veteran politician, belongs to Prime Minister Shehzad Sharif's Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N) party.

According to a notification issued by the Cabinet Division, the appointment was made by PM Sharif "with immediate effect and until further orders". (PTI)

Intense battle in Myanmar town prevents 1,500 Hindus, 20 Rakhines from moving to safer zones

MYANMAR'S / NEW DELHI (TIP): The situation in Myanmar's Buthidaung town, a region in the Rakhine state, remains precarious as residents from the Hindu and Rakhine communities have been trapped amidst escalating conflict between the military and the rebel group, the Arakan Army.

The situation has worsened due to a burgeoning communal divide, fuelled by allegations of the military's training and conscription of Rohingyas, compelling their participation in combat. There have been increasing instances of people's houses being gutted based on their ethnic beliefs.

"The battles are intensifying on the ground in Buthidaung. Over 1,500 Hindus and 20 Rakhines are being prevented from leaving as the situation is unsafe there. Rohingyas are being trained as conscripts and they are being made to target people based on their religion and ethnicity," a source tells TNIE.

A curfew has been imposed in Buthidaung and Maungdaw areas of Rakhine state from 7 pm to 6 am. The Arakan Army claims to have taken control over a 16-mile-long road around these areas to make it safe for the civilian population.

However, fighting has intensified around the Thahtay hydropower project in Thandwe town, in the westernmost part of Myanmar.



Reports indicate that medicine shops are being seized and imports of critical medications are being prohibited. Pharmacy owners in Thandwe express dismay, questioning how restricting access to medicines for patients would benefit the military.

"Due to intensified checking, even food packets are not being delivered, and residents are now fearing an existential crisis," said a source.

Meanwhile, two Rohingya youths, reportedly plucked from refugee camps in Bangladesh for military training under Myanmar's junta, were apprehended after fleeing the training grounds.

Numerous reports have emerged

indicating the Myanmar Junta's role in recruiting young Rohingya boys from refugee camps in Bangladesh for military training as part of efforts to combat rebels in the ongoing civil war.

The arrested youth have been identified as Kefayet Ullah (19) from Kutupalong refugee camp in Cox's bazaar and Anwar Mostafa (18) from Bhasan Char refugee camp in Noakhali district.

According to reports, the youths were undergoing training in rifle usage to confront rebel groups.

However, they absconded from training due to intolerable heat and food shortages, fleeing within a week of their recruitment. (AP)

Pakistan Foreign Office on arrest of 14 people with drugs from Pakistani boat off Gujarat coast



ISLAMABAD (TIP): Pakistan said on May 2 that it was waiting for an independent confirmation about an Indian claim regarding the arrest of over a dozen people with 86 kg of drugs from a Pakistani boat off the Gujarat coast.

The Indian Coast Guard said on Sunday that it seized 86 kg of drugs worth Rs 600 crore from a Pakistani boat and arrested 14 persons on board the vessel off the Gujarat coast. The operation in the Arabian Sea was carried out in coordination with the Gujarat Anti-terrorism Squad and the Narcotics Control Bureau.

"We have seen these media reports and we are awaiting independent confirmation of the claims made by the Indian authorities. We will make our comments known once we have details of this incident," Pakistan Foreign Office spokesperson Mumtaz Zahra Baloch said when asked about the development during her weekly media briefing here.

She alleged that India's "network of

espionage"..., over the last several decades, has expanded to several continents and is now "an issue of concern" for the international community.

To a question that Prime Minister Narendra Modi said at a rally that he wanted to tell Pakistan over telephone about the Balakot strikes in February 2019, she said, "there has been a rewriting of history from the Indian side".

"They have made statements which are not based on facts, and which are many

times geared towards political mileage inside India. So, I would not like to comment on this particular statement by the Indian Prime Minister. However, I would like to highlight that as Pakistan demonstrated in 2019, the people of Pakistan and its armed forces are ready to defend the country against all intrusions from any quarters," she said.

When asked about reports that Pakistan was planning to give two air bases to the US, she said, "this speculation is completely unfounded and we reject it". (PTI)





Fatty liver alert: Swelling in these body parts can indicate severe disease

Fatty liver disease is a commonly seen problem that can impact one's quality of life. Did you know? Fatty liver can develop into liver cirrhosis and cause irreversible liver damage. Fatty liver disease happens when there is an excessive buildup of fat in your liver. It is a common occurrence in adults due to over-consumption of alcohol (Alcohol-induced fatty liver disease) or non-alcoholic fatty liver disease owing to a sedentary lifestyle, obesity, and diabetes.



with fatty liver disease. This pressure buildup leads to fluid accumulation in the surrounding tissues, resulting in swelling.

Abdomen (Ascites)

The potent signs of advanced liver disease are ascites (meaning the build-up of fluid within the abdominal cavity). Liver

inflammation and scarring cause high pressure in the blood vessels within the liver which is portal hypertension. This increased pressure can cause fluid to leak from the liver's blood vessels into the abdominal cavity of the person and he/she may get abdominal swelling and discomfort. It is always necessary to check this fluid to rule out other causes of ascites like tuberculosis, and cancer.

Feet swelling

Apart from swelling in the legs and ankles, there can be Edema in the feet when one has a severe level of fatty liver disease. Facial puffiness and hand swelling can occur in severe disease.

Swelling in legs and ankles (edema)

This occurs due to increased pressure from portal hypertension caused by liver damage associated



Liver diseases in kids up due to junk food, sugar consumption

Medical experts have found that one in three children have non-alcoholic fatty liver disease (NAFLD), primarily caused by excess sugar consumption.

It has become a significant concern even among children aged 5-16 years. Previously, children were thought to be safe from this liver disease.

The number of children with NAFLD has risen alarmingly from 10-33 per cent in just a decade.

Paediatric hepatologist at Ram Manohar Lohia Institute of Medical Sciences (RMLIMS), Piyush Upadhyay said the consumption of processed meals high in sugar and unhealthy fats is a major contributing factor to NAFLD in children.

Warning against the dangers of sugary drinks and junk food, he explained that triglycerides, a type of fat, accumulate in liver cells when there is an imbalance between the amount of fat the body takes in or produces and the liver's ability to process and eliminate it. The liver normally processes and removes fats from the body.

"This imbalance can be caused by several factors, including genetics, a sedentary lifestyle, obesity, insulin resistance and an unhealthy diet. Decades ago, fatty liver disease was primarily caused by alcohol addiction," Upadhyay added.

"However, non-alcoholic fatty liver disease is becoming increasingly common. I see around 60-70 children with NAFLD every month, which is more than double the number I saw a decade ago," he said.

Another gastroenterologist, Punit Mehrotra said, "Many studies have shown that NAFLD can be reversed in children as well as adults by making lifestyle changes, such as reducing sugar and junk food intake and exercising regularly for at least 30 minutes."

AI fuels cloud computing boom for tech giants

Three of the Wall Street's heavyweight technology firms have reported better-than-expected sales at their cloud computing units in recent days, as interest in artificial intelligence drives a rebound in spending by corporate customers.

Growth in the \$270 billion cloud infrastructure market, a cash engine for Amazon.com, Microsoft and Alphabet, gives the clearest sign yet that AI investment is bearing fruit after investors drove those stocks to record highs, thanks to optimism about the emerging technology.

Many big customers have started spending again on cloud computing after pausing last year to cut costs, executives and analysts said.

Amazon, the last of the trio to report on Tuesday, said its cloud computing arm AWS grew 17% in the January-to-March period, above Wall Street's 15% growth estimate, and hit a \$100 billion annual run-rate for the first time.

Performance was consistent at Microsoft's Azure and Google Cloud, which grew above expectations at 31% and 28%, respectively, in the first three months of the year.

"Looking across AWS, Microsoft Azure and Google Cloud, it is clear that two things are happening simultaneously – AI is contributing to growth, but also the rest of cloud spending is accelerating," said D.A. Davidson & Co analyst Gil Luria.

For several years cloud infrastructure providers enjoyed growth rates as high as 60% and demand shot up during the COVID-19 pandemic as more businesses moved online. However, firms had to realign expectations last year as customers pulled back spending in an increasingly challenging business environment.

The industry has been at the forefront of adopting AI and customers have begun to buy the new functionality at a rapid pace, executives said.

"The number of Azure AI customers continues to grow and average spend continues to increase," Microsoft CEO Satya Nadella said on the company earnings call, adding that more than 65% of the Fortune 500 companies were Azure OpenAI Service customers.

AI services contributed 7 percentage-points in growth to



Azure, up from 6 percentage points in the Oct-Dec quarter.

More than 60% of funded generative AI startups and nearly 90% of genAI unicorns were using Google Cloud, Alphabet CEO Sundar Pichai said on his company's earnings call last week.

"There is an inevitable and continuous migration of workloads to the cloud and consolidation of IT spending going towards large platforms, including the hyperscalers," said RBC Capital Markets analyst Rishi Jaluria.

Hyperscalers are cloud providers with a large network of data centres and a wide range of services and are often preferred for end-to-end workload support. *Source: Reuters*

Google Meet makes it easier to switch calls, lets you transfer calls across devices

Imagine this. You are in the middle of a virtual work meeting, comfortably seated at your desk. Suddenly, your mom walks in and tells you to shift to another room as she needs this one. However, the meeting is in full swing and it is kind of embarrassing to tell your boss that you need to shift to another room. During the pandemic, when remote work was the norm, we have all been in such situations. The only solution we had back then was to ask our boss to excuse us for a couple of seconds while we joined in from another device. And that required us to exit the call and join back in. But with Google Meet's new feature, that won't be the case anymore. The tech giant has finally made it easier to switch devices while you are in a call. The new feature is called, "Switch Here."

Announcing the feature in a blog post, Google wrote, "In today's world, getting our work done can happen from many locations, across many devices. Beginning today, you can smoothly transfer between devices while on a Google Meet call without hanging up and rejoining."

"For example, if you were taking a Meet call on your mobile phone or tablet, you could smoothly



switch to your laptop when you arrived at your desk. You'll notice the new Switch here option when joining a meeting on your laptop, which will switch the call from your mobile devices while maintaining an ongoing conversation and without worrying about missing important information."

With this feature, switching between your computer and smartphone during a virtual group chat is much easier. Whether you're settling into your workstation or on the move, you can seamlessly transfer your active Meet call from one device to another. And that's not all, the feature will also enable you to join a call from two different devices simultaneously.

ISRO to test Gaganyaan parachutes by dropping module from chopper

The Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO) is likely to undertake an important test under the Gaganyaan mission to check the parachute system of the crew module in the next few days, according to officials in know of the matter. The Integrated Air Drop Test (IADT) will see a Chinook helicopter dropping the crew module from a height of around 4-5 km.

"The test is likely to be conducted in the next two or three days. The first IADT will test the parachute system under nominal conditions, meaning it will mimic the process of splashdown of the crew module when both parachutes open in a timely manner," the official said. This will be the first in a series of IADT to test the parachute system under off-nominal conditions such as one parachute not opening, both parachutes not opening, or delayed deployment of the parachutes.

After the splashdown of the crew module—the module that will seat the three Indian astronauts—another helicopter will locate the crew module. The Navy will then recover the crew module and bring it to the Chennai coast, according to officials.





Nifty hits an all-time high

Equity benchmark indices climbed in early trade on Friday, May 3, with the Nifty reaching its fresh all-time peak, following a rally in shares of Bajaj Finance and positive trends from the US markets.

The 30-share BSE Sensex jumped 470.92 points to 75,082.03 in early trade. The NSE Nifty climbed 139.5 points to hit a record peak of 22,787.70.

From the Sensex basket, Bajaj Finance jumped 6 per cent, while Bajaj Finserv climbed nearly 5 per cent.

The Reserve Bank of India (RBI) has lifted restrictions on Bajaj Finance on sanctioning and disbursal of loans through eCOM and Insta EMI Card, the company said in a regulatory on May 2.

In November last year, the central bank had directed Bajaj Finance to stop sanction and disbursal of loans under its two lending products -- eCOM and Insta EMI Card -- due to the company's non-adherence to the extant provisions of digital lending guidelines.

NTPC, ICICI Bank, Tata Steel and JSW Steel were the other major gainers.

Bharti Airtel, Maruti, Asian Paints and Larsen & Toubro were among the laggards.

Adani Enterprises Q4 net profit falls 37% to Rs 450 crore

NEW DELHI (TIP)

Adani Enterprises Ltd, the flagship incubator of billionaire Gautam Adani's conglomerate, on Thursday, May 2, reported a 37 per cent drop in March quarter net profit, bogged down by one-time past airport dues and commercial mining losses.

Its consolidated net profit of Rs 450.58 crore in January-March – the fourth quarter of fiscal year 2023-24 – compares to Rs 722.48 crore net profit in the same period last year and Rs 1,888.45 crore earning in the preceding quarter, according to a stock exchange filing by the company. The firm, which incubates business from airports to data centres, reported an 8 per cent decline in EBITDA (earnings before interest, taxes, depreciation, and amortization) at Rs 3,646 crore in Q4. While incubating businesses like new energy and airports showed strong momentum, the firm suffered a loss of Rs 201.83 crore in commercial mining, while the pre-tax earnings from the road

Oil prices rose on May 1, rebounding from three days of losses that took prices to their lowest since mid-March.

Brent crude futures for July gained 79 cents, or 0.95%, to \$84.23 a barrel by 0959 GMT. U.S. West Texas Intermediate (WTI) crude for June climbed 69 cents, or 0.87%, to \$79.69.

Prices fell more than 3% to a seven-week low on May 1 after the U.S. Federal Reserve kept interest rates steady and warned of stubborn inflation, which could curtail economic growth this year and limit oil demand increases.

Crude was also pressured by an unexpected increase in U.S. crude inventories in data from the Energy Information Administration (EIA). Inventories were shown at their highest since June.

"The updated inventory statistics were probably the most salient price driver over the course of yesterday's trading session," said PVM analyst Tamas Varga.

Crude inventories rose by 7.3 million barrels to 460.9 million barrels in the week ended April 26, compared with the 1.1 million barrel draw expected by analysts in a Reuters poll.

Supporting the price recovery were ceasefire talks in the Israel-Hamas war and the potential for low prices to spur U.S. government buying for strategic reserves.

"As the impact of the U.S. crude stock build and the Fed signalling higher-for-longer rates is close to being fully baked in, attention will turn towards the outcome of the Gaza talks," said Vandana



Hari, founder of Vanda Insights.

In the Middle East, expectations grew that a ceasefire agreement between Israel and Hamas could be in sight after a renewed push led by Egypt, though Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu has vowed to go ahead with a long-promised assault on the southern Gaza city of Rafah.

"The geopolitical temperature might have dropped a notch or two, but the climate remains hot," Varga added.

The U.S. has previously said it aims to replenish the Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR) after a historic sale from the emergency stockpile in 2022 and wants to buy back oil at \$79 a barrel or less.

"The oil market was supported by speculation that if WTI falls below \$79,


the U.S. will move to build up its strategic reserves," said Hiroyuki Kikukawa, president of NS Trading, owned by Nissan Securities.

Shares of oil marketing companies (OMCs) surged by up to 8 per cent during intra-day trades on Thursday as crude oil prices fell to a two-month low on expectations of a ceasefire in West Asia.

Brent crude for July delivery was trading below the \$84 mark at \$83.22 per barrel after falling to a day's low of \$83.05 a barrel. They had hit the \$91 mark last month following tensions between Israel and Iran.

During the day, shares of Indian Oil Corporation (IOC) ended with gains of 2.60 per cent at Rs 173.35 on the BSE after hitting an intra-day peak of Rs 174.50, a rise of 3.28 per cent.

Sanctions notwithstanding, India's Russian oil imports surge



business plummeted 84 per cent to Rs 222.03 crore.

Also, its unit Mumbai International Airport Ltd (MIAL) recognised a one-time exceptional expense of Rs 627 crore to make up for past payments.

Adani New Industries Limited (ANIL), a unit of the company that holds the new energy business — including solar module and wind turbine manufacturing, saw a 6.2x growth in EBITDA to Rs 641 crore, while the same at airports business more than doubled to Rs 662 crore. The number of passengers at company-run airports rose 19 per cent to 88.6 million.

India's Russian oil imports jumped to a nine-month high in April as partly impaired Russian refining capacity due to Ukrainian drone attacks nudged Moscow's oil producers to push more discounted barrels for exports, according to vessel tracking data and industry watchers.

Notably, this surge in India's imports of Russian crude came despite the latest round of sanctions by the United States (US) against Russia's oil shipping syndicate, which had led to speculation that Indian refiners could turn extra cautious in taking deliveries. Trade sources, however, said that the sanctions at the most had a marginal and short-lived impact on Russian oil flows to India.

Indian refiners imported a total of 1.96 million barrels per day (bpd) of Russian crude oil in April, the highest since July of last year, and nearly 19 per cent higher than volumes imported in March, as per provisional ship-tracking data from

commodity market analytics firm Kpler.

Russia accounted for 40.3 per cent of the total 4.86 million bpd of crude oil imported into India in April. This is the first instance in seven months of Moscow having a share of over 40 per cent in New Delhi's oil imports. Russia's share had declined to around 33 per cent in the past four months from the peak level of nearly 46 per cent seen in May 2023, the data shows.

"The first wave of Ukrainian drone strikes (on Russian refining infrastructure) in late January-early February has pushed (Russia's) seaborne oil exports to 3.8 million bpd, so some 300,000 bpd higher than the 3.5 million bpd average of November 2023-February 2024. Not having the ability to refine that much domestically, Russia's oil producers have exported those surpluses and consequently Indian buyers had more to buy from," said Viktor Katona, head of crude analysis at Kpler.

Sikh History This Week

MAY 3 TO MAY 9

3rd May

1705 Siege of Anadpur was initiated. It lasted seven months and ended on Dec. 4, 1705.

1718 Sardar Jassa Singh Ahluwalia was born. Sardar JASSA SINGH AHLUWALIA was born in 1718. He was son of Ahluwalia resident Bader Singh. His close association with Nawab Kapur Singh influenced him in service of GurPanthal. Raja Amir Singh of Patiala was introduced to amrit by him. He was a great General of the Khalsa forces during the 18th century and was called Sultan-ul-Quom, king of the nation, his heroic deeds and qualities of leadership. He killed Hakim SalabatKhan of Amritsar, in 1748, and captured the surrounding region. In 1789, he helped Diwan KodhaMal in removing ShahanWadh from Multan. In 1753, he defeated Hakim Adinabaegh and conquered Fataibad. He won the successful release of enslaved Hindu men and women from Ahmad Shah Durani. As a result he came to be popularly known as BandiShoadh (liberator). He bravely fought in Wada Ghulughara (the big holocaust). Even after receiving 22 grave bounds, he kept fighting. He was head as well as the life of the Ahluwalia Misl. In 1774, he captured Kapurthala state, established his capital there, and issued coins under our Gurus name. He was extremely popular among our Panth. He died in 1783 in Amritsar. A monument in his memory was erected near Baba Atal, in Amritsar.

1914 Morcha launched for Rakab Ganj Gurudwara.



Ramgarhia misl established its rule and served the GurSikh Panth.

1739 Sikhs attacked Nadar on his return trip to Persia and rescued a large booty and thousands of captive Hindu women.

1834 Peshawar conquered and Khalsa raj extended Raj upto Jamraud, Afghanistan. Kanwar Naunihal Singh and Sardar Hari Singh Nalwa conquered Peshawar and extended the territory of Khalsa Raj upto Jamraud (Afghanistan). Further this territory was named Sumaergadh.

1948 Patiala and East Punjab States Union (PEPSU) was formed. EAST PUNJAB STATES: Patiala, Nabha, Jind, Faridkot, and Malerkotla were the Sikh states in the East Punjab before the integration of Indian States in 1948. The first four were the Sikh states under the sovereignty of Maharaja Ranjit Singh and were brought under British protection by the 1809 treaty of Amritsar. Patiala, Nabha, and Jind, also known as Phulkian states, share a common ancestor Phul, who was descendent of Baryam. The Emperor, in 1526, had granted Baryam, the office of revenue collection for the waste country south-west of Delhi. Emperor Shah Jahan continued Phul in this office. From his eldest son descended the families of Nabha and Jind while from his second son the Patiala family. The Faridkot family, founded in the middle 16th century sprang from the same stock as the Phulkians chiefs.

4th May



1479 PRAKASH UTSAV, Patshahi Third, Guru Amardas Ji.

The Third Patshah, Guru Amardas Ji, came to this planet. He was born in Baserke, district Amritsar, 13 kilometers from the city of Amritsar, in the house of Baba Tej Bahan and Matta Lakho. He was ten years younger than Guru Nanak. Today is the actual date of prakash, though Guru Khalsa Panth observes it on a different date (See description below for details on Guru Amar Das Ji).

1686 Janam Utsav of Sahibjada Baba Ajit Singh Ji, the eldest son of Guru Gobind Singh Ji, was born to Mata Sundari at Paonta Sahib on Magh 23 sunmat 1743. He fought valiantly and accepted martyrdom in the battle field at Chamkaur on Poh 8th sunmat 1761 (Dec. 22, 1704).

5th May

1723 Jassa Singh Ramgarhia was born. Ramgarhia, son of Giani Bhagwan Singh of Saedbaegh village, Lahore. He was an accomplished scholar of weaponry and an effortfull individual. He together with Nand Singh Sanghani constructed the "Ram Rahuni" from scratch. When the Adinabaeg general blew up the Ram Rahuni, Jassa Singh re-erected it and named it "Ram Gadh". Henceforth, he came to be known as Jassa Singh Ramgarhia. And his group also was popularly known as Ramgarhias. Just like other Sikh misls, the

6th May



1897 First year classes of Khalsa College were held in Amritsar. The first year classes of Khalsa College were held in the newly and partly built building in Amritsar, near the present Guru Nanak Dev University campus.

1930 Firing at the Sees Ganj, Delhi.

The police fired on Gurudwara Sees Ganj, Delhi. Congress workers had entered the Gurudwara premises and were throwing brickbats on police. In retaliation, the police fired, when the bullets hit Guru Granth Sahib. This caused widespread resentment among the Sikhs. The SGPC launched a campaign for boycott and picketing of foreign cloth shops in protest against this



firing. Though Kharak Singh sought to maintain a distinct identity of the Sees Ganj agitation, it certainly gave strength to the Civil Disobedience Movement. Sikhs contributions to this movement was disproportionately large.

7th May



1665 Guru Tegh Bahadur visited Kiratpur.

1845 Baba Bir Singh of Naurangabad was assassinated at the hands of the treacherous dogra Raja Hira Singh. He was a great Sikh saint of Khalsa Raj period. BHAI BIR SINGH was born on Saun Sudhi 3 Sunmat 1825, in village Gugobuha (near Amritsar) to father Sewa Singh and mother Matta Dharam Kaur. During his youth, he served in the forces of Maharaja Ranjit Singh.

1923 Maharaja Ripudaman Singh of Nabha deposed by the British.

8th May

1705: Battle of Muktsar and Martyrdom of Chaali Muktey.



1839: Khalsa forces captured Kandhar and established Shah Sujaul Mulak as the ruler.

9th May

1915 Bhai Sahib Randhir Singh arrested for participation in an unsuccessful attempt to attack Ferozepur Fort.

1988 Indian government killed numerous innocent GurSikhs at Sri Darbar Sahib.

New rules require airlines to automatically refund consumers for cancelled flights

APRIL 25, 2024

WASHINGTON, D.C. (TIP): The Joe Biden administration on Wednesday, April 24, issued new rules that require airlines to provide automatic cash refunds to passengers when owed and protect consumers from costly surprise fees.

"Too often, airlines drag their feet on refunds or rip folks off with junk fees. It is time Americans got a better deal. Today, my administration is requiring that airlines provide automatic refunds to passengers when they are owed and protect them from surprise fees," Biden said in a video statement.

"This is about airlines treating passengers better and it will save people more than half-a-billion dollars, avoiding unwanted, expensive, unnecessary surprise airline fees," said Transportation Secretary Pete Buttigieg.

Biden said his administration is holding airlines accountable and bringing costs down for American families. "This is just one part of my administration's plan to prevent companies from playing the American people for suckers. It matters," he said.

The White House said these rules will significantly expand consumer protections in air travel, provide passengers an easier pathway to refunds when owed and save consumers more than half-a-billion dollars every year in hidden and surprise junk fees. The rules are part of the Biden-Harris administration's work to lower costs for consumers and take on corporate rip-offs, it said.

The new rules require airlines to automatically issue refunds, without passengers having to explicitly request them or jump through hoops. Airlines and ticket agents must promptly issue refunds within seven business days of refunds becoming due for credit card purchases and 20 calendar days for other payment methods.

Further, airlines and ticket agents must provide refunds in cash or whatever original payment method the individual used to make the purchase, such as credit card or airline miles. Airlines may not substitute vouchers, travel credits or other forms of compensation unless the passenger affirmatively chooses to accept

alternative compensation.

Finally, airlines and ticket agents must provide full refunds of the ticket purchase price, minus the value of any portion of transportation already used.

The Department of Transportation is requiring airlines and ticket agents to tell consumers upfront what fees they charge for checked bags, a carry-on bag, for changing a reservation or cancelling a reservation. This ensures that consumers can avoid surprise fees when they purchase tickets from airlines or ticket agents, including both brick-and-mortar travel agencies or online travel agencies, the White House said.

Under the new rules, each fee must be disclosed the first time that fare and schedule information is provided on an airline's online platform -- and cannot be displayed through a hyperlink.

For each type of baggage, airlines and ticket agents must spell out the weight and dimension limitations that they impose. They must also describe any prohibitions or restrictions on changing or cancelling a flight, along with policies related to differences in fare when switching to a

more or less expensive flight.

An airline must provide useable, current and accurate information regarding its baggage, change and cancellation fees and policies to any company that is required to disclose them to consumers and receives fare, schedule and availability information from that airline.

More than 2,000 pro-Palestinian...

"We are not an authoritarian nation where we silence people or squash dissent," said Joe Biden. "But," he continued, "order must prevail."

"Violent protest is not protected - peaceful protest is," he said. Biden criticized what he called "violent" protests.

"Vandalism, trespassing, breaking windows, shutting down campuses, forcing the cancellation of classes and graduations - none of this is a peaceful protest," Biden said in a brief statement on Thursday morning.

"There's the right to protest, but not the right to cause chaos," the US president said. In response to a reporter's question, he said he did not think it was the right time to call the national guard.

In a Thursday, May 2 report, the Armed Conflict Location & Event Data Project said that although some clashes have broken out, "the overwhelming majority [of protests] - 99% - have remained peaceful".

The protests are part of a movement to force schools to divest from businesses that support the war in Gaza, and they reflect how the war has become a major flashpoint in US politics. More than 34,000 people have been killed in Gaza since Israel began a campaign to dismantle Hamas, the Gaza health ministry has said. More people in Gaza have been thrust into near starvation, as Israel has limited food aid to the area.

On 7 October, Hamas killed more than 1,200 people and took roughly 250 hostages in an attack on Israel. Since the campaign against Hamas began, the US has provided substantial military support to Israel, including most recently in a \$15bn aid package.

Student protests have grown across the country since an encampment sprang up at Columbia University in New York in mid-April. In many cases, faculty members have joined or supported student protesters, as police and universities have responded with force to demonstrations that threaten to continue into commencement season. Hundreds have been arrested in the weeks since the protests began.

Police cleared out a protest camp at UCLA in the early hours of Thursday, May 2 and arrested at least 200 demonstrators. The police operation followed a brutal hours-long attack on the encampment on Tuesday night by masked "instigators" who came to campus and assaulted students with projectiles and chemical agents, while campus security and police retreated or stood by without intervening.

At least 1,000 people gathered on UCLA's campus late on Wednesday night, before police moved in, tearing down plywood and pallets that protesters had used to reinforce their encampment. Students described again being attacked with projectiles, fireworks and chemical agents. The chaotic operation lasted into the early hours of the morning.

By late Thursday morning, the campus had largely quieted down. The UCLA student newspaper the Daily Bruin posted pictures on social media of a campus building scrawled with graffiti saying, "Free Palestine" and "Fuck Israel".

In New York, legal aid attorneys said they were still fighting to have protesters released more than 24 hours after they were first detained - many of whom were only charged with minor offenses and, attorneys said, should have never been arrested in the first place.

"Many protesters who were arrested earlier this week and arraigned last night were ultimately charged with criminal trespass, a low-level offense, and at that point, they should have been immediately released from custody," said Tina Luongo, Legal Aid Society chief criminal defense practice attorney.

At Dartmouth, where an encampment had only recently sprung up, a professor said the university responded with "full force" and posted a video of a white-haired colleague being grabbed and dragged away by police.

"In the hour or so it was allowed to exist, this was the model of a peaceful, inclusive protest," Jeff Sharlet, a

professor at Dartmouth, told the Washington Post. "They obstructed nothing; disrupted nothing; menaced nobody; and neither used nor displayed hate speech."

chaotic scenes at UCLA came after New York police burst into a building occupied by anti-war protesters at Columbia on Tuesday night, breaking up a demonstration that had paralyzed the school.

By Wednesday, a scrum had also broken out at the University of Wisconsin, Madison, after police with shields removed all but one tent and shoved protesters. Four officers were injured, including a state trooper who was hit in the head with a skateboard, authorities said. Four were charged with battering law enforcement.

In one rare example of authorities de-escalating protests, Brown University in Rhode Island agreed to a divestment vote in October - apparently the first US college to agree to such a demand.

Authorities have also made arrests and cleared protest encampments at City College, Fordham University and Stony Brook College in New York; Portland State in Oregon; Northern Arizona University in Flagstaff; Tulane University in New Orleans; and the University of Texas, Dallas.

Student protests have also sprung up in Canada, the United Kingdom and Australia. (Source: The Guardian)

May consider granting interim bail to...

asked the ASG to be considerate and take instructions from the probe agency on the issue of interim bail to the AAP chief.

The Bench asked Raju to suggest the conditions the ED would like to impose on Kejriwal in case he was granted interim bail. It also asked the probe agency to spell out if the Delhi Chief Minister can be allowed to sign files from jail and posted the matter for further hearing on May 7.

The Bench, however, said, "We are not commenting on it either way. We may or may not grant (interim bail)... Don't read anything into it," the Bench said, even as Raju said he would oppose interim bail to Kejriwal.

Drawing the court's attention to statements being made by AAP MP Sanjay Singh after the top court ordered his release on bail, the ASG said, "Look at the kind of statements he is making."

Currently lodged in Tihar Jail in the National Capital under judicial custody after his arrest on March 21, the Delhi Chief Minister has challenged the Delhi High Court's April 9 verdict upholding his arrest in a money-laundering case linked to the Delhi excise policy "scam".

Earlier, the top court had on April 2 granted bail to senior AAP leader Sanjay Singh in connection with a money-laundering case related to the Delhi excise policy scam after the ED said it had no objection to his release on bail. However, it had clarified that the concession given to Singh will not be treated as a precedent.

The ED alleged that an employee of businessman Dinesh Arora delivered Rs 2 crore to Singh's house on two occasions. Singh was arrested by the ED on October 4, 2023 following allegations made by Arora, who has turned approver in both the ED and CBI cases related to Delhi excise scam.

The Bench had, however, noted that no money had been recovered from Singh and there were nine exculpatory statements given in his respect by Arora.

Two other senior AAP leaders - former Delhi Deputy Chief Minister Manish Sisodia and former Delhi Health Minister Satyendra Jain - continue to be in jail in separate money-laundering cases.

During the arguments on Friday, Singhvi said Kejriwal was not an accused till 16 March. What changed drastically... that he was arrested on March 21, he wondered as he sought to emphasize that the probe agency had no new material to justify the arrest.

However, the Bench was skeptical about his

argument that a political party can't be covered under the PMLA. "It is a little difficult...a society is also an association of individuals. Can it be said that a society won't come under the provision?" Justice Khanna asked.

The Bench sought to know if the ED was bound to disclose the entire material collected during the probe or only a part of such material.

"If we record everything in writing, it would be voluminous. That is not what is expected. It is not necessary that irrelevant material has to be reflected. Else charge sheet cannot be filed within 60 days at all. Writing will run into thousands of pages even one or two lines is about each material. Investigating officers would be bogged down," the ASG replied.

As Raju said, "This is not a case where there is no material against the accused", the Bench said "He (Kejriwal) was not expecting to get arrested."

"We (ED) called him nine times... Evasive answers cannot be ground for arrest, yes. But cumulatively, we can take that into consideration," the ASG said. (Source: TNS)

UK's ruling Conservatives suffer big...

It is an indication that the main opposition Labour Party appears increasingly likely to return to power after 14 years.

Labour won control of councils in England it hasn't held for decades and was successful in a special by-election for Parliament. Its only negative appears to have been in some areas with large Muslim populations where the party's candidates suffered as a result of leader Keir Starmer's strongly pro-Israel stance in the conflict in Gaza.

Labour won Blackpool South, a long-time Labour seat in the northwest of England that went Conservative in the last general election in 2019, when then-Prime Minister Boris Johnson won a big victory.

In the contest, triggered by the resignation of a Conservative lawmaker following a lobbying scandal, Labour's Chris Webb secured 10,825 votes, 7,607 more than his second-placed Conservative opponent.

"This seismic win in Blackpool South is the most important result today," Starmer said. "This is the one contest where voters had the chance to send a message to Rishi Sunak's Conservatives directly, and that message is an overwhelming vote for change."

Thursday's elections were important in themselves, with voters deciding who will run many aspects of their daily lives, such as garbage collection, road maintenance and local crime prevention, in the coming years. But with a general election looming, they will be viewed through a national prism.

The results so far provide more evidence that Labour is likely to form the next government - and by quite a margin - and that Starmer will become prime minister. As of early Friday, with barely a quarter of the 2,661 seats up for grabs counted, the Conservatives were down 115 while Labour was up 60.

The results will roll in through Saturday. Sunak hopes he can point to successes, notably in several key mayoral races, to douse talk that the Conservative Party will change its leader again before the United Kingdom's main election, which could take place as soon as next month.

Key to his survival could be the results of mayoral elections in Tees Valley in the northeast of England and in the West Midlands. The former is due Friday lunchtime and the latter on Saturday. Should Conservative mayors Andy Street and Ben Houchen hold on, he may win some respite from restive lawmakers in his party. Should both lose, he may face trouble. Labour's Sadiq Khan is expected to remain mayor of London when results are announced on Saturday.

Sunak could preempt any challenge by threatening to call a general election that has to take place before January 2025. He has the power to decide on the date and has indicated that it will be in the second half of 2024. (Agencies)

Varuthini Ekadashi

The Hindu Lunar calendar is divided into two different phases of the Moon. One phase is waxing Moon which is known as 'Shukla Paksha', in which the Moon grows in size (visually) and brightness everyday bit by bit and the other phase is waning Moon, 'Krishna Paksha', when the brightness of Moon diminishes in size everyday post the Full Moon.

Each phase is of 15 days respectively. 'Ekadashi' is the 11th day in each phase of the Moon, which means that there are two Ekadashis in a month. The term Ekadashi means the 11th lunar day in each fortnight of the Shukla Paksha and the Krishna Paksha, respectively.

To further explain the term 'Tithi' (as per the Hindu calendar), it means one Lunar day which means the time it takes for the Moon to travel a certain distance. So Ekadashi is the 11th Lunar day or Tithi. In the Shukla Paksha i.e. the brighter phase of the Moon, on Ekadashi, the Moon looks three fourth (3/4th) and on the Krishna Paksha Ekadashi, the Moon appears three fourth (3/4th) dark. There are 24 Ekadashis in a year, with the exception of Leap year when there are 26 Ekadashis.

Along with Hinduism, Jainism too considers Ekadashis to be holy, which has spiritual connotations. It is said that merely by hearing the names of the various Ekadashis one will be free of all sins. Lord Vishnu is worshipped on Ekadashi. The day is observed by fasting from Sunrise of Ekadashi Tithi to the sunrise of the following day. Fasting on the Ekadashi is an important ritual of this day. The best form of fasting for Ekadashi is to go without water or food. People who do not want to keep a full fast are recommended to have a fruit-based diet (Phalahar) or fruit and Milk or milk product diet. Consumption of Rice, Grains and Beans are prohibited on this day.

According to the ancient texts, both the Ekadashis, whether in Shukla Paksha or Krishna Paksha, are equally holy and auspicious as they have the same tithi.

The Varunithi Ekadasi is on the lith day of the bright fortnight or Shukla Paksha of the month Vaisakha (Hindu calendar) which falls in May-June as per the Gregorian calendar. It is also known as Vaisakha Shukla Ekadasi. It is said that Lord Vishnu took the form of an Apsara, the beautiful and enticing Varunithi, on this tithi, to get the Amrit Kalash, the elixir of life, away from the Asuras, after the Samudra Manthan.

Observing fast on Varunithi Ekadasi absolves sins and all sufferings. Legend has it that Lord Shri Ram had observed Varunithi Ekadasi when He was told about the merits of this Ekadasi by Sage Vasishtha. This Ekadasi also removes the veil from the illusions which attach us to the material existence.

The ancient text has Lord Krishna explaining to Yudhisthira about the importance where the Lord has said it is greater than all sacrifices or charity to the needy or the sacrifice of Horses (Ashvamedha) or even seeing Lord Vishnu Himself. It is said that one who observes fast on this day, adhering to the rules, will be liberated and get a place in Lord Vishnu's abode.

Bhadravati, on the banks of the Saraswati River, was ruled by the capable Chandravanshi King Dyutiman. He was religious, pious and was wise. There was an extremely wealthy merchant called Dhanapala who lived in Bhadravati. He was a devotee of Lord Vishnu, used to contribute by doing charity of food grains etc. to the citizens of Bhadravati. He had 5 sons- Sumana, Sadbuddhi, Medhavi, Sukriti, and Dhrishthabuddhi.

Dhrishthabuddhi was involved in all sinful activities, starting from being with prostitutes, gambling, illicit sex and other nefarious activities and wasted his father's wealth on all the things to please his senses. An angered Dhanapala expelled Dhrishthabuddhi from the house because of his atrocious behavior.

Within a short time, Dhrishthabuddhi finished all the money and ornaments inherited by him and was



abandoned by the prostitutes. This led him to start stealing money from the citizens and once the King's constables caught him, whipped him and threw him out of the boundaries of the kingdom.

He wandered around the forest killing and eating animals and was in a miserable state.

Once during the month of Vaisakh, wandering around, he reached the Ashram of Kaundinya Muni. The pious sage had just taken his bath in the Ganges river and his body was still wet when Dhrishthabuddhi arrived there. Some droplets fell on Dhrishthabuddhi which miraculously brought the sinner back to awareness and into his good senses. With folded hands, he bowed down to Kaundinya Muni and asked what he should do to relieve him of all the miseries. The Sage asked him to observe fast on Mohini Ekadasi, which was due to come shortly then and told him all the rules and regulations to follow.

Dhrishthabuddhi observed fast on Mohini Ekadasi as per what Kaundinya Muni had guided and was relieved of all sins. Later he also was rewarded as he got a place in Lord Vishnu's abode. The story ends with Lord Krishna telling Yudhishtira that whoever even listens about the merits of Mohini Ekadasi is blessed with merits.

The rituals of Varuthini Ekadashi are specified in the ancient Hindu texts and is said to have been specified by Lord Sri Krishna while answering Yudhishtira's (one of the Pandava brothers from Mahabharata) query. The rituals are:

- One day before Varunithi Ekadashi, which is the 10th day of the Krishna Paksha, the person should clean his teeth thoroughly in the afternoon and have supper at Sunset hour.
- On the morning of Varunithi Ekadashi, the person should intend on keeping the fast meticulously. The person should have a bath in a river (which is said to be most purifying) or a lake and in both not being available, bathe with pond water.
- While bathing the person should smear mud on his/her body with chanting a prayer to Mother Earth.

"Everyone thinks how to become a better son or daughter, mother or father, brother or sister, husband or wife, and man or woman. But no one puts actual thoughts on that they are all HUMAN and how to become a better HUMAN. What can we do to learn how to be a better human?"

- Worship Lord Govinda with complete dedication and Offer an excellent 'Bhog' (food to Divine) along with flowers and other things of the offering.
- Light a lamp at home in honour of the Lord.
- Chant or sing praises of Lord Vishnu throughout the day and remain in a most blissful state during the fast.
- Stay awake through the night in full consciousness. If possible play musical instrument throughout the night to please the Lord.
- The next morning the person should give charity to Brahmanas and respectfully ask them for forgiveness for any offence.
- For people who keep a complete fast till the next day, one should say the prayer -'O Pundarikaksha, O lotus-eyed Lord, now I will eat. Please shelter me.'
- After the prayer the devotee should offer flowers and water at the lotus feet of Lord Vishnu and request the Lord to eat by chanting the mantra of eight-syllable, thrice. To garner the full merits of the fast, the devotee should have water which has been offered to the Lord.
- Fire sacrifices can be performed if the devotee chooses to do so. The day of Ekadashi till the next morning the devotee should involve in taking baths, singing and chanting praises of the Lord and worship Him with complete devotion, involve in activities of devotion and doing charity.



If you love to be in nature's arms, then Mizoram is the place for you! Indians need an Inner Line Permit (ILP) to enter the state. The cost is INR 170 for a 15-day permit. The process to get an extension is slightly difficult. One can get an ILP documentation done at the Lengpui Airport in Aizawl.

Aizawl

Lying at a height of 1132 m above sea level, Aizawl is a quaint city and the capital of the state of Mizoram in northeast India. Primarily dominated by the Mizo Tribe, Aizawl and its surrounding areas are lush with rolling hills and abundant greenery. The city, along with the majority of the state is known for its agricultural produce and ethnic handicrafts and apparel. Aizawl is well connected via roads and air connectivity to other major hubs of northeast India such as Silchar and Guwahati in Assam. An important thing to note is that an Inner Line Pass or ILP is required for entry into Mizoram which is available on Guwahati, Silchar, Shillong, New Delhi and Kolkata.

Among one of the oldest cities in the north eastern region of India, Aizawl, pronounced eye-zole, is a perfect place to relax while enjoying the local food and culture. Home to the Mizoram State Museum and few other tourist complexes, tourists have few options to enjoy a sightseeing tour in the city. Apart from these, one can take a tour to the nearby hilly areas of Hmuifang, Tamdil Lake and Chanmari.

Lunglei

Literally meaning 'the bridge of rock', Lunglei is famous for its scenic beauty



and natural setting. It is a small town, located around 170 km south of Aizawl whose name is derived from a bridge shaped rock found along Nghasih which is a tributary of the river Tlawng. Lunglei is an ideal offbeat destination for those who love natural sightseeing and adventure activities bundled into one. Trekking, bird watching and camping are among the popular activities opted by tourists coming to visit Lunglei.

Lunglei is a biodiverse region, home to Thorangtlang Wildlife Sanctuary and Saza Wildlife Sanctuary. While Saza Wildlife Sanctuary is famous for hosting migratory and endemic bird species, Thorangtlang Wildlife Sanctuary is home to several animal species such as leopards, tigers, porcupines and leaf monkeys among many. Visiting the Lunglei Rock Bridge at the Nghasih stream is another popular activity while here. For those looking to learn about the culture and traditions of the region, the Saikuti Hall is a must-visit.

Champhai

The town of Champhai on the eastern border of Mizoram close to the Indo-Myanmar border is the administrative headquarters of the Champhai district. It is located at a distance of 188 Kms from the capital of Aizawl and is strategically and commercially important for the state of Mizoram as well as for India. Champhai and its surrounding regions are primarily known for their natural beauty and vast valleys of rice fields. It is known as the 'Rice Bowl of Mizoram' due to being a major region of rice cultivation. Also, its vibrant seasonal orchids lend it a certain romanticism and aesthetic appeal.

Champhai has a number of tourist attractions mostly including natural



settings. These include a cave called the Kungawri Puk, a river called Tiau Lui, Lianchhiari Lunglen Tlang and a few more. Rih Dil Lake is another famous natural attraction known to Champhai and the state of Mizoram. Adventure enthusiast can indulge in some trekking at the Thasiama Seno Neihna which is about 83 Kms south of Champhai.

Mamit

The Mamit district is the fourth largest district of the state of Mizoram. The town of Mamit, the administrative headquarters of the district, is located around 95 kms from Aizawl to the west. Known for its exquisite scenic locales and magnificence, don't miss out to add this place in your itinerary in Mizoram. The Dampa Tiger Reserve, among the famous natural protected regions of India, is a popular tourist attraction


here. Adventure enthusiasts will also love visiting the longest cave network of Mizoram in Pukzing. Oranges are a major produce from this district, earning it the nickname, the 'Orange Garden of Mizoram'.

Saiha

Saiha is known as the fastest growing town in Mizoram, as the population has significantly risen in the last decade. Saiha is a census town in the Saiha district in Mizoram located at an average height of 729 meters above sea level. This town is considered to be a haven for angling enthusiasts.

Revealing the mystery behind the name of the town, the name of the town was originally Siaha where 'Sia' stands for elephant and 'ha' meaning tooth - An elephant tooth. But the Mizos traditionally call it Saiha.

History This Week MAY 3 - 9

MAY 3

Birthday - Italian writer and statesman Niccolo Machiavelli (1469-1527) was born in Florence, Italy. He offered a blunt, realistic view of human nature and power in his works *The Prince* and *Discourses on Livy*.

Birthday - Golda Meir (1898-1978) was born in Kiev, Russia. She was one of the founders of the modern state of Israel and served as prime minister from 1969 to 1974.

MAY 4

May 4, 1494 - During his second journey of exploration in the New World, Christopher Columbus discovered Jamaica.

May 4, 1886 - The Haymarket Square Riot occurred in Chicago after 180 police officers advanced on 1,300 persons gathered in the square listening to speeches of labor activists and anarchists. A bomb was thrown. Seven policemen were killed and over 50 wounded. Four anarchists were then charged with conspiracy to kill, convicted and hanged while another committed suicide in jail. Three others were given lengthy jail terms.

May 4, 1970 - At Kent State University, four students - Allison Krause, 19; Sandra Lee Scheuer, 20; Jeffrey Glenn Miller, 20; and William K. Schroeder, 19 - were killed by National Guardsmen who opened fire on a crowd of 1,000 students protesting President Richard Nixon's decision to invade Cambodia. Eleven others were wounded. The shootings set off tumultuous campus demonstrations across America resulting in the temporary closing of over 450 colleges and universities.

MAY 5

May 5th - Celebrated in Mexico as Cinco de Mayo, a national holiday in remembrance of the Battle of Puebla in 1862, in which Mexican troops under General Ignacio Zaragoza, outnumbered three to one, defeated the invading French forces of Napoleon III.

May 5, 1865 - Decoration Day was first observed in the U.S., with the tradition of decorating soldiers' graves from the Civil War with flowers. The observance date was later moved to May 30th and included American graves from World War I and World War II, and became better known as Memorial Day. In 1971, Congress moved Memorial Day to the

last Monday in May, thus creating a three-day holiday weekend.

May 5, 1893 - The Wall Street Crash of 1893 began as stock prices fell dramatically. By the end of the year, 600 banks closed and several big railroads were in receivership. Another 15,000 businesses went bankrupt amid 20 percent unemployment. It was the worst economic crisis in U.S. history up to that time.



May 5, 1961 - Alan Shepard became the first American in space. He piloted the spacecraft Freedom 7 during a 15-minute 28-second suborbital flight that reached an altitude of 116 miles (186 kilometers) above the earth. Shepard's success occurred 23 days after the Russians had launched the first-ever human in space, cosmonaut Yuri Gagarin, during an era of intense technological competition between the Russians and Americans called the Space Race.

Birthday - Communism founder Karl Marx (1818-1883) was born in Treves, Germany. He co-authored *Das Kapital* and *The Communist Manifesto*, advocating the abolition of all private property and a system in which workers own all the means of production, land, factories and machinery.

Birthday - Pioneering American journalist Nellie Bly (1867-1922) was born in Cochran's Mills, Pennsylvania (as Elizabeth Cochrane). She was a social reformer and human rights advocate who once posed as an inmate in an insane asylum to expose inhumane conditions. She is best known for her 1889-90 tour around the world in 72 days, beating by eight days the time of Phileas Fogg, fictional hero of Jules Verne's novel *Around the World in Eighty Days*.


MAY 6

May 6, 1527 - The Renaissance ended with the Sack of Rome by German troops as part of an ongoing conflict between the Hapsburg Empire and the French Monarchy. German troops killed over 4,000 Romans, imprisoned the Pope, and looted works of art and libraries. An entire year passed before order could be restored in Rome.

May 6, 1937 - The German airship Hindenburg burst into flames at 7:20 p.m. as it neared the mooring mast at Lakehurst, New Jersey, following a trans-Atlantic voyage. Thirty six of the 97 passengers and crew were killed. The inferno was caught on film and also

witnessed by a commentator who broke down amid the emotional impact and exclaimed, "Oh, the humanity!" The accident effectively ended commercial airship traffic.

Birthday - Psychoanalysis founder Sigmund Freud (1856-1939) was born in Freiberg, Moravia. His theories became the foundation for treating psychiatric disorders by psychoanalysis and offered some of the first workable cures for mental disorders.




Birthday - Explorer Robert E. Peary (1856-1920) was born in Cresson, Pennsylvania. He organized and led eight Arctic expeditions and reached the North Pole on April 6, 1909. In another expedition, he proved Greenland is an island. He also proved the polar ice cap extends beyond 82° north latitude, and discovered the Melville meteorite.

MAY 7

May 7, 1954 - The French Indochina War ended with the fall of Dien Bien Phu, in a stunning victory by the Vietnamese over French colonial forces in northern Vietnam. The country was then in divided in half at the 17th parallel, with South Vietnam created in 1955.

May 7, 1992 - The 27th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution was ratified, prohibiting Congress from giving itself pay raises.



Birthday - Composer Johannes Brahms (1833-1897) was born in Hamburg, Germany. He composed over 300 songs and numerous orchestral, choral, piano, and chamber works, including his German Requiem commemorating the death of his mother.

Birthday - American poet Archibald MacLeish (1892-1982) was born in Glencoe, Illinois. He was awarded three Pulitzer Prizes, and was also a playwright, editor, lawyer, professor, farmer, and served as Librarian of Congress from 1939 to 1944.

MAY 8

May 8, 1945 - A second German surrender ceremony was held in Berlin. Soviet Russia's leader Josef Stalin had refused to recognize the German surrender document signed a day earlier at Reims. This time, German Field Marshal Wilhelm Keitel signed the surrender document which declared, as did the first, that hostilities would end as of 12:01 a.m. on May 9th.



Birthday - Harry S. Truman (1884-1972) the 33rd U.S. President was born in Lamar, Missouri. He became president upon the death of Franklin D. Roosevelt in April 1945. Two weeks after becoming president he was informed of the top secret Atomic bomb project. In the war against Japan, an Allied invasion of Japan was being planned which would cost a minimum of 250,000 American lives. Truman then authorized the dropping of the bomb. On August 6, 1945, the first bomb exploded over Hiroshima, followed by a second bomb dropped on Nagasaki on August 9th. The next day, Japan sued for peace. Truman served as President until January of 1953. He was the last of only nine U.S. Presidents who did not attend college. His straightforward, honest, no-nonsense style earned him the nickname, "Give 'em hell, Harry."

MAY 9

May 9, 1862 - During the American Civil War, General David Hunter, Union commander of the Department of the South, issued orders freeing the slaves in South Carolina, Florida and Georgia. He did so without congressional or presidential approval. The orders were countermanded by President Abraham Lincoln ten days later.

Birthday - Abolitionist leader John Brown (1800-1859) was born in Torrington, Connecticut. He led an attack on the federal arsenal at Harpers Ferry in October of 1859, to secure weapons for his "army of emancipation" to liberate slaves. Inside the arsenal, Brown and his followers held 60 hostages and managed to hold out against the local militia but finally surrendered to U.S. Marines under the command of Colonel Robert E. Lee. Ten of Brown's men, including two of his sons, were killed. Brown was taken prisoner. He was convicted by the Commonwealth of Virginia of treason, murder, and inciting slaves to rebellion, and hanged on December 2, 1859.

Defending champions India knocked out of Thomas Cup Finals after losing 1-3 to China in quarterfinals

Lakshya Sen was the lone bright spot as the Indian men's team failed to defend its title after going down fighting 1-3 to China in the quarterfinals, while the women's side suffered a 0-3 loss to Japan to also end their campaign in the Thomas and Uber Cup Final here on May 2.

Two years after India claimed their maiden title at the World Men's Team Championships, the country's shuttlers endured a tough day in office as world No. 9 HS Prannoy, world No. 3 Satwiksairaj Rankireddy and Chirag Shetty and Dhruv Kapila and Sai Pratheek K failed to go the distance in their respective matches.

It was a rematch of the 2023 Asian Games team final which India lost 2-3 to sign off with a maiden silver.

The Indian team had ended their group stage at the second spot after losing 1-4 to Indonesia late on Wednesday, while the Chinese had an off day and the hosts seemed to be in better shape as they ticked all the boxes to come up trumps once again at the big stage.

A roaring start ended with a dampener for Prannoy as his spirited fight concluded with a 21-15 11-21 14-21 loss against world No. 2 Shi Yu Qi in a 66-minute clash which gave China a 1-0 lead.

"I don't know but surely I think China had one day off and they came in (the contest) much more fresher. It makes a big difference in the third game. Unfortunate to kind of play today," said Prannoy after the loss. "I will say that we had a very long night and by the time we slept it was 1.32 (am) and to kind of get back to the energy levels I think is definitely less," he added.

"Everybody was very disappointed last night (after the loss to Indonesia), but to come out and play such a big match against the home crowd in less than 13 to 14 hours is a big task mentally out there because you just lost out with a big opponent like Indonesia," said Prannoy.

HYDERABAD (TIP)

Bhuvneshwar Kumar did the star turn with a sensational final over as Sunrisers Hyderabad stunned Rajasthan Royals by just one run in a last-ball thriller to keep their IPL playoff hopes alive here on May 2.

Needing two to win off the last delivery, Bhuvneshwar (3/41) trapped Rovman Powell (27) with a full toss to leave RR at 200/7 while chasing a target of 202.

Opting to bat, Nitish Reddy (76 not out) and Travis Head (58) produced explosive fifties, while Heinrich Klaasen made an unbeaten 19-ball 42 to power SRH to 201/3.

Things were looking up when Bhuvneshwar removed Jos Buttler and Sanju Samson for ducks in the opening over to leave RR at 1/2.

However, youngsters Yashasvi Jaiswal (67) and Riyan Parag (77) came up with counterattacking fifties on way to a massive 134-run partnership to lay the foundation of the run chase.

But once the duo was back in the hut, Shimron Hetmyer (13) hit a four and a six as it seemed like a normal chase but T Natarajan got rid of Hetmyer, who perished at long-on and then skipper Pat Cummins removed Dhruv Jurel, who was caught at deep square leg in the 19th over.

The sudden loss of wickets gave SRH hope of a turnaround but Powell produced a six in the last ball of the 19th over to bring the

Irreplaceable: India not losing sleep over Pandya's form

MUMBAI (TIP)

India are not losing sleep over all-rounder Hardik Pandya's form or batting stalwart Virat Kohli's strike-rate heading into the T20 World Cup in June, chief selector Ajit Agarkar said on May 2.

Pandya, when fit and in form, is India's preferred seam-bowling all-rounder and has also been retained as vice-captain of the Rohit Sharma-led squad for the T20 showpiece co-hosted by the United States and West Indies.

Returning from an ankle injury suffered during the ODI World Cup last year, the 30-year-old has struggled with bat and ball in the IPL.

Under his captaincy, five-time champions Mumbai Indians (MI) have slipped to ninth place in the 10-team league and will need a miracle to make the playoffs.

"The good part is he's got through all the games for MI and we've got another month and a little bit till we play our first game," Agarkar told reporters here.

"As long as he stays fit, we know what he brings, how much balance he gives the team. I don't think there's a replacement for the things that he can do as

a cricketer, especially with the ball. He really gives Rohit the option to play different combinations. So his fitness for us is critical and so far, fortunately, he's gone okay in this IPL."

Consistent Kohli

Unlike Pandya, Kohli has been consistent in the IPL with 500 runs so far this season and only Ruturaj Gaikwad (509) has scored more runs than the former India captain.

Many find Kohli's strike-rate of 147.59 not impressive enough but Agarkar and Rohit laughed off that criticism. "He's been in great form in the IPL, no concerns there at all," Agarkar said stressing the need for experience in a World Cup campaign. "You've got to prepare knowing there's a gap (between the IPL and a World Cup). That's where experience does matter a lot." "There's no point overthinking it."

While the IPL provides a glimpse into the form and fitness of the players, Agarkar said performance in the league alone did not influence team selection.

With the ball likely to turn in West Indies, India have picked two specialist spinners — Kuldeep Yadav and Yuzvendra Chahal — along with spin-bowling all-rounders Ravindra Jadeja and Axar Patel.

"I wanted four spinners, three (specialist) seamers and Hardik as the fourth one," Rohit said. "Based on the combination of our opponents, there's a good chance that Kuldeep and Chahal will play together..."

Inaugural champions India will begin their campaign against Ireland in New York on June 5 and also face arch-rivals Pakistan, the United States and Canada in Group A.



A non-business session on 'Diaspora Languages and Literature' was put together by GOPIO General Secretary Ram Gadhavi. Scholars including Dr. Babu Suthar (Gujarati), Anoop Bhargav (Hindi), Ashok Vidwans (Marathi), Dr. Vasu Ranganathan (Tamil), Raju Thomas (Malayalam), and Dilip Chakraborty (Bengali) discussed diaspora writers and the status of their respective languages. While summarizing the session, Suthar highlighted three main issues, the debate surrounding the concept of 'diaspora' versus 'transnationalism'; the challenge of preserving Indian languages in the USA due to socio-cultural differences, with differing opinions on whether to prioritize language preservation or adapt to local culture; and the role of language in connecting individuals to their cultural roots and expressing shared experiences, exemplified by Suthar's struggle to express himself in Gujarati following the 2002 violence. The audience also shared concerns about maintaining Indian language and culture abroad.


